Once each year the Ohio Conservation and Natural Resources commission gives John Q. Public a chance to have his say on what should be done about regulations and changes for the next fishing season. This open forum is the Public Fish hearing, scheduled for Nov. 12 in the state office building at Columbus.

The hearing is open to individuals representatives of sportsmen and conservation groups, and the general public. It is the time for anyone having suggestions about the 1949 fishing season to speak his piece.

A farmer and a sportsmen's representative from each of the seven conservation districts comprising all 88 counties will attend, bringing to the commission recommendations agreed upon for each particular district where county and district meetings are held prior to the public hearing.

Following the public hearing in the forenoon, the commission will convene to set tentative regulations based on previous fishing seasons and the recommendations and suggestions voiced at the public hearing.

WILDLIFE CHECKED

A report by the Ohio Wildlife Research unit of Ohio State university shows that in 1947 approximately 70 per cent of Ohio's hunters engaged in pheasant hunting and harvested some 592,000 birds, 32 per cent less than in 1946. Nesting surveys in Henry and Wood counties showed that the population in these two counties was less than one-third of that of 1940. The 1948 nesting study indicated a 32 per cent increase in the number of nests reported by farmers in mowing hay. On this basis this local population of pheasants would have increased to 42 per cent of the pre-war level.

On a state-wide basis Ohio game protectors reported seeing 168 pheasants per 1,000 miles of driving in August of 1948 compared with 43 per 1,000 miles in the 1947 survey.

They saw 52 dead pheasants.

Army Powers Over Cornell, 27 to 6

Cadets Win Fifth In Row Very Easily

ITHACA, N. Y. — (AP) — Army packed too much power for Cornell's sophomores yesterday and the Cadets boosted their claim to eastern football supremacy with a 27-6 victory in a battle of unbeaten teams.

Before a sellout crowd of 34,000, the largest ever to jam Schoellkopf field, the Army rolled to a fifth straight triumph but it was a jolting battle.

It might have been different if Hillary Chollet, the big Red's flashy halfback hadn't been carried off the field with a sprained ankle late in the second period. As it was, Cornell simply could not match the explosive dynamite of Army's new inside-outside combination of Bobby Stuart and Gil Stephenson.

RUN ROUGH SHOD

The Cadets ran rough shod over the home club in the first period, rolling up seven first downs to one, en route to a touchdown by sub fullback Karl Kuchkahn. After a 67-yard drive, climaxed by Stuart's two-yard end run, had, boosted the score to 14-0 early in the second. Cornell started to come back.

A 55-yard sideline journey by Frank (Moose) Miller and a neat catch by Chollet of Pete Dorset's long heave, sent the big crowd into a frenzy. As it turned out, that was the last big push by the Red Chollet was injured while making the important catch on the Army 3.

Miller skinned his left end for the Cornell touchdown. Although Bob Dean missed the placement try it was only 14-6 and there was still hope among the home folks at halftime.

IN CHARGE AGAIN

Army took charge of play in the third session, played almost entirely in Cornell territory, adding its third score on the end of a 50-yard drive as Stephenson bulled across from the one.

Halting Cornell's second march after it had penetrated to the one, Army picked up a "gift" score in the fourth Deep in its own territory Cornell attempted a lateral pass play with Dorset tossing back to Bernie Babula. Nobody ever caught the ball which bounced crazily along the ground before it stopped on the Cornell one with Joe Henry, a robust guard from Clearfield, Pa., clutching it to his bosom. Stephenson churning through the middle for the final tally.

College Football Games In Capsule Form

By HAROLD CLAASSEN NEW YORK — (AP) — Michigan, Notre Dame, North Carolina and Army came through with their expected football victories yesterday but what happened to Indiana, Columbia, Holy Cross and Mississippi State?

Michigan stormed to its 19th straight triumph by smothering Minnesota, 27 to 14, although the Gophers held the lead in the second quarter and then again in the third.

Notre Dame, held to a minus seven yards via the air, ground out a 27 to 12 verdict over an Iowa team that moved 201 yards by passes. The game was the 23rd since the Irish suffered their last defeat.

NEW COMBINATION Army, displaying a new outside-inside combination that brought back memories of the Blanchard-Davis combine of recent years, downed Cornell, 27 to 6, in a battle of unbeaten teams.

Charlie Justice scored one touchdown personally and passed for two more as North Carolina romped to its 12th victory in a row, this one at the expense of Louisiana State by a 34 to 7 score.

But it was Pittsburgh, Colgate, Princeton and Alabama that furnished the day's surprises.

For the first time in 10 years the Pitt Panthers have a victory string of three, pushing over Indiana, 21 to 14, on a 63-yard play engineered in the final seconds by the passing combination of Louis Cecconi and Jim Robinson.

Ed Salem's 15-yard field goal in the second quarter gave Alabama a 10 to 7 margin over highly favored Mississippi State. A similar boot of 24 yards by Frank Reichel, a substitute center, brought Princeton a 16 to 14 edge over Columbia. There were only 67 seconds to go when Reichel teed the ball.

Plymouth Eleven Wins Over Shelby

PLYMOUTH—Coach Dick McMullen's Plymouth high school football team ground out its second victory in six games here yesterday, defeating the Shelby Junior varsity, 25 to 0. The game was played on a wet field and a light rain fell during the first half.

The Pilgrims scored first in the second quarter when Desmond Donnemirth capped a 60-yard march with a bootleg play good for 20 yards. Tackle Harvey Wilson kicked the seventh point.

Again in the same period, Plymouth drove to the ten. Don Cunningham cracked off-tackle but bobbed on the two. Guard David Sams fell on the ball in the end zone for the score.

Donnemirth scored in the third quarter on the same bootleg play from 40 yards out. The final score was a 40-yard jaunt off tackle by Larry Schneek.

Wesleyan, 34-0

DELAWARE — (AP) — Ohio Wesleyan's battling Bishops scored two touchdowns in the first quarter and added another in each of the last three periods to defeat Depauw, 34-0, for their third straight victory before a Dad's Day crowd of 4,500 at Selby field yesterday.

Left halfback Bob McFarland led Bishops, scoring two touchdowns on runs of four and 38 yards. Frank Jacobs, Gust Koo-kootsedes and Bob Gardner also counted for the Wesleyan grid-ders.

There were other surprises scattered throughout the nation but none to equal that foursome.

Some of the minor upsets found St. Bonaventure, little up-state New York College, spill William & Mary, 7 and 6; Illinois tack another defeat on Purdue's record, 10 to 6; Stanford losing to Southern California by only one point, 7 to 6; and Vanderbilt crushing Yale, 35 to 0.

As expected the Wisconsin football team, spurred by the attacks of Coach Harry Stuldreher, showed its greatest scoring punch of the season although losing to Ohio State, 34 to 32. Nevada's passing powerhouse pulverized Tulsa, 65 to 14, in a game that made history because two negro backs played with the Westerners.

Georgia Tech, another of the nation's unbeaten forces, snooted through the first half of its tussle with Florida but awakened in the final half to win, 42 to 7.

MAKES SYRACUSE In intersectional affairs, Northwestern made Syracuse sorry it left the east, 48 to 0. Kentucky defeated Marquette, 25 to 0; Mississippi shoved Boston college into the discard, 32 to 13. Michigan State and Penn State tied, 14 all; Oklahoma A & M belted Temple, 41 to 7, and Drake outscored Colorado A & M, 31 to 29.

Missouri smared Iowa State, 49 to 7, in a big seven fray. Colorado bested weak Kansas State, 51 to 7, and Kansas slipped past Nebraska, 27 to 7.

Duke saw to it that Virginia Tech went through its fifth straight game without a score, 7 to 0, and Maryland bounced back from its defeat of a week ago with a 47 to 0 conquest of George Washington. Tulane, another Dixie power, sputtered past Auburn, 21 to 6.

CHOKES RICE

Texas, gradually recovering from the North Carolina debacle, choked off Rice, 20 to 7, while in the east Dartmouth had its hands full in downing Harvard, 14 to 7, and Navy scared Pennsylvania before losing, 20 to 14. Baylor remained unbeaten with a 20-14 verdict over Texas A & M.

California and Oregon, the two west coast teams left in the Rose Bowl running, both triumphed. Californians bopped the hapless Washington outfit, 21 to 0, and Oregon mastered Washington State, 33 to 7. Oregon State blanked favored UCLA, 28 to 0.

Denison, 38-13

OVERLIN — (AP) — Denison's big red football team ran its undefeated string to 15 games yesterday by blasting Oberlin, 38 to 13, to spoil the Yoemen's homecoming celebration.

The game marked Denison's fifth victory and Oberlin's second loss in four games.

Maintaining their six-a-game touchdown average, the Reds pushed their point total for the season to 107. They scored two touchdowns in the first and last periods and one in each of the other quarters.

The game was less than two minutes old when Bob Shannon took a pass and ran 30 yards for the first Denison touchdown. Of the others, Bill Fletz and Jack

Wildcats Smash Past Syracuse 11

EVANSTON, Ill. — (AP) — Northwestern turned on its power and speed yesterday to crush a feeble Syracuse team, 48 to 0.

The Wildcats, still in the running for a Rose Bowl assignment despite their loss to Michigan, scored in every period of the intersectional contest witnessed by 35,000.

Northwestern, in running up its fourth victory in five starts, made 345 yards in rushing and 171 through the air, compared to 42 yards on the ground and 76 on passes for the easterners.

The Wildcats needed only seven plays to register their first touchdown and thereafter the result never was in doubt. Reserves were used freely from that point on.
