


Norwalk Skims By Bellevue

Redmen Almost Pull Out Thriller

Garberick Shines

John Garberick scored five touchdowns and an extra point to register 32 markers himself in Bucyrus' romp over Willard, the senior halfback picking up 276 yards rushing in 19 carries.

The 185-pounder scored on jaunts of 56, 3, 61, 53 and 20 yards as the Redmen boosted their NOL mark to 2-1. Ray Eddison tallied twice on runs of 10 (Continued on Page 16)

Norwalk and Shelby are co-leaders in the Northern Ohio League after three weeks of action with Bellevue absorbing its initial defeat after whitewashing the first four opponents in convincing style.

The Redmen found an array of fine Norwalk backs too much for them in dropping a 30-24 thriller at Norwalk's Whitney Field Friday night, but not before a tremendous last-ditch effort to "beat the clock".

Shelby joined Norwalk at the top of the ladder with 3-0 marks by whipping Upper Sandusky, 42-6, while Bucyrus thumped Willard, 50-14, and Tiffin Columbian handed Galion, 20-8, in other games.

Sam Nan's rangy Trucker eleven found gaping holes in the Bellevue defense which had held its first four foes without a single point, but the Redmen, who looked like midgets compared to the husky hosts, battled back in championship form and may get right back into contention for a share of the loop crown next week when they travel to Shelby.

Redmen Score First

Bellevue marched 85 yards with the opening kickoff before a large throng to score in 10 plays with lefthanded quarterback Glen Miller hurling a 23-yard touchdown pass to pint-sized end Ken Sawin after freshman Marc McClain and Tom Close set it up with runs of 26 and 25 yards respectively.

Close skirted right end for the PAT and it was 8-0 with 7:43 left in the first period.

Norwalk knotted the count to make it 8-8 at intermission with its fine quarterback Alex Koslow cracking up the middle from two yards after the Trucker's drove 60 yards in six plays following a punt.

Fullback John Levers raced 27 yards and Koslow connected with 6-5 end Dave Culver for another 22 in the drive toward the equalizer. Koslow added the extra points by racing around left end.

The Truckers gained the lead by taking the second half kickoff and going 68 yards in 12 plays, halfback Bill Gelvin ripping off-tackle for the final three. Shifty Steve Schillig scampered 30 yards for one of the key plays with the other coming when Levers bulled his way for three on a fourth and one situation on Bellevue's 22. Koslow's pass for the PAT was incomplete and it was 14-8 with 6:35 left in the third stanza.

Recover Fumble

Ron Craven recovered a Bellevue fumble two plays after the kickoff on Norwalk's 48 and the hosts went in to score again in 10 carries despite a 5-yard penalty.

Three times Koslow, who connected on seven of 10 attempts for 99 yards, tossed strikes to Culver after seemingly being halted by the onrushing Redmen.

The key aerial was a fourth down and eight on Bellevue's 25 with the junior signal-caller breaking loose from three would-be tacklers to hit Culver on the five and Levers crashed into paydirt on the very next play.

Levers, who played an outstanding game for the unbeaten Truckers both ways, also added the PAT. However, Bellevue roared right back to narrow the margin to 22-16 on the last play of the period.

Close had his second six-pointer of the night when he grabbed a pass from Miller over the middle and dashed into the end zone to complete a 35-yard aerial.

Bellevue had a clipping penalty called during the march, but also received a good break when a Norwalk defender was called for pass interference. Miller hit off tackle for the two point conversion.

The fourth quarter was half over when Norwalk punched across another tally with Levers again going the last five after Dave Lowe's recovery of a fumble on Bellevue's 34. Schillig took a pitchout from Koslow and in turn passed to Levers for the PAT to make it 30-16 with 4:34 remaining.

After Bellevue failed to move the ball following the kickoff, Norwalk attempted to run out the clock, but the Redmen called for time after three straight plays and the Truckers were forced to punt.

Close Goes 43

Schillig punted from his own 33 to Bellevue's 37 in the waiting arms of Close and the 143-pounder headed for the left sidelines galloping 63 yards to score behind some excellent blocking on the part of his teammates. He also added the extra points to make it 30-24, but only 30 seconds remained.

Everyone knew the Redmen were going to try an outside kick, but it still worked and Gary Miller recovered the ball on Norwalk's 40 with time rapidly running out.


Glen Miller swept end for 13 yards and a first down on the 27 before running out of bounds to stop the clock. McClain raced 14 yards on a sweep of right end

to the Truckers 13 but was stopped and couldn't get out of bounds as the final two seconds clicked off and Norwalk had its fifth straight win and Bellevue its first loss in the same number of games.

Koslow was easily the most outstanding Trucker on the field, although Culver and Levers had their moments. It was the 160-pound junior who was calm and collective at crucial moments and time and again evaded Redmen tacklers until finding Culver in the open and then hitting him.

The Trucker defense limited Bellevue to only one yard net rushing in the second half until the last two plays.

On Bellevue's side of the ledger, Close came mighty "close" to turning back the Truckers and junior guard Joe Siesel was tremendous on defense after missing practice all week. Close returned Norwalk's final kickoff 58 yards to the 22, but the Redmen couldn't get six yards in three carries, losing 12 instead.

Clyde Dumps OH For Second Win

OAK HARBOR—Clyde rolled up all its points in the second period in knocking off Oak Harbor, 22-12, here Friday night in a Sandusky Bay Conference game.
