## Officers honored for detective service

## Cancer fatal at 51 to George Carlier, ex-Advertiser hand

"When the world is the way I want it to be," he said one early morning in 1955, "everybody who is anybody will die before the deadline for the newspaper."

There was a pregnant pause, then he laughed and said, "But I'll probably be too stubborn to accommodate you."

How prophetic George A. Carlier was.

He succumbed to pancreatic cancer in Riverside hospital, Columbus, Feb. 25, after a long bout, including major surgery, with the affliction.

Born in Bridgeport, he was the son of Alexander and Emily Carlier. He was graduated by Bellaire High school and recruited to come to Plymouth by the Peyton W. Thomases, then publishers of The Advertiser. Mrs. Thomas grew up in Bellaire and she had been in touch with a teacher of vocational skills who thought he "would do." He came to Plymouth from Wheeling by passenger train.

Initially he roomed with Mrs. John Weaver at 32 West Broadway. Thereafter he shared an apartment with the late John Bradford and his son, Jacques, in Riggs street.

Concerned about his draft status during the Korean conflict,

he proposed to his employer that he volunteer for military duty. He was confident that he would be turned down, owing to an eye problem he had had since birth.

To his surprise he was accepted for limited service and was assigned to Ft. Knox, Ky.

He married Carole Tracy of Bridgeport and after he was discharged they came to Plymouth, where he resumed his work as foreman of the composing room of The Advertiser.

When it came to printing machinery, he was little short of a mechanical genius. He was a diligent worker with a flair for sound layout and good printing. He helped the newspaper win a score of awards for excellence.

In time, a family crisis led him to seek employment in Columbus, where he joined the printing shop of Ohio State university where he stayed until ill health compelled him to retire last year.

He was divorced.

He was a member of Fishner and Kenney Road Church of Christ, whose minister, the Rev. Gene M. Carroll, conducted services from Shaw-Davis Funeral home, Columbus, Friday at 11 a.m. Interment was in Holly Memorial Gardens, Pleasant Grove, near Bridgeport.

He is survived by his mother, Bridgeport; three sons, Tracy and Todd, Columbus, and Troy, in Oregon; two daughters, Mrs. Tina Irwin, Columbus, and Terri, in Oregon; two brothers, Harvey, Bridgeport, and Daniel, Belmont, and four grandchildren. His father and brother died earlier.

# Even with fish fillets — Violets're white when sugared!

What do we have in common with butterflies, rabbits and birds? Eating violets!  
Believe it or not, some people actually pick them (don't try it unless you are sure there are no insecticides around) and munch on them, kind of like candy.  
They are sweet and are probably considered dessert, especially by the rabbits.

And there is nothing prettier than sugared violets on a cake. With a lot of patience, they can be done in any kitchen. They are plain delicate.

Carefully dip them in beaten egg whites, then put them with great care on a plate sprinkled with a lot of fine white sugar. Sprinkle more sugar over by hand.

If this sounds a speck too ambitious, try mint leaves first. They look pretty too. They are bigger and there is more to work with. Rose petals work the same way.

Some may say this is real gourmet cooking. It isn't, it's merely not being wasteful, since you probably have them growing around your yard.

It's like those who crawl around picking their dandelions for wine instead of killing them off with something.

The word "gourmet" has simply been used too much. After hearing it for years, I have finally decided it really means something you have never eaten before because of where you live. Beef Stroganoff was a great discovery by every cook a few years back, and what is it? Nothing but the Russian version of beef stew.

People in other countries consider our hamburgers something out of this world. They all had their versions of meat patties, but to put one between two pieces of bread made it something different.

What is so wonderful now is that fast transportation and refrigeration make things available that one would never taste unless one could cruise around the world.

Actually, you can made just about anything with stuff out of any grocery store. Once time we were invited to a beautiful Chinese buffet, cooked by a friend's grandmother straight out of China. She could not speak English.

Everyone asked where it all came from, and our nice hostess kept repeating the name of a well-known grocery chain. Frankly, I didn't believe her and became very helpful by carrying the empty plates to the kitchen so I could look around for secret ingredients. They were there, all lined up on the kitchen counter just as they are in any grocery store, made in Ohio to boot. It was the way they were all put together.

If you like fish, try it this way. It's even flatter, and is a big favorite in Hawaii.  
Have some nice fillets ready. Make a sauce of a can or two of flat anchovies with two tablespoons of butter and three of olive oil in a skillet, and saute the fillets in it until golden. Pour the sauce over them when done.

And what can be more glamorous to eat than a beautiful winterer stuffed with thin slices of cheese and simply baked in barbecue sauce? If you had to pay \$10 for it in a nice restaurant, it would be considered the real gourmet dish.



# Red wins sectional first time since 1967

No Plymouth player was alive when the Big Red last won a sectional basketball championship, in 1967.

And Friday night's victory at Bucyrus over Carey wasn't artistic, by any means, but it counts. So the Big Red advances to the sectional at Lexington, where it was to play vaunted St. Peter's last night. Should it prevail, it would meet undefeated Old Fort, in all likelihood, for the district title and the opportunity to go on to the regionals at Toledo.

Old Fort took Monroeville apart in the second half at Bucyrus Friday to win going away, 70 to 52. For Plymouth it was an uphill fight most of the way.

The Big Red did not shoot well and if the Blue Devils had not made so many mistakes on offense during the first half, on which Plymouth scored 11 times, the Big Red might have been blown from the water.

Plymouth led at 2 to 0 and 4 to 2 and 4 to 3 and 5 to 3 before Carey ran eight points and maintained an advantage at the end of eight minutes, despite a run of five by Plymouth that brought it to within a point at 11 to 10 with a little over a minute remaining. At 1:05 Kevin Summit, who was to foul out with 13 points, was fouled by Bryan Christoff and he converted the two shots for a lead of 14 to 10.

Plymouth outshot the Blue Devils from the field in the second period, seven to four, but Carey scored with eight of nine free throws to take a 30 to 24 lead to the dressing room at the half.

Only four buckets by the doughy Steve Hall kept Plymouth in contention. He did not score a field goal until 7:19 of the second period, having fired three times in the first eight minutes.

At the half, Plymouth had unloaded for field goal 29 times with only 10 successes, whereas Carey was nine of 25. It was at the foul line that the Blue Devils had prospered: 12 to 15, versus four of seven for Plymouth.

The Big Red ran six to begin the second half and it was this fact that perhaps spelled the difference when it was all over. The team seemed to come alive a bit. The lead changed hands three times in the third quarter but Carey managed to hold on at 36 to 34 when the buzzer sounded.

Jason Robinson tied it at 36 at 7:18. Terry Moran scored at 7:12 for Carey. Eric Rath hit the first of two free throws at 7:01. The Blue Devils got two penalty conversions from Chuck Tanner, whereupon Plymouth ran six to take a lead of 43 to 40.

But it was short lived. Mark Engle meshed a shot and was fouled by Co-Capt. Troy Keene, who contributed eight to the Red

cause, hampered in part by a nettlesome eye injury received in the first half minute of play. Engle converted the free throw and it was again tied.

Plymouth ran five more, to lead at 48 to 43, but Carey refused to fold. When the score was 50 to 45, the Blue Devils got buckets by Mark Underwood and Engle to bring it to 50 to 49. After four misses at the stripe, Plymouth got a free throw by Kevin Taylor, fouled by Underwood, but Underwood tied it at 51 with 1:51 on the clock.

Carey also scored 19 field goals, on 50 shots. It was afforded 22 free


throws and converted 16. It rebounded 29 times and erred on offense 15 times in the first half and 11 in the second, 26 all told.






