

Sandusky Bumps Elyria 20-6 For 2nd Win

Streaks' Defense Again Superlative

Exploding their offensive fireworks in short bursts, Sandusky High's Blue Streaks rolled over Elyria Pioneers 20-6 last night before a crowd of 4,000 at Ely stadium. It was the second straight victory for the Streaks this season, the second in a row over Elyria in two years and evened the 40 game series at 19 victories for each team.

The Sanduskians came from behind to score 13 points in a two minute spurge just before the first half ended and produced the final seven points in the fourth quarter, covering 52 yards in seven plays.

Sophomore Jude Theibert scored the initial Sandusky touchdown on a three yard sweep. Darrell Hurlburt raced 15 yards for the second TD and Sophomore Chuck Acierio dashed around end for one yard and the third touchdown.

End Jim Holzmueller, the brightest star of the game, was knocked unconscious with less than a minute left in the game. He regained consciousness in the dressing room and was believed not seriously injured. Fullback Ted Schwanger was used only slightly in the second half of the game because of an upset stomach.

Elyria's only score was produced in the second quarter when Fred Fitzpatrick grabbed a Sandusky lateral and raced 42 yards to pay-land.

Although the Sandusky offense operated in dramatic fashion it was the defense which was outstanding for the second week in a row.

Elyria Gains 85 Yards On Ground Elyria wound up with a net rushing gain of 85 yards — the second week that a Sandusky foe has been checked with less than 100 yards gained on the ground. The Pioneers added 21 yards on passing for a net yardage of 106 yards.

The entire Sandusky team performed almost flawlessly on defense but it was the two ends, Holzmueller and Dean Miller, who played most brilliantly.

The two junior ends kept the fast Elyria backs turned into the middle of the field with only two exceptions. Both ends also made some great pass grabs on offense.

Use 6-Man Line Mostly The Streaks used their four man line only sparingly after they found they could throttle Elyria with the orthodox six-man line.

The Streaks ground out a net of 212 yards on offense and added 94 on aerials for a total of 306. Sandusky completed six of 19 passes.

Theibert was the work-horse on offense, carrying the ball 21 times. The sweet-running soph gained 86 yards, lost 18 for an average of about three yards per try.

Hurlburt had the best average, totting the pigskin five times, picking up 58 yards for an average of 11.6 per attempt. Ted Schwanger packed the ball nine times for 57 yards and an average of 6.4 yards per carry. Acierio gained 15 yards in two attempts. Lavan Ward gained five in three tries and Dean Miller garnered nine yards in four attempts.

Sandusky threatened to score in the early moments of the game, reaching Elyria's 20 yard stripe before a holding penalty set them back and bogged down the attack. Neither team made any other serious moves in the opening quar-

Both parochial outfits will be after second straight victories.

The rivalry dates back to 1924 and at one time the heat matched that of the present St. Mary's-Fremont St. Joseph's series.

Records show that St. Mary's has won 11 of the 20 games played with St. Paul's copying six and three ending in deadlocks.

The two teams clashed last in 1942 with St. Mary's winning a 35-0 decision. St. Paul's abandoned 11-man football in favor of the six-man variety during the war years and there was no chance to renew the rivalry until this season.

That should set the stage for a real battle tomorrow. Both clubs are bent on building up a winning streak.

St. Mary's will outweigh the Norwalk Flyers by a considerable margin but Coach Bill Mazzocco's boys may attempt to go over or around the Panthers if they find the line too tough to crack.

Gordon Socks Homer To Top Tigers, Yanks Back In Lead

The New York Yankees once again are a half game ahead in the American League pennant battle today, thanks to an old alumnus, Papa Joe Gordon.

Gordon, in one of the most dramatic games of the stretch drive, smashed a ninth inning home run last night to give the Cleveland Indians a 4-3 victory over the Detroit Tigers. The defeat dumped the Tigers out of a first place tie with the Yanks into second position.

Paper Joe led off the last of the ninth with his game-winning blow after the Tigers had tied the score at 3-3 on a two-out, two-run homer by Don Kolloway in the top of the ninth.

The Yanks and the third-place Boston Red Sox were idle. They opened a two-game series in the Yankee stadium today.

Two of the game's crack left-handers, Mel Parnell of the Red Sox and Eddie Lopat of the Yanks, were the opposing pitchers in the important game at the stadium today.

Lopat, who has won four out of six decisions from the Red Sox and Parnell three out of four from New York this year.

A Yankee sweep of the two games will virtually knocked the Red Sox out of contention.

The Indians scored all of their runs in last night's thrilling encounter after two outs. Big Luke Easter drove in their first three runs off Hal Newhouser, who went the distance for Detroit.

Easter socked his 28th homer after Larry Doby walked with two down in the first inning to give Bob Feller a 2-0 working margin.

The Tigers counted an unearned run in the third but Easter struck a two-out, run-scoring single in the bottom of the third to restore Cleveland's advantage to two runs.

Feller breezed along in great style until two were out in the ninth. Johnny Groth then singled and Kolloway followed with his

sixth homer to tie the score. Joe Ginsberg and Newhouser kept the rally alive with infield hits by Johnny Lipon grounded out to end the threat.

The crowd of 29,909 fans had hardly settled in their seats when Gordon began the last of the ninth by socking Newhouser's second pitch over the leftfield fence to break up the game. The blow was Gordon's 19th.

In the only National League game, the Pittsburgh Pirates edged the Cincinnati Reds, 8-7, in ten innings under the lights at Forbes field. Pinch-hitter Wally Westlake broke up the game with a two-run single. Bob Usher of the Reds sent the game into overtime with a three-run homer in the ninth.
