Wooster to Battle Heidelberg Princes

WOOSTER — It's out of the frying pan and into the fire for the Wooster Scots in the Ohio Conference Red Division football title race.

Wooster, bombed by Wittenberg 24-0 last weekend in a divisional clash, hosts another OAC powerhouse in Heidelberg Saturday. The Student Princes are undefeated in six outings.

Like Wittenberg, Heidelberg heads into the Wooster contest fresh off a big three-point victory over Red Division favorite Baldwin-Wallace. Last Saturday the Student Princes knocked off B-W 10-7 while the Tigers topped the Yellow Jackets 17-14 the previous week.

Wittenberg and Heidelberg share the top spot in the Red Division with 2-0 ledgers. The Scots are tied with Capital for third place with 1-1 records.

SLIM CHANCES

A Heidelberg victory would virtually eliminate Wooster from the title picture. Coach Pat O'Brien acknowledges that it will take a complete turn-around in team performance to keep the Scots' chances alive.

"Heidelberg has to be the team to beat in the Conference," stated O'Brien. "They've already knocked off two favorites in Ohio Wesleyan and Baldwin-Wallace. They're near the top of every Conference statistical category."

The Irishman would like to forget Wooster's showing against Wittenberg and he hopes that his team can do the same.

Miami's Redskins Seeking To Gun Down Toledo Rockets

COLUMBUS (AP) — It's revenge time for Miami of Ohio at Toledo Saturday in one of the Mid-American conference football co-features.

"We have a debt to settle with Toledo," vowed Miami Coach Bill Mallory, who remembers a 45-6 beating from the Rockets last year, the worst home loss in the Redskins' proud football heritage.

More importantly, Miami and Western Michigan, with a home triumph over Ohio University, can make it a four-way tie for the conference lead.

The four frontrunners would have 2-1 Mid-American records. Bowling Green and Western Michigan also have a tie, but the conference throws ties out.

Besides Bob Hitchens, the national rushing leader, Miami has the No. 6 total defense among major schools. The Redskins are yielding 216 yards in a 5-1 season.

Hitchens, only a junior, seized the rushing lead last week with 218 yards at South Carolina and now has 937 yards for the season.

LOT OF EFFORT
"It will take 100 per cent of all our players and total elimination of errors to even hope for a victory," said Coach Jack Murphy of Toledo's three-time defending champions.

Murphy will lean heavily on his all-purpose back, Joe Schwartz. Even though he didn't play as a sophomore, the Rocket senior is the conference's top career touchdown maker with 38.

Larry Cates, Western Michigan's top back, is back for the Broncos after resting a bruised leg for a week.

However, Rich Bevil, an Ohio sophomore quarterback who has 1,111 total yards this fall, has an ankle injury and may yield his job to Senior Greg Deyton.

Bowling Green, which has dropped two in a row after a sensational road start this year, seeks revenge for a 12-10 upset by Marshall in 1971. The Herd has lost five straight games.

MANY VICTORIES
Kent State, already matching its entire victory total of three last year, guns for its third straight triumph at Northern Illinois.

Cincinnati braces for undefeated Louisville. The Bearcats (2-4) were the last team to beat the Cardinals, upsetting Louisville 19-16 in the 1971 finale.
