Injuries Hit St. Mary's

St. Mary's gridders are suffering from an onslaught of aggravating injuries, as they prepare to travel to Rittman Friday night for the season's opener.

The most serious injury occurred to senior fullback-linebacker Dave Morton, who missed most of last season with an injury. Morton injured his knee in practice Monday, and according to head coach Doug Mehling, "it looks awfully bad" about starting Friday.

THE PANTHERS' leading rusher in scrimmages, senior Dave Kaman, will probably be switched to fullback, although Kaman is still hindered by a stiff knee.

Junior Tim Roth and sophomore Denny Guerra will probably start at the half-back posts, should Kaman move to fullback. Junior Jim Reardon, a mainstay at defensive back, was also in the running for a start at running back, but has a bruised hipbone.

ANOTHER DISAPPOINTMENT occurred over the weekend as senior two-way tackle Ed Greulich (6-1, 200) injured his ankle. Mehling indicates he might be able to go, but won't be 100 per cent.

Also on the disabled list are soph-

omore Bill Legg, a backup monsterback, with a shin problem, and Chris Schwab, a backup tackle, who has been ill all week.

The Class AA Rittman squad which the St. Mary's gridders will visit Friday night is a team similar to the Panthers in several aspects.

First of all, the Indians lost many key performers from last season, when they finished 5-5, but they still have 14 lettermen returning this campaign. St. Mary's is bolstered by the return of 13 veterans.

SECONDLY, THE school is a very small Class AA school, and competes in the Wayne County League, and meets many schools larger than itself each season.

"They seem to have a very similar situation," commented St. Mary's second-year mentor Doug Mehling. "They lost quite a lot and are looking for new people. They don't do a lot of fancy stuff, but are a pretty sound team overall and play some pretty good competition."

Mehling indicated that his squad will also stick pretty well to basics in its opener.

"WE'VE LOOKED good a couple of times and then just so-so in our last scrimmage. But coming out in the first game is a different situation, and differ-

ent kids react differently at the bell. It should be interesting. We still have some questions going into the first game, and we'll try to keep pretty basic. We'll just keep it simple and see who's interested in playing football."

Rittman is more experienced on defense than on offense, but Coach Wachtel explains that he has had to move away of last year's defensive starters to starting offensive posts, which he terms "robbing Peter to pay Paul."

Heading the list of Rittman returnees is senior two-year letterman Jim Wenger (165), an offensive and defensive end, who saw considerable action at both posts last season.

OTHER LETTERMEN who start on offense for the Indians are senior center Gary Hill (182), junior guard Barry Pickens (155), senior guard Greg Emch (175), senior two-way tackle Frank Bostancic (193), junior end-defensive halfback Jack Winkler (160), senior quarterback Dave Clay (155), senior fullback-linebacker Mark Hiseem (187), senior two-way halfback Brad Bodager (150) and senior halfback-middle guard Tom Isaac (145).

Clay started seven games at quarterback for the Indians last season, Hiseem started at fullback most of the time, and Winkler was running back.

The sole non-letterman in the offensive starting lineup is sophomore tackle Dan Rhoda (175).

THE REMAINING four lettermen who play basically just defense are junior linebackers Brad Breece (160) and Jerry Noble (189), junior tackle Frank Hauser (190) and senior halfback Ron Yost (128).

Wachtel viewed the Panthers in their scrimmage against North Royalton and came away impressed. "They looked pretty tough. I think their speed to the outside and their traps to the inside, which they also run well, are their strengths. On defense they also looked tough. I think they will be using a lot of slant-type defense, which will be hard for us to cope with."

Defending state Class A champion Plymouth began its cross-country season in fine style Tuesday by defeating Black River, 18-41.

SOPHOMORE KEN LUCAS led the way. He covered the Mary Fate Park course in 9:56 to break the old school and course record of 9:59 set last year by Tim Nesbitt.

The Big Red also took the second third and fourth spots. Mike Adams claimed second in 10:14. Ralph Noble turned in 10:29 for third and Brad Buzzard carded 10:30 for fourth.

Steve Adams rounded out the Plymouth scoring with a time of 11:00 good for eighth place.

Black River was topped by Bob Stine who finished fifth in 10:33.
