## New Yorkers Clinch 3rd Flag In Row

NEW YORK — (AP)—The New York Yankees swamped the Boston Red Sox twice yesterday to clinch their 18th American league pennant in 30 years, but the feat almost escaped notice as Allie Reynolds, the fire-baller from Oklahoma, spun his second no-hit game of the season in the opener.

Never before in the American league and only once before in the history of the major leagues had a hurler paralyzed enemy batsmen twice in a single campaign. The wild scene in the Bombers' dressing room after the part-Indian whopped the Sox, 8-0 even eclipsed the tumult of the pennant celebration which followed Vic Raschi's 11-3 victory in the decider.

The triumphs boosted the Yankees lead to 3 1/2 games over second place Cleveland and eliminated the Indians from the race. The Yanks have three games to play and the Indians two. The victories also clinched such a rousing finish, it marked the fourth time in their history that the Yankees had dominated the American league by winning three or more flags in succession.

Reynolds, scoring his 17th decision of the year, permitted only four of the indifferent and faltering Bostonians to reach first off base and choked them off right there. He gave the bearded Sox nothing remotely resembling a hit and struck out nine.

The right-hander's other no-hitter this season was pitched against his old teammates the Cleveland Indians, on July 12 at Cleveland, 1 to 0. The only other hurler to notch a pair in the same campaign was Johnny Vander Meer, the lefthander who pitched two in succession for Cincinnati in 1938.

In putting the flag beyond reach of the stranded Cleveland club in the nightcap, Raschi was only slightly less effective. He gave up six hits, but he strung the last three of them over the final seven innings and never had a worry after his teammates piled seven runs across in the second chapter. It was his 21st win of the year against 10 defeats.

It was in every respect, a tremendous afternoon for Casey Stengel's third consecutive pennant team. Of the 23 hits it showered about the stadium, three were home runs from the peerless but aging Joe DiMaggio powered his 12th smash of the year deep into the left field stands with two aboard in the second game the crowd reached its emotional apex. If this turns out to be Joe's last campaign, he will never forget the ovation he received.

Joe Collins and Gene Woodling, homered for the Yanks in the opener. The Bombers' final three games today and Sunday against the Red Sox here mean nothing. WINS EASILE

Reynolds never had an anxious moment throughout his great performance. His fast ball was crackling from the start and his curve chopping off the corners. When he struck out three of the first five men to face him it was all too evident that the chief had his stuff and that the Sox were in for an extremely rough time.

Dom DiMaggio opened the game by drawing one of Allie's four walks, but was erased a moment later when Johnny Pesky rapped to Phil Rizzuto, who trapped the ball on the quick hop, tagged second and whipped to first for the double play.

Reynolds fanned nine and walked four while Raschi whiffed five and gave four passes.

With the exception of sophomore Hammett, the other backfield starters are juniors. In the line, Stoffer, Reece and Snyder are juniors while the others are seniors.

Orrville lists three seniors and two sophomores in its opening lineup. The ends are sophomore Ralph Linsalata and junior Tom Wilford. Tackles are senior Bob McFadden, who equals Heuss' weight, and junior Dave Caskey. Sophomore Donald Sauer and junior Dan Edwards are the guards with senior Vince Macriro at center.

The backfield has juniors Stan Seifried, Tom Lacy and Robert Cofrane teaming with 130 pound senior Bob Crigler. Crigler, Lacy, Seifried are all returning lettermen while Edwards is the only veteran in the line. This is a year of rebuilding at the Red Raider school.

# Hamilton High Rolls Over Van Brocklin Sets New Pro Aerial Record

LOS ANGELES — (AP)—Quarterback Norman Van Brocklin set a new National Football league passing record last night as he pitched the Los Angeles Rams to a 34-14 victory over the New York Yanks.

A crowd of 30,315 cheered the ex-Oregon star on as he exceeded the record for passing yardage set in 1949 by Johnny Lujack of the Chicago Bears, finally racking up an unprecedented 554 yards. Lujack's mark was 463 yards.

Van Brocklin threw five touchdown passes, four of them to Elroy (Crazylegs) Hirsch. The Yanks never could put together a consistent offensive drive. Their two touchdowns came on a 79-yard punt return by Buddy Young and a 30-yard gallop by Art Tait when he intercepted a Van Brocklin pitch-out.
