
The top three finishers in the division advance to the national race in Atlanta, Ga., later this year.

A heavy rain which turned into "a mist, and then a dense fog as the afternoon progressed, made the track slippery, and spinouts were frequent. Eighteen of the 24 starters finished the race.

The Stewart-Peterson duel took shape during the 16th lap with the Swede bursting into a brief lead. Stewart, however, was back in front in the next lap, but once again Peterson sped in front of him.

Stewart, never a winner at Mosport, stayed close to Peterson. Finally, at lap 30, he closed in and passed the Swede.
