## Young Pro Golfer In Slim Lead

SEATTLE (AP) — Raymond Floyd, a 21-year-old Carolinian with a soft draw and hard muscles, powered his way into first place Saturday in the \$35,000 Seattle Open golf tournament by firing a third-round 66, six-under-par.

The sparkling round, which started with an eagle 3, gave Floyd 201 for 54 holes.

Bobby Nichols of Corona, Calif., remained just one stroke off the pace with a 68, but Stan Leonard of Canada, Friday's leader, skidded to a 205 when he could only match par despite an eagle 3 on the final hole.

### DOW IN THIRD

Moving into third place was Dow Finsterwald, whose 66 matched Floyd's as the day's best round. It gave him a 204 for three rounds.

Larry Mowry of Bonita, Calif., posted his third successive 69 and tied Billy Casper at 207. Casper had a 70.

Few of the 8,500 spectators were in the right spot to see the day's most dramatic shot, a 216-yard hole-in-one worth \$10,000 for Phil Rodgers of Perdido Bay, Fla. Rodgers hit a three-iron on the payoff eighth hole. He had a 71 for his round.

Floyd, from Fayetteville, N. C., hits the ball as far off the tee as most of the famed big hitters. It was his putting, however, that brought him home ahead. He sank a 60-footer for his eagle, one birdie putt of 25 feet and another of 15.

Studley said the Bearcats need some polishing before they play their first game next Saturday against Drake.

The Indians took a 2-0 lead on a run-producing triple by Fred Whitfield in the fourth and a bases-empty homer by Outfielder Bob Chance in the fifth, but two errors by Short-stop Larry Brown and one by Max Alvis helped the Angels to a 3-2 lead.

Angel winning pitcher Dean Chance, now 12-17, beat out a dribbler to third base in the fifth inning, and Albie Pearson followed with a bunt-single to third. Alvis' throw on the bunt was wild, permitting Chance to score and Pearson to advance to third. Jim Fregosi drove in Pearson with a sacrifice fly.

## Hot Streak Wins Title For Beman

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Steady Deane Beman defeated an erratic Dick Sikes 2-and-1 Saturday in a tense 36-hole final for the United States Amateur Golf Championship.

The 25-year-old Bethesda, Md., insurance man, never flustered despite a puny drive that cost him the first hole, annexed his second national title mainly because of a five-hole winning streak that started late in the morning round and carried over into the afternoon.

However, it was his trusty putter that brought him a birdie on the 32nd hole from 18 feet and closed any chances that Sikes might have had of staging a late rally.

### TURNABOUT

The five-hole surge lifted Beman from 3 down to 2 up over Sikes, the National Collegiate king from Arkansas, who eight times drove off the fairway before lunch and then fought a balky putter most of the way in the day's second trip over the wooded hills of the Wakonda Club's 6,896 yards.

Beman first won the U. S. Amateur in 1960, a year after he had taken the British title.

The restless Sikes, who charges from tee to green like a fireman answering a general alarm, looked headed for a runaway before Beman started his five-hole rally on the 15th by sinking a 10-foot birdie putt.
