# Flyers battle elements to finish fourth

Hanneman earns all-Ohio honors

COLUMBUS - St. Paul did not bring back a Division III championship Saturday night but a fourth-place finish with twotime defending state champion Lima Central Catholic proves the program has reached the level its coach, Dave Weisenberger, set four years ago.

Sugarcreek Garaway took the state crown with a two-day total of 608, followed by Columbus Academy at 621 and the Flyers and LCC both checked in with 625. LCC gained the third place with a fifth-player tiebreaker score.

St. Paul, though, does have a first team All-Ohio player in Andrew Hanneman.

The junior shot an unbelievable 34-38-72 in the rain and wind on Saturday for a two-day total of 146 to finished second overall. LCC senior Paul Marshall post-

ed 144 for the top spot overall. The low 10 scorers are named

first-team all-state by the OHSAA.

Other St. Paul scores Saturday included sophomore Tyler Alge with 43-38-81, followed by seniors Shane Theisen with 40-42-82, Drake Toney at 41-42---83 and Rob Mansfield notched 44-47-91

"Officials called everyone in and we waited for 90 minutes for the sleet to melt. It is not easy for high school golfers to wait."

Weisenberger said there is just so much he can teach over the course of a season, but already knows what his priority will be for next year.

"Every player is going to learn to hit a knock-down shot, windboring shots so important when playing in the conditions of this weekend," he said. "The players that could hit them Saturday scored a lot better.

"I saw players resort to metal clubs on a 180-yard par 3 hole. That's how hard the wind was blowing. Certainly it is important to carry the ball a long ways like Shane does on his tee ball, but Saturday the high-carry shot into the wind was your worst enemy.

"Mark that down, next year all my people will go into matches fundamentally sound, have a decent short game, and be able to hit the knock-down shot.'

on Saturday was no asset either. "Garaway won the tournament because it was paired away from what golfers call "head games" Weisenberger said.

"And there are no rules broken by players who back away from shots several times," he added.

"It is just that players like mine who like to get into some kind of rhythm by playing quickly and in doing so keep from stress, never. did reach that kind of comfort. level.'

Weisenberger believed his team learned from the experience and hopes that carries over to the younger players.

"All of that will be stored in memory banks for the next trip," the Eagle Creek Golf Course pro said. "And there will be a next trip. Our goal was top five this weekend and we reached it.

"The seniors, headed by Shane and Drake, have now turned the leadership over to Andrew. Tyler gets his turn in 2006. There are any number of underclassmen waiting to help. And all of them will have that knock-down shot.\*

New London freshman Logan Cooke, playing as one of the individuals in the field, also failed to handle the weather Saturday, skying to a 44-46-90 after an opening day 80 for 170.

"The weather had a huge impact," Cooke said. "I learned how to take the pressure. I just need to practice on the stuff I'm not great at right now.'

The Panthers were paced by senior Steve Claar. He backed his 74 on Friday with an 39-44-83 Saturday for a two-day total of 157.




## **Balance pays off for Edison** boys' team in SBC meet



BOSTON (AP) --- Early in the morning, when most fans usually are tucked in bed, David Ortiz set off a frenzy at Fenway Park that gave the Boston Red Sox a shot at pulling off the greatest comeback ever.

The Red Sox were down to their last three outs of the season, close to extinction. Then Boston rallied — against Mariano Rivera, the New York Yankees and decades of disappointment.

Bill Mueller singled home the tying run off Rivera in the ninth inning, and Ortiz homered into the right-field bullpen against Paul Quantrill in the 12th, giving Boston an exhilarating and exhausting 6-4 victory. With the win, the Red Sox avoided a sweep and forced a fifth game in the AL championship series.

"This," Ortiz said, "is a team that never gives up."

Red Sox fans who had been praying, holding hands and hoping against hope a few innings earlier, burst into cheers when Ortiz connected. Long after Sunday turned into today, there was still plenty of energy inside old Fenway Park.

Even Ortiz danced home to his teammates waiting at the plate.

"We always find a way to make it hard for ourselves," Red Sox starter Derek Lowe said.

This game lasted 5 hours, 2 minutes and ended at 1:22 a.m. EDT, marking the second backto-back marathon. Saturday's 19-8 win by the Yankees took 4 hours, 20 minutes.

And the teams had about 15 hours to prepare for Game 5, when Pedro Martinez pitches for the Red Sox against Mike Mussina.

"Everybody's going to have trouble sleeping, probably except maybe from exhaustion,

Yankees manager Joe Torre said. Of the 25 previous teams to fall behind 3-0 in a best-of-seven series, 20 were swept, three lost in five games and two lost in six. The Red Sox say if they win again, injured Curt Schilling would be ready to start Tuesday in New York.

"We've just got to get to Game 6," Red Sox manager Terry Francona said.

Quantrill, New York's fifth pitcher, relieved Tom Gordon to start the 12th and allowed a leadoff single to Manny Ramirez. Ortiz then joined Bernie Williams as the only player to hit two game-ending homers in postseason play, the first to do it twice in one year.

"Ortiz is just a great hitter and he beat me," Quantrill said.

Boston was facing a disappointing end to a successful season when Rivera walked Kevin Millar to lead off the ninth.

"You put the walk away, and it would have been totally different," Rivera said. "It wasn't the way I planned it today.
