

At Tiffin Port Clinton Wins 2nd By 16-0 Count

TIFFIN—Veteran backs Dave Pfisterer and John Wilber guided Port Clinton to its second victory in as many starts here Friday night with a 16-0 decision over Tiffin Columbia.

The Redskins turned a pass interception and a fine punt return into touchdowns in handing Columbia its first loss after battling Fostoria to a 12-12 deadlock last Friday.

Jim Jenson's theft of a Tiffin aerial, not only halted a Columbian threat, but started Port Clinton on a long drive covering 80 yards for its first six-pointer.

THE REDSKINS gained possession late in the opening stanza and didn't score until 9:32 remained in the first half. They moved steadily on the ground, picking up six first downs in the drive before Pfisterer cracked over from the two. Wilber added the two points on a pitchout from Pfisterer and it remained that way until the closing minute of the game.

Tiffin decided to punt rather than gamble late in the final quarter deep in its own territory and it turned out that Port Clinton still went on to add insurance points.

St. Mary In 34-14 Setback

Panthers Falter After 14-14 Standoff

A dazzling 90-yard kickoff return and a long drive for another touchdown just before the end of the first half spelled disaster for St. Mary in its season debut Friday night.

John Galati unveiled his young club at Genoa and found several loop holes as his Panthers went down to a 34-14 defeat at the hands of the Northern Lakes League 11.

Paced by a pair of fine running halfbacks, Genoa skirted the Panther ends for huge gains time and time again with Galati stating sadly that "missed assignments" made the Comet task even easier.

St. Mary battled back twice in the first half to knot the score at 6-6 and then again at 14-14, but the third Genoa six-pointer with only eight seconds remaining in the first half killed the locals' hopes. The Comets moved 63 yards in eight plays in beating the clock with most of the yardage coming through the air.

THE PANTHERS were supposed to rely on their defense in early-season games with the inexperience backfield expected to show marked improvement as the campaign progresses.

However, it was just the opposite as the offense clicked several times, but the Comets con-

tinually went wide to set up their scores.

Veterans halfbacks Bob Pelouquin and Wayne Schimming picked up 182 yards rushing between them with 140 of it coming on sweeps after a pitchout from quarterback Roger Hasselbart. Pelouquin, 153-pound senior, gained a net yardage of 110 in 18 attempts with 64 of it coming on five sweeps.

His running mate, 147-pound junior Schimming, carried the ball 10 times and ripped off 72 yards net. However, he advanced a total of 76 yards in six trips around the Panthers ends, while being held to a minus four yards in the other four attempts.

TWO SOPHOMORES showed great promise for St. Mary, however, Galati was well pleased with the efforts of quarterback Dennis Kennedy and halfback Tom Biehl who excelled on defense as well. The latter came up with five

tackles in seven plays from his linebacker spot including four in succession.

Other bright spots were pointed out by Galati who is in his third season at St. Mary, but the weak spots is where Genoa produced most of its scores.

The Panthers certainly knew what was coming up, but just couldn't solve the situation and Galati must make the necessary changes before next Friday's Sandusky Bay Conference opener at Oak Harbor.

GENOA RECEIVED the opening kickoff and drove 76 yards to paydirt in 12 plays with Pelouquin ripping off right tackle for the last six with 7:31 left in the first period. All but six of the yards gained in the march came on sweeps with Schimming racing 19 and 28 in two carries and Pelouquin 23 in his only attempt. Schimming's attempt for the two points failed.

St. Mary knotted the score after an exchange of punts.

Starting on their own 14, the Panthers moved 86 yards in 19 plays despite two illegal procedure penalties and another for holding. Senior halfback Bill Derrick carried six times for 28 yards to put it on the 38. The locals continued to move, but Pierre Amburn fumbled. However, teammate Ed Hiss recovered on the 15 for a four-yard advance and a first down.

A penalty moved the Panthers back to the 20. Amburn failed four to the 16 where Kennedy tossed a perfect strike to Amburn for the equalizer. Kennedy had plenty of time to find the 168-pound senior halfback in the clear deep in the end zone after the latter raced down the left sidelines. Amburn tried to get the twin-pointer, but a pitchout went over his head and it remained 6-6 with 6:34 remaining in the first half.

tions with Pelouquin, the latter skirted left end with a pitchout for 15 to the St. Mary nine on a fourth and two situation. Schimming scored standing up on the very next play when he went wide around right end after taking a pitch from Hasselbart for the score with eight seconds left.

ST. MARY TOOK the second half kickoff and had a fourth and one on Genoa's 41 and were going to try for the needed yardage. However, a delay of game penalty forced Amburn to punt and Schimming returned eight yards to his own 40.

Genoa proceeded to record its fourth touchdown of the night with Pelouquin going the final five on fourth down with four to go.

The Comets traveled 60 yards in 12 plays — all on the ground — with Pelouquin going 26 on three sweeps, circling left end on the touchdown run. Hasselbart's aerial to Jim Johnson for extra points made it 28-14 with 3:15

left in the third stanza.

THE FINAL score came late in the fourth period following a St. Mary punt. Dan Peer returned Amburn's kick 49 yards to the Panther 19, but a clipping penalty moved the ball all the way back to the Genoa 15. However, they still drove 85 yards in 12 plays with Ken Roden picking up 11 and 10 on successive carries.

Pelouquin gained nine and Schimming skirted end for 13 more. Roden got 10 more on another sweep and he came back three plays later to go 11 more giving him a total of 42 in four attempts. Peer got the nod with 1:05 to play and took another pitchout for the final three.

St. Mary started to move in the waning moments of play with Biehl scooting 39 on the final play from scrimmage, breaking into the clear only to be caught from behind.

The Panthers, 32-6 victors over Genoa in last year's opener, didn't give up or even slow down, but they just couldn't halt the Comet express and it was a fatal opener.

38-8 Setback

Willard Walloped By Tiffin Calvert

WILLARD—Tiffin Calvert roared in the second half to spoil Willard's home opener here Friday night, recording a convincing 38-8 triumph over the Flashes.

The score was knotted at 8-8 after the first period, but Calvert held the hosts scoreless the rest of the way while picking up single scores in the second and third periods and then adding two more touchdowns in the final 12 minutes of play.

The Senecas opened the scoring when their fine fullback, Tom Williams, skirted right end for 35 yards and it was 8-0 as Fred Farley caught a pass from Tony Reed for the extra points.

WILLARD CAME right back to knot the count. The Flashes moved steadily with quarterback Mike Jump going over from two yards out and his toss to Charles Hastings made it 8-8.

It was Calvert from here on, however, as Williams blasted over from the one to make it 14-8 by halftime. Reed connected with substitute fullback Paul Leahy in the third period for a 35-yard

touchdown and Williams ran the extra point.

Reed scored the next marker himself, intercepting a Willard pass and racing 44 yards to paydirt with Williams again adding the points after. Sub halfback Jim Betz accounted for the last eight Calvert points in the fourth stanza.

He scampered 15 yards for the score after the Senecas gained possession on Willard's 30 and then cracked over for the twin-pointer. The loss was Willard's first in two outings, while Calvert has a 2-0 mark and 84 points in the twin wins.

Bellevue's youthful football squad surprised coach Lowell Shaffer rolling up a 26-0 win over Fostoria Friday night in a battle of the Redmen.

The Bellevue Redmen scored one touchdown in each quarter and added the two-point conversion after the initial score in chalking up their second triumph. Fostoria Redmen dropped their first game after a 12-12 tie with Tiffin Columbian last week.

Bill Miller racked up two of Bellevue's touchdowns with Marc McClain and Gary Miller getting the others.

BILL MILLER hit paydirt in the first quarter on a three-yard plunge to climax a 55-yard march which took 13 plays. Glenn Miller added the extra points on a quarterback sneak.

Once again it was Bill Miller in the second period, going six yards up the middle for the score as Bellevue drove 65 yards in 20 plays. The try for the extra point failed and it was 14-0 at halftime.

McClain, Bellevue's promising freshman halfback who scored both touchdowns in the Redman's 16-0 victory over Clyde last week, made it No. 3 on the season with a 19-yard run on a reverse to wind up a drive of 68 yards.

THE FINAL touchdown came on a "tackle eligible" play with Gary Miller on the receiving end of an aerial from brother Glenn Miller. This drive covered 90 yards in 14 plays with the touchdown pass good for nine.

Fostoria threatened once, but Joe Siesel halted the threat when he recovered a fumble. The hosts moved to Bellevue's 10 when Grant Jackson raced 70 yards

after catching a pass from Tom McClung, but the Redman fumbled on the next play.

Bellevue's offense was very sharp, rolling up 320 yards to Fostoria's 111, while the defensive unit also turned in a fine job, holding the hosts to just three first downs.
