

Streaks, Saints Show Offensive Wares

Air Power Gives Sandusky 41-25 Win

In a dazzling offensive display which saw a combined total of 10 touchdowns and 66 points posted, Sandusky High's Blue Streaks bounced back to bump Lorain Steelers 41-25 Friday night before 5,500 fans at Lorain's Recreation stadium.

It was the fifth victory for the Sanduskians who left something to be desired on defense but made up for it with a sparkling passing and running show.

The Streaks emerged from the game in good physical shape with no injuries likely to hamper them in their preparations for Cleveland Lincoln game next Friday. In addition, Jim Holzmueller, regular end who wasn't in uniform last night, will be ready for action again.

Thumping Ted Schwanger, rumbly like a run-away truck, packed most of the offensive fireworks for Sandusky. The bruising full-back netted 152 yards on 19 carries, an average of eight yards per trip.

He was equally as effective on defense and when he ran out of gas late in the game, Lorain fans joined with Sanduskians in giving him a rousing ovation.

Ted Scores One, Passes For 3

Schwanger scored one touchdown, a 33 yard jolt up the middle, and passed for three others. The fullback tossed eight yards to Howard (Egg) Elgart and flipped a flat pass which Junior Jude Theibert lunged 64 yards for a TD.

Chuck Acierio caught a short pass from Schwanger and pounded 22 yards for a TD.

Theibert was less effective on the ground than usual, gaining only 31 yards in 12 attempts, but he spiraled a beautiful pass to Elgart on a 33 yard scoring play.

Quarterback Norm Burrows sneaked one yard for the other Sandusky touchdown.

Lorain played Sandusky for strictly a ground team, a move which Steeler Coach Art Lave must regret today.

The Streaks scored four of their six touchdowns on passes, completed eight of 13 attempted for a gain of 165 sky yards.

Lorain's touchdowns were equally as sensational. John Karason went 83 yards around end, Acierio Kicks Five Straight

Acierio booted five straight extra points before having his sixth attempt blocked. His first five gave him a total of 14 straight, seven against Port Clinton, two against Fremont.

The final margin and the quarter scores would make it appear Sandusky was in command throughout but with two minutes, 38 seconds left in the third period, Lorain only trailed 28-25.

Defensive standouts for Sandusky were Guards Bob Whinnery and Vern Ohlemacher, Ends Elgart and Bill Emmerick and Tackle Chet Klein. Bill Mallory, used chiefly on offense did a good job in his first starting effort at end.

Use Break In First

The Streaks got a break early in the game and made the most of it. Lavon McCall fumbled Schwanger's punt and Whinnery caught the ball in the air and carried it five yards to Lorain's 30.

Schwanger gained 11 yards in three attempts and Acierio 11 in one carry to move the ball to the eight. Schwanger then jumped and Elgart made a diving catch in the end zone. Acierio kicked and Sandusky led 7-0 with seven minutes, 20 seconds to go in the first period.

The Streaks roared 75 yards for their second TD in the opening period, aided by a 15 yard penalty for roughness which put the ball on Lorain's 33. Schwanger ripped through the middle, brushing off would be tacklers like flies, to gallop the 33 yards.

Karason Ross 83 Yards

In the second stanza, Lorain got back in the game after a quick-kick by Theibert. After an incomplete pass Karason swept left end, cut back, feinted Schwanger from his path and scampered 83 yards to cut Sandusky's lead to 14-6.

Sandusky upped the margin six minutes later when Schwanger flipped a quickie to Theibert in the flat. Jude grabbed the ball picked up one good block and then outtraced his pursuers. Acierio's kick made it 21-6.

Later in the second, Burrows passed to Theibert who caught the ball but as he was tucking it under her arm, Al Coleman made a clean steal, took off down the west sideline for an 80 yard jaunt. Ron Gasper booted the point to make the score 21-13.

Jude Passes Beauty

After the next kickoff, Schwanger dashed through tackle for 34 yards to put the ball on Lorain's 34. Theibert faded back to the 40, let fly a beautiful pass which Elgart caught without breaking stride as he raced into touchdown land.

Acierio kicked and Sandusky had a 28-13 halftime budge after a free-scoring second period which saw a combined total of 27 points chalked.

Lorain took the second half kickoff and marched 68 yards with a relentless ground attack. Kosco banged the final two yards and Sandusky's margin was trimmed to 28-19.

The Steelers got away with an on-side kickoff, covering the ball on Sandusky's 47. They covered the seven plays with Karason circling his own right end for the final eight, cutting the Streaks hold to 28-25 with two minutes, 38 seconds left in the third period.

Second Attempt Fails

Lorain attempted an on-side kickoff again but Sandusky covered the ball on the midfield stripe. It took Sandusky three plays to get a touchdown. Schwanger carried to

Steelers Aim For 1st Win Over Browns

CLEVELAND, Oct. 20 (AP)—Pittsburgh's Steelers rolled into town today looking for their first victory over the Cleveland Browns and their first National Pro Football League win of the season.

The Steelers tied the powerful New York Giants but then lost to Green Bay and San Francisco's 49ers by close scores. The Browns lost to the 49ers and beat Los Angeles and Washington.

Last year—Cleveland's first in the league—the Browns cashed in on eight fumbles to beat the Steelers, 30-17, and then romped to a 45-7 win the second time the two clubs met.

Pittsburgh is pretty much the same club as last season—except that now the Steelers have Chuck Ortman to help Joe Feri with the passing. Coach Paul Brown is expected to use about the same lineup as last season—except that this time Emerson Cole is set to do much of the fullbacking instead of injured Marion O'Miley.

The Sanduskians drove 71 yards after receiving the kickoff and led 6-0 after five minutes had elapsed in the first period. The drive was climaxed with a six yard scoot by Derwin Faulkner. George Kerber's try for the point was low.

The Panthers were seldom to be denied thereafter and went on to count twice in both the first and second quarters, and once each in the final two cantos.

Long Runs For Saints

St. Mary's second TD came just two plays after the Saints had returned a punt to the Elmore 48.

Herzog went 41 yards to the 10, turned his head to see that his lead blocker, substitute quarterback Craig Smith was still with him and promptly lateraled to him. Smith went the remaining 10 yards for the score. Kerber's boot again missed the crossbar.

Three penalties and a pass interception by each side marred the remainder of the second quarter and the gun sounded as Herzog intercepted an Elmore pass and raced 49 yards to the Bulldog 31. Sophs Look Good

Elmore's fans found a lot of consolation in the sophomore studded team that took the field in the third period.

The young bulldogs, after challenging a first down and allowing the Saints one on the punt exchange, stopped the Panthers with the help of a holding penalty for the first time. The visitors marched to St. Mary's 31 on three running plays, but lost the pigskin on a fumble.

Cal, USC In Today's Top Game

NEW YORK, Oct. 20 (AP)—The college football season reached the halfway point today with only one game on tap that could have any bearing on the national title-barring upsets, of course.

The big one is scheduled for Berkeley, Calif., where 81,000 persons will crowd into Memorial stadium to watch California, the No. 1 team in the country in the Associated Press poll, battle its neighborhood rival, Southern California.

The Golden Bears of Lynn "Pappy" Waldorf are rated 13 1/2-point favorites over once beaten U.S.C. California has not lost a regular season game in the past four years but is ineligible for the Rose Bowl, having played there last Jan. 1.

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
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
