COLUMBUS — Plymouth became the Ohio High School Class A cross country champion yesterday at Ohio State University's Scarlet Golf Course.

Plymouth edged Kent State and Georgetown, which tied for second, by nine points, 70-79. Plymouth earned its spot in the state finals by finishing fourth in its district meet at Ottawa after winning in the sectional at Tiffin.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (UPI) — Sophomore Ed Shuttlesworth scored three times in his first start at fullback Saturday to make Michigan undisputed leader of the Big Ten with a 63-7 mauling of Iowa—the Wolverines' ninth straight win.

With Ohio State's 17-10 loss to Michigan State Saturday, the Wolverines became a prohibitive favorite to go to the Rose Bowl for the third time in five years. Michigan travels to Purdue next Saturday and closes the season at home against Ohio State.

Pre-Game Prediction Holds Up Spartans Upset Bucks

COLUMBUS (AP) — Duffy Daugherty's pre-game prediction held up and his aroused Michigan State football team handed ninth-ranked Ohio State a 17-10 upset Saturday knocking the Buckeyes from a share of the Big Ten lead.

The Spartan coach told a priest and a few friends before the game that his team was going to blow the Buckeyes "right out of Ohio Stadium."

They didn't quite accomplish that, but the Spartans did hand Ohio State its first home conference loss in four seasons, bringing a big smile to Daugherty's Irish face.

"It was the best victory in a long time. I don't know when I've seen our players so high," Daugherty said. "Nobody wants to win more than Woody Hayes, but he was a very gracious loser. Then again, he has not been in my position very much lately."

Despite an off day and miserable weather conditions, Eric "The Flea" Allen notched touchdowns of five and one yards to stop Ohio State to a 5-1 record in the conference behind Michigan's 6-0 mark.

Allen's scores gave him school records of 13 touchdowns and 80 points for one season.

Brad Van Pelt's fourth interception of the year of a Don Lamka pass set up Allen's first touchdown. That gave the Spartans a 10-7 lead in the second quarter.

Michigan State defensive end Doug Holliday recovered a fumble by Ohio State halfback Morris Bradshaw at Buckeyes' 11-yard line late in the third period.

That paved the way for five-yard scoring scamper by Allen, who set an NCAA rushing record of 350 yards a week ago.

The slippery senior from Georgetown SC

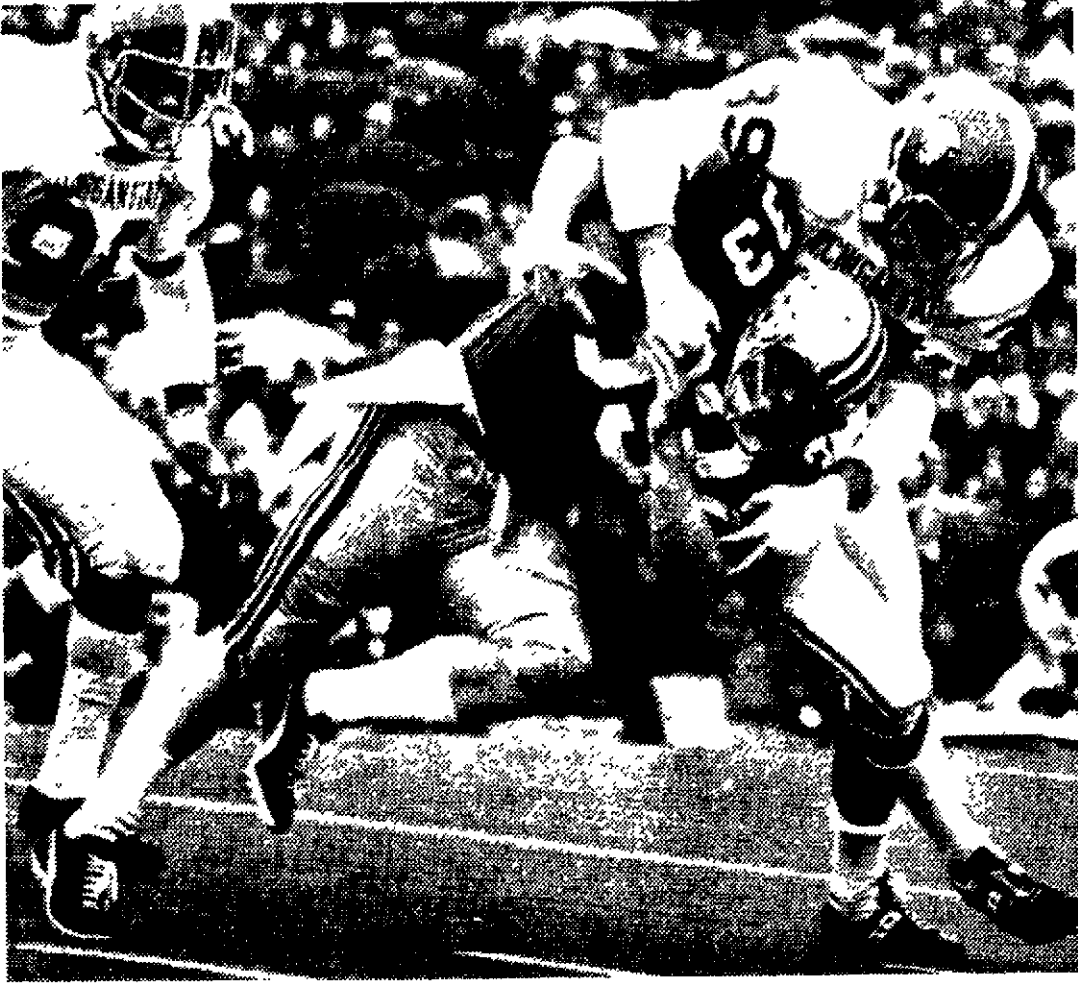
carried the last three times for the final seven yards and a 17-10 Spartan lead with more than 14 minutes to play.

It was the first conference loss in 17 home games for the Buckeyes, who last lost in Ohio Stadium to Illinois in 1967.

A crowd of 86,616 which watched in 38-degree rainy then snowy weather, sat stunned as the Spartans defense blunted the Buckeye attack in the closing minutes. Ohio State's touchdown was an 11-yard run by Bradshaw, capping a 75-yard drive in the second quarter that gave the Buckeyes a short-lived 7-3 lead.

Fred Schram kicked a 20-yard field goal for Ohio State and Boris Shlapak a 47-yarder for Michigan State. Both kickers also missed one field goal attempt.

The victory was the fourth in six Big Ten games for the Spartans who are 5-4 overall. Ohio State is 6-2 for all games.

Nebraskans Romp, 37-0

LINCOLN, Neb. (UPI) — No. 1 ranked Nebraska combined the nation's stingiest defense with the fancy stepping of Johnny Rodgers, and the field goal kicking of Rich Sanger in a 37-0 romp over the eighth-ranked Iowa State Saturday.

Rodgers scored two touchdowns, including a spectacular 62-yard punt return. Sanger booted three field goals and the defense limited the Cyclones to 124 total offensive yards as the Huskers picked up their 19th straight win and extended their unbeaten streak to 28 games.

Sanger's first field goal midway through the first quarter provided all that was needed over the hapless Cyclones, who the week before were crushed by Oklahoma the Nation's No. 2-ranked team and Nebraska's Thanksgiving Day foe.
