### Walton Speaks Out on Rumors

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) - "Some people said some things in my name that they didn't have any right to say, and that's wrong," said Rookie Bill Walton of the Portland Trail Blazers, ending his silence on last week's rumors that he might retire from professional basketball.

"I didn't say anything, and I don't fell obliged to dispute what other people have said," the highly publicized former UCLA star said Monday.

Walton, who has missed the Blazers' last seven games because of a painful bone spur on his left ankle. said in an interview Monday: "I've got some things to be worked out, but I'd. rather not say what they

Walton believes in privacy and there was nothing but silence from last Thursday night, when it was first rumored he might retire from pro basketball. Early Sunday the Blazers announced the 6 - toot - 11 center never had any intention of quitting.

Because of his injury, the Blazers left him behind on an eastern road trip, and, with the club's permission, Walton went to Los Angeles to seek a secorid medical opinion on the bone spur. During his stay, he talked with Sam Gilbert, a millionaire contractor who is a friend and his personal ad-

Gilbert, now in Switzerland, told newsmen that Walton was doing some serious soul scarching about leaving pro basketball after only two months of a live year contract estimated at \$2 million.
