


# Bellevue Romps Over Galion 46-0 For Second Straight All-Winning Season

## Willard Hands Norwalk 30-0 Licking

Bellevue completed its second perfect season in a row, as expected, Friday, the Redmen lambasting Galion by a 46-0 margin for its 18th straight victory and second undisputed Northern Ohio League grid championship as well.

Lowell Schaffer's defensive squad again sparkled, setting up four touchdowns with two pass interceptions and a pair of fumble recoveries.

In other loop finales, Willard rolled over Norwalk by a 30-0 count; Shelby powdered Bucyrus, 44-0, and Tiffin Columbian smashed Upper Sandusky by a 34-14 margin.

**BELLEVUE'S INITIAL** touchdown came in the first period when fullback Wayne Warden gained 54 yards on 3 successive carries, the last for 26 yards off right guard on a trap play. Ted Rhudy caught a pass from Jim Culler for the PAT.

The Redmen added 24 points in the second stanza with Jack DeLuca intercepting an aerial on the Galion 36 and in 6 plays Marc McClain rambled 20 yards on a reverse for the score. Culler passed to DeLuca for the bonus points.

Minutes later, veteran guard Joe Siesel picked off another Tiger aerial attempt, and the 188-pound all-around performer scored the first touchdown of his career by going 36 yards. Warden's run for the PAT made it 24-0.

Galion fumbled later in the period and DeLuca recovered this one on the Tiger 36. Three plays later Culler tossed a scoring strike to McClain covering 35 yards, and the same combination added the extra points to make it 32-0 at intermission.

**IN THE THIRD** quarter, Galion gambled on its own 27 with a fourth-down pass, but it was

foiled by the Redmen who scored 5 plays later when Culler abided right end on a keeper from 7 yards out.

Once again DeLuca was there to take advantage of another Galion fumble later in the canto. On the second play after taking over on the 30, Culler, clicked with

fullback Ted Rhudy for 24 yards and then pitched to McClain for the PAT.

Bellevue's "wrecking crew" of fullback Warden, halfbacks Rhudy and McClain and quarterback Culler picked up 395 yards in total offense. Counting yards gained on passes hauled in as well as yards

netted rushing, McClain collared 138. Warden 124 with Rhudy 86.

**WILLARD NAILED** its third season win against 5 defeats and a deadlock with Galion by scoring 14 points in the second quarter and 8 in each of the last two periods.

The first six-pointer came with

9:04 left in the second stanza as Scott Swamer capped a short 40-yard drive with a jaunt of 4 yards from his quarterback post and Dan Silcox added the bonus points.

Later in the stanza, fullback Jim Durbin passed to Don Smoak for 86 yards on the second

play after a Trucker punt and it was 14-0 with 3:28 left in the half.

Arpos Bolen accounted for the other Crimson Flashes touchdowns, plunging over for 3 yards out in the third quarter and going over from the 1 in the final canto.

The fleet-footed halfback gained an even 100 yards in 13 carries and set up his initial marker with a 37-yard gain in the play before he slipped into the end zone from the 2.

**THE LAST** score was set up by Bill Weiss, who intercepted a Norwalk pass from his linebacker spot and returned 32 yards to the 8.

Norwalk never was inside Willard's 20, and netted just 61 yards rushing compared to 205 for the winners.

The Truckers finished their season with a 3-6 mark and managed just a pair of conference wins in 7 starts.

**SHELBY CLINCHED** the runnerup spot behind Bellevue for the second year running with an easy win over Bucyrus.

The Whippets scored twice in every quarter but the third.

Jim Henkel returned the opening kickoff 86 yards for a score and Bill Wilkins' club was off and running after last week's 6-6 setback at the hands of the champions.

Bill Baldrige passed for touchdowns to Bill Ansbach and Jim Blair, each covering 15 yards, while Dennis Gates plunged over from the 1 and 3 in the second period and giant tackle Mike Lake accounted for the last teedee with a 28-yard run after a pass interception.

**TIFFIN COLUMBIAN** scored all of its points before Upper Sandusky hit paydirt to wind up third in the loop with a 5-2 record and close out its season 6-3.

Tom Young picked up a pair of touchdowns, racing 30 yards for the last marker after hauling in a pass from Skip Bozarth for 14 yards to account for the initial Tornadoe tally.

Bozarth also pitched a scoring strike for 44 yards to Paul Assenheimer, and scampered 23 yards on a run, while Tony Simpson's 22-yard dash accounted for the other points.

Upper Sandusky tallied when fullback John Rothe plunged over from the 1, and on the last play of the game Bob Wolfe connected for 44 yards on a pass to Bob Miller.

# Huron's Sixth Loss 32-8 Belting From New London

New London jumped off to a quick lead and went on record as a 32-3 Lakeland Conference triumph over visiting Huron Friday night, with the Wildcats exploding for three of their touchdowns from long range.

The hosts collared their initial marker in the first two minutes of play, added another later in the opening period and enjoyed a commanding 24-0 lead by halftime.

New London raised its season record to 4-5 and collared its fourth LC win in six outings, while Huron now stands at 2-6-1 on the season and 1-4-1 in the conference.

The Tigers have now lost as many games this season as they did in the previous six years under Paul Greene. Huron entered the campaign with a glittering 47-4-1 mark and all of a sudden Greene's mark is now 49-12-2.

**THE WILDCATS MARCHED** with the opening kickoff to score with halfback Al Grilley breaking loose for 41 yards with 10:07 left and Doug Randleman added the PAT.

Later in the quarter, New London struck through the air as veteran quarterback Tony Kirkpatrick connected with end Dick Marschall for 53 yards, Marschall hauling in the aerial off the 38 and dashing the rest of the way. Grilley ran for the bonus points and it was 16-0.

With time running out in the first half, Huron was forced to punt and Grilley picked up the boot on his own 25 and proceeded to race 75 yards into the end zone and Randleman hiked the margin to 24-0.

**HURON'S LONE TALLY** came in the third stanza when fullback Tom Koehler climaxed a long drive by plunging over from the 1. Jim Cunningham passed to Terry Harmon for the PAT.

The Wildcats scored again in the final stanza when Bill Damron cracked up the middle from 11 yards out and Scott Staschke followed with the two-point conversion.

New London gained 242 yards rushing and hit on 2 of 10 passes for 73 additional yards, while Huron managed just 78 yards on the ground and failed to connect on any of its 12 aerial attempts.
