

Malabar High Falls Before Springfield, 22 To 14

Lorain High Rally Sinks Mansfield, 20-16

Long Drive Drops Falcons To Defeat

Springfield Township turned an intercepted pass and one of Malabar's four fumbles into touchdowns here last night on its way to a 22-14 football victory.

Springfield's third touchdown came on a 15-play, 58-yard march and annexed its fifth win against one loss and a tie before 3,500. The long drive broke a 14-14 deadlock in the fourth period.

Malabar, in spite of its fumbling and misguided handoffs, put together scoring drives in the second and third quarters to tie the game twice before falling for the sixth time against one win and a tie.

John Linta and Gene Hart scored for Malabar with Cliff Stevens, Bob Maclaren and Joe Pacuit getting touchdowns for Springfield.

Maclaren hammered out 120 of Springfield's 218 yards rushing and this plus three fumble recoveries by Jerry Lintart kept the Falcons in trouble most of the night.

Springfield turned over the football on the first series of downs but got it back two plays later when Hart's pass was intercepted. Springfield scored in nine plays with Stevens, going the last yard.

On fourth and three, Maclaren gained a much needed first-down with a 16-yard run to the one-yard line.

Maclaren started its next drive on its own 30 after a sparkling 22-yard kickoff run-back by Bill Williams. It moved to the five-yard line in nine plays which included a 47-yard toss from Hart to Jim Brown but Hart fumbled on the five and Sam Arbuthnot recovered for Springfield.

LINTA SCORES
Springfield got to the 16-yard line then punted. Malabar tallied in nine plays to end a 40-yard drive with Linta scoring from five yards out to tie the score.

The Falcons ran four plays after the second half kickoff and fumbled on the 31 which was recovered by Lintart. Springfield scored in four plays as Maclaren sprinted off tackle for 30 yards and the score. This was in the first three minutes of the third quarter.

HAULED DOWN
Malabar came back to tie the score with 1:15 in the third frame. Hart scampered three yards for the score. Two plays earlier Hart had sprinted 44 yards to the six-yard line, only to be caught by Maclaren from behind.

Springfield started its winning touchdown drive on the following kickoff. Pacuit ended it with six minutes remaining, going four yards for the score to cap a 58-yard drive. A 23-yard pass from Stevens to Dale Robinson on a third down and 20 play set up the winning score.

Wooster Stops Rams, 22-6

WOOSTER — The Mansfield Madison Rams were stopped here last night as the Wooster Generals snapped off a 22-6 Cardinal Conference football victory.

The Generals (4-4 overall and 3-2 in CC) had to wait until the second quarter to score. Fullback Ben Mitchell muscled across the goal line from two yards out for the touchdown.

14-0 LEAD
Not settling for an eight-point advantage Quarterback Randy Snow pushed the Generals to a 14-0 lead with 2:07 left. The first touchdown came on a 47-yard drive in nine plays and the second after 67 yards and 12 trips to the scrimmage line.

Madison (1-6-1 and 1-4) came through on the first play of the final quarter, having set up a second and nine situation on the Wooster 10-yard line. At that point, Rams quarterback Gene Kemper unleashed one of his

third touchdown, counted by Mitchell again from the one. Madison set up another possible score in the final period when Tackle Jim Gadd dropped on a fumble by Snow on the General, 28. The Rams drove to the 16 on five plays but were halted by the fine Wooster defense.

Ashland's Arrows Puncture Dover Defenses, 30 To 6

DOVER — Ashland High School footballers ripped apart the Dover Tornados' defense for 22 points in the last quarter here last night to win the Cardinal Conference championship, 30-6.

Jim Minnich and Roosevelt Robinson rambled for two touchdowns each to spearhead the Ashland assault.

ASHLAND won its eighth straight football game and sixth in the conference. Dover is 6-1-1 and 4-1 in the league. Last season, Ashland tied with Mansfield Madison and Wooster for the CC title.

With 2:03 in the half, Minnich got the first of his two TD's plunging for a half a yard to end a 51-yard drive. Ashland was ahead to stay, 8-0.

Dover tallied in the third quarter when End Don Ammiller scored on a nine-yard run to finish a 77-yard, 14-play drive.

THE ARROWS, who pounded out 216 yards on the ground, got their offense in high gear in the last frame. Robinson ended a 61-yard drive on the eighth play with a three-yard TD sprint.

Ray Leonard intercepted a pass on the Dover 32-yard stripe and two plays later Curtiss also followed up a 49-yard run by Halfback Dave Meeks with a 21-yard scoring jaunt.

The Colts amassed 345 yards on the ground and Curtiss completed two passes of three attempts for 20 yards. Clear Fork totaled 15 first downs while a tremendous defensive effort clamped Danville to one.

Clear Fork coach, Bill Frazier, said, "We are very pleased with our defensive efforts. The boys have all been doing outstanding jobs."

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Tygers Score 16 In First Quarter

LORAIN — Completely thwarting Mansfield Senior High in the second half, Lorain roared from behind to gain a 20-16 Parent's Night football victory before 3,000 fans here last night.

Mansfield (3-5) flashed a potent ground offensive to sail into a 18-8 lead in the first quarter but mounted only one other threat in the Buckeye Conference game. Lorain (6-3) built its Buckeye record to three wins and two losses while Mansfield is 2-3.

Tony Schuener made his first Tyger touchdown a monumental one when he scored on the first play from scrimmage. The junior halfback was sprung loose on a power sweep from his own 34-yard line. After his blockers gave him running room, the 155-yard track hurdler simply outraced the secondary the rest of the way on a 66-yard journey.

Mansfield's other play came on the final play of the first quarter when Kerry Dean, junior quarterback, broke over from the three. Jim Dougherty had intercepted a Jim Jones pass on the 34 and three plays later tossed a 18-yard pass to Dave Hutchins for a first down on the 12. Ron Parr cracked to the five, Hutchins hit to the three and Dean finished it.

LORAIN scored once in the first quarter and twice in the third with Gary Maxwell, Warren Lance and Jim Jones, a sparkling running quarterback, doing the honors.

Mansfield outgained Lorain in net yardage, 281 to 215 yards, but 143 of the yards came in the first quarter.

The Tygers lost Center Phil Horvath with a split hand in the first half and he sat out the rest of the game. It took five stitches to close the wound.

Senior High coach Jim Dougherty again alternated three quarterbacks. They completed six of nine passes for 75 yards.

THREE of the completions came in a desperate race with the close at the tag end of the first half. The Tygers took over on their 18 for four minutes left and seven ground plays advanced the ball 40 yards. The longest run was a 13-yard dash by Ralph Sewell.

With 40 seconds left, Dean threw 17 yards to Hutchins, and then five yards to Joe Prats. On the final play of the period, Dougherty completed a 15-yard strike to Hutchins for a first down on the five. The half ended before the ball could be put in play again.

LORAIN marched 66 yards on 11 plays for its first score, 61 yards on five plays for the second and 39 yards on nine plays for the third. Longest Lorain touchdown run was the 35 yarder by Lance for the second score. The 166-pound senior hit up the middle and swung wide after passing the line of scrimmage to race past surprised Bengals.

The quick-reacting Jones led all ball carriers with 92 net yards on 22 efforts. Schuener, who sat out much of the game with a slight injury, gained 68 on two trips and Hawthorne raced 51 yards for Mansfield on eight carries.

Sandusky last night maintained its half-game lead over Elyria in defense of its Buckeye title.

The Blue Streaks (4-0-1 and 7-0-1) cut down the Fremont Ross Little Giants (2-3 and 2-6), 34-0; Elyria (4-1 and 6-2) defeated Marion Harding (1-4 and 3-5), 20-0 and Findlay (2-2-1 and 4-2-2) and Lorain Admiral King (1-4 and 2-6), 14-6.
