Baltimore Orioles Get \$18,000 Cut

NEW YORK (AP) - The Baltimore Orioles still can't beat those New York Mets - not necessarily on the baseball field but in the bank.

The Orioles, who came out second best to New York in the five - game 1969 World Series before crushing the Cincinnati Reds in the 1970 version of identical length, were rewarded Thursday with winning full shares of \$18,215.78 -
