

Shelby Whips Crestline In Final Grid Tilt

DeVito Scores Two TD's In 18-6 Win

CRESTLINE—A scrappy Crestline high school eleven put up a good fight against the Shelby Whippets in the final Northern Ohio league football game last night but lost, 18 to 6. A crowd of about 1,100 persons watched both schools close their 1951 schedules.

Pirate II Wins Over Plymouth

PLYMOUTH — Plymouth high school battled once - beaten Cardington tooth-and-nail for three quarters before allowing three fourth period touchdowns in a 45-10-13 defeat here last night.

Cardington, which has won 17 of its last 18 games, led only 19 to 13 until late in the third quarter. The Pirates scored again in the third period to lead 26-13 as the final period opened.

Cardington's Bill Henthorne scored his 28th touchdown on a 20-yard burst to open the scoring. The TD boosted Henthorne's seasonal mark to 170 points. However, the Cardington star received a head injury in the second quarter and he was taken to the Willard hospital for observation.

PLYMOUTH knotted the score in the second quarter when Roger Hampton banged over from the two. Dale Coomer also counted on a short plunge to send Cardington into a 13-6 margin at the half. The Pirates moved out in front 19-13 in the third quarter when Bob Bowman returned a kickoff 9 yards to score.

Then the injury-riddled Pilgrims marched back to pare the lead to 19-13 when Duane Wilson ripped over from the five. Hampton added the extra point on a plunge but Cardington had too much power. The game ended the season for both clubs. Cardington ended with eight wins and one defeat while Plymouth failed to win a game.

Don Kelley, an all-Olio back in 1950, scored once for Cardington on a 28 - yard run and passed 15 yards to Noel Underwood for another.

Bill Reichardt Tops Big Ten Rushing List

CHICAGO (AP) — Reliable Bill Reichardt of Iowa has replaced freshman Alan Ameche of Wisconsin as the Big Ten's top ground gainer.

The veteran Hawkeye fullback banged 166 yards in 31 carries against Minnesota last Saturday and raised his total for four conference games to 476 yards.

Reichardt's per play average of 5.3 yards also is the best for the conference's heavy-duty runners. Ameche has compiled a 4.9 yard average.

Jerry Witt of Wisconsin continues to lead Big Ten scorers with 36 points, a touchdown ahead of Illinois' Johnny Karras.

The Badgers' John Coatta still is tops in the passing and total offense departments. Coatta has passed for six touchdowns and has completed 54 heaves in 110 attempts for 743 yards. Tony Curcillo of Ohio State is second.

Sophomore Paul Giel of Minnesota has built a figure of 636 yards on 308 yards rushing and 328 yards passing.

Reichardt has moved into second spot in kickoff returns behind Ron Engel of Minnesota by returning five an average of 23.6 yards. Engel has returned nine an average of 27.3 yards.

New London Wildcats Win 9th Game, 44 to 0

NEW LONDON—The New London Wildcats rolled to their ninth straight victory of the season, avenged their only 1950 loss, and established a new school scoring record with their 44-0 romp over Willard here last night.

Rated the top Class B team in the state, New London got a pair of touchdowns in the first, second and fourth periods and a single counter in the third. Reserves played much of the second half but kept the attack going.

The Wildcats now have totaled 401 points in nine games, surpassing the 395 tallied in ten contests last season. New London closes its campaign against Wellington here next Friday.

Eddie Mack registered three touchdowns, one on a 77 yard dash over tackle, to lead the scoring. Russ Edgington went over twice and Charles Burns and Cliff Belmer each got a counter. Mack now has 96 points for the season while Edgington has 94.

9,000 Watch Tygers Upset Toledo Waite In Mud, 19-7

(Continued from Page 1) proved a big advantage for the heavier Waite team. The underfooting was treacherous and handicapped the running attacks of both teams much of the contest.

Although Waite was stopped without a score in the second quarter, the Indians threatened throughout the period. Two Toledo surges were stopped by intercepted aerials on the 15 and 16 yard lines. A third drive of the Indians bogged down on the 19 when Bob Carbetta came up from his position as safety man and upended speedster Buddy Peacock for a loss on a power sweep.

Until Brickley's great run, Sterger had been the outstanding backfield man in the contest. He piled up 101 yards on 25 smashes at the Tyger defensive line — only one of the thrusts going over 10 yards. Getting 137 of their yards in the last quarter against the fast-tiring Indians, Brickley and Auer combined for 179 yards. Auer gained 96 on eight attempts and Brickley had 83 in 17 blasts.

MARCH 60 YARDS
Mansfield marched 60 yards for a score the first time it got the ball. Two cracks at the huge Waite forward wall netted only two yards but Carbetta passed 12 yards to Darce Shasky for the first down. Auer raced for 18 on an off tackle play and Brickley hit into the line for two.

The Tygers were penalized five yards back to the 31 but Shasky twisted and squirmed to the 14 for a first down. Brickley was held for one yard and Waite was penalized to its eight. Then Brickley swung over tackle for the score and Bob Stauffer booted the extra point.

Waite dominated play the rest of the half and got a break in the third quarter when Bob Thomas, 220-pound tackle, recovered the first fumble of the game on the Mansfield 38. At that stage Sterger's line bending qualities came into play.

Waite's great fullback carried on nine of 11 plays and finally squirmed over from the one. His longest plunge on that drive was a six-yard gain against Mansfield's sliced off tackle for the tying point.

A ten - yard punt out of bounds by Sherman Williams gave Mansfield its big chance late in the third quarter. Brickley made two yards and then was replaced by Bill Zeigler. Zeigler unveiled some hipper - dipper running and was off on a 11-yard jaunt on the first play of the fourth quarter. Auer made three yards to the Mansfield 44 and Zeigler hit for five more.
