

Massillon High Rolls Over Tygers, 38 To 0

Early Breaks Give Tigers Two Scores

MASSILLON — Massillon Washington High School rebounded from its surprise defeat by Akron Garfield last week to roll over Mansfield Senior High here last night, 38-0.

Washington High (2-1) took advantage of the breaks to score two quick touchdowns in the first quarter and then added one in the second and two in the third to send the Tygers to their second loss in three engagements before a sparse crowd of 8,731.

The powerful Northern Ohio League completed its first round of loop action on four fronts last night with Bucyrus, Tiffin Columbian, Willard and Bellevue scoring victories.

Bucyrus won its third straight game, edging Shelby (0-3), 16-14 as Willard (3-0) dropped Norwalk (1-1-1), 24-14.

Galion (1-1-1) tumbled to Bellevue (3-0), 38-6 and Tiffin Columbian (2-1) handed Upper Sandusky its first loss in three starts, 24-14.

NORWALK — Willard High School had to come from behind twice in winning over Norwalk.

Rick Kohlmyer scored the first and third touchdowns of the game for Norwalk on runs of 10 and 31 yards. The second score was authored by Willard's Bill Albright on a carry of 10 yards, ending a 73-yard push.

SHELBY — The Bucyrus Redmen spoiled 'Parents' Night' for the Shelby Whippets for their first victory since 1958.

Parents of the Whippet gridders marched in with their sons during pre-game ceremonies and had special seats.

The Whippets stunned the Redmen by scoring the first touchdown. Halfback Larry Baldrige carried the ball over for the final seven yards with 9:31 left in the second period.

Seven minutes later, Redman halfback Bill Boutague plunged the final five yards for the first of his two touchdowns.

Early in the fourth quarter, Bucyrus scored again on a seven-yard pass from Brinkman to Montague.

Bucyrus recovered a Shelby fumble on the seven-yard line set the stage for Brinkman to run the final yard to score.

Baldrige scored again from Bucyrus' three-yard line with only three minutes remaining in the game.

In the closing minutes, Shelby again regained possession of the ball when Bucyrus had to punt, but could not penetrate beyond Bucyrus' 31-yard line.

Clear Fork Colts Stampede Dennison

BELLVILLE — The Clear Fork Colts swept to their third consecutive football victory here last night, romping over Dennison St. Mary's in a 28-0 high school contest.

Halfback Dave Meeks opened the Clear Fork scoring barrage with a three-yard plunge in the initial quarter. The Colts then added one touchdown in each of the final three periods.

All of Clear Fork's scores came on runs of five yards or less with John Holler pouring in twice from the five and three-yard lines respectively.

Clear Fork buried St. Mary's in the yardage department, piling up 278 total yards and holding Dennison to 82. The Colts turned in 19 first downs, St. Mary's managed only four.

Peterson's Ideas Pay Off

When Florida State hired Bill Peterson (former Mansfield (Ohio) high school coach) from Louisiana State three years ago, one of the first things he did was corral Tensi and swift Fred Bletnikoff.

From LSU he brought the three-plateon system. Both proved good moves.

The 6-foot-5 Tensi overshadowed Miami All-America George Mira and Peterson proved that the three-plateon system can be worked effectively in spite of new substitution rules.

Tensi passed to Bletnikoff for two first-half touchdowns, covering 23 and 17 yards. And Bletnikoff, a flanker back who last year played end, picked off one of Mira's passes and returned it 99 yards for another touchdown before 57,988. Tensi completed 13 of 20 passes.

At New Orleans, the highly considered Longhorns led only 3-0 at halftime but finally wore down Tulane, which lost its 12th straight. Shoeless kicker Tony Crosby kicked field goals of 27 and 31 yards and Phil Harris scored touchdowns on plunges of one and two yards before 18,000.

The Panthers outclassed the Bruins in the intersectional contest with 28,095 in Pitt rolled up 27 first downs to the UCLA's six. Rick Leeson scored one touchdown and kicked field goals of 27 and 31 yards to personally wreck the West Coast club.

GALION — Galion broke off to the initial touchdown, crossing the goal line at 8:05 in the first period. From that point on, however, it was all Bellevue.

Speedster halfback Marc McClain got the ball rolling for the Redmen on the next set of plays, collecting a 60-yard sprint at 6:40.

After an eight-yard TD ramble by Fullback Tom Lopeman in the second period, McClain followed with his second scoring romp, a four-yard spurt.

Lopeman matched McClain in touchdown points, adding his second in the final quarter, preceded by a 10-yard run.

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
