

Huron Keeps LC Lead

Tigers Stay Unbeaten; Vermilion Drubs Polars

It was four down and two to go for Huron's Tigers in their quest of the Lakeland Conference title following Friday's 21-0 win over Clearview.

In other LC action, Vermilion walloped Margaretta, 38-12, and Amherst upset Wellington, 19-7. It was Jack Armstrong Night at Huron as the big senior full-back gained 171 yards in 21 carries. Armstrong sparked a 71-yard drive in the initial quarter and scored with a smash up the middle from one yard out.

HURON MARCHED 60 yards in the second quarter on the running of Armstrong and Wayne Wright, Wright picking up the marker on a one-yard burst. Midway in final period the Tigers drove 86 yards to paydirt.

Oak Harbor Deadlocks SBC Race

Oak Harbor wasted few chances Friday night as they ran roughshod over Gibsonburg, 48-7, in an important Sandusky Bay Conference fray.

By winning, the Rockets now share the SBC lead with Fremont St. Joe at 3-0. The big game will be played next Saturday night at Fremont with the winner most likely to bag the crown.

TOM HURRELL, Art Van Rensselaer and Dave St. Clair each chalked up two markers. Hurrell scooted 73 yards for the longest run of the night, and grabbed an aerial from Gary Baldwin for a 44-yard touchdown play.

Yankee Cycle Never Ends

Wind Up With All The Money And Men

NEW YORK—Luck couldn't hold that long—22 pennants and 17 world championships in 36 years—so the Yankees must have a vastly superior master plan.

For the New York Americans, the cycle never ends. How can it, when a Joe DiMaggio follows a Babe Ruth and a Mickey Mantle bobs up just when DiMaggio is thinking about calling it a career? How many times in baseball history has a club possessed successive shortstops like Frank Groeschel, Phil Rizuto and now Gil McDougald? Or a Yogi Berra fresh on the heels of a Bill Dickey?

Yankee scouts seem to get to know their kids a little better. They have yet to recommend a screwball or a strange character. When one does show up with the Bombers, he comes from another major league organization. And he immediately is either put in line or shipped.

THE YANKEES HAVE more discipline than any other outfit, which is not the least reason for their sustained success.

They were first to inaugurate the pre-training season school, which has paid them rich dividends. There Casey Stengel and the staff have more time to stress

instruction. . . is there that the youngest learns the proper execution—how to make the double play, the cut-off play, etc. That's one explanation of why mistakes kill opponents of the Yankees.

The Yankees wound up with the long end of the World Series swag and prestige, as usual. More important, they finished with all the men required for the immediate future. The Dodgers, on the other hand, require considerable rebuilding.

The Yankees' most important development of the year was McDougald as a shortstop. Manager Stengel wisely tried the versatile McDougald at shortstop on the trip to the Orient last fall, where he could do no harm while experimenting. Professor Stengel liked what he saw, and while others were failing in the spring, O.P. Case knew he had his guy right in the party.

AT THE OUTSET this year, Stengel hoped to have four dependable pitchers in Whitey Ford, Bob Turley, Don Larsen and Tommy Byrne. When the fast balls of Turley and Larsen sputtered, young Johnny Kucks and Tom Sturdivant picked up the slack.

Mansfield Pins 14-6 Upset On Massillon

Mansfield's 14-6 upset of Massillon, first time the Tygers have turned the trick against their old foe since 1949, toppled the surprises in the Ohio schoolboy football circuit Friday night.

The Tygers, with a 4-1 record before the game, not only knocked Massillon from the unbeaten ranks but also spoiled a 39-game personal winning streak of Massillon Coach Lee Tressell.

Another thriller was Nelsonville's end to 26 years of bowing before Logan, as they posted a 26-12 victory in this season's meeting.

The Nelsonville triumph put them in contention for the South-eastern Ohio League title when they meet Jackson, who defeated Wellston 12-0 Friday night. Both teams are unbeaten.

ANOTHER UPSET saw injury-riddled Bexley blank heavily favored Urbana, who had been unbeaten in the Central Buckeye League, 7-0. The score came late in the third quarter when Dick Holstein grabbed a fumble on the Urbana 28 and Bexley moved the ball to the 6 where Scott Burns went over for the touchdown.

At Canton, Canton Lincoln knocked Columbus North from the unbeaten ranks, 26-0, behind Canton quarterback Chuck Dirkins' passing and a vicious ground attack. McKinley, the state's top-ranked club, smeared Steubenville, 66-13.

Columbus East kept rolling along by beating Columbus West, 32-6, to boost their winning streak to 15 straight.

IN NORTHERN Ohio, Euclid turned two Parma miscues into touchdowns and a 13-7 victory, keeping its Lake Erie League record intact. The Panthers blocked a Parma punt on the 25 yard line, recovering the ball on the six. Larry Nosse went over for the score two plays later.

In the Toledo City League, Toledo Libbey took over first place with a 27-7 victory over Toledo Central Catholic behind the performance of quarterback Dennis Walterreit who threw one touchdown pass and scored on a touchdown run for 43 yards.
