Jim Bouton, a 24-year-old refugee from the bullpen who was moved up to starting duty in mid-May and became a 21-game winner, Don Drysdale as the managers switch to right-handers for the third game Saturday at Dodger Stadium in Chavez Ravine, Friday will be an open date for travel.

The schedule calls for the first two games at New York, a day off, the next three at Los Angeles, another three at New York. All this will end, of course, when one team wins four. Game time each day is 1 p. m. (local time).

Plum's On Spot Against Chicago

The Detroit Lions and the New York Giants should learn from their quarterbacks Sunday whether this is to be a compelling season in the National Football League or a disappointing season.

Milt Plum of the Lions is a man on the spot in Sunday's game-of-the-week against the Chicago Bears in Detroit.

Just how serious is 36-year-old Y. A. Tittle's nagging chest injury in their game against the Eagles at Philadelphia.

In another of this week-end's leading games, the surprising St. Louis Cardinals seek their third straight victory, against the Steelers at Pittsburgh.

The Cleveland Browns, who like the Bears and Cards have a 2-0 record, are at home to the Los Angeles Rams; the champion Green Bay Packers are host to the Baltimore Colts; the Washington Redskins play their home opener against the Dallas Cowboys, and the San Francisco Forty Niners meet the Vikings at Minnesota.

The Bears - Lions game shapes up, as a battle of two rugged defenses, despite the fact that Detroit was clobbered last weekend by Green Bay, 31-10. The Bears yielded only 10 points in their wins over the Packers and Vikings. They have not won their first three games since 1948.

Plum had a wretched Sunday against the Packers, completing only five of 21 passes, and the old rap that he is not a championship quarterback once again is being heard. It won't help matters Sunday that Gail Coghill and Terry Barr, his two best receivers, are hobbled by leg injuries.

The Giants say that Tittle will be back Sunday against Philadelphia, and a moment too soon. They spent a miserable afternoon waiting in taking a 31-0 pasting at Pittsburgh.

Jurgens quarterback Sonny Erglen is capable of matching Tittle's bomb protection may suffer from the loss of guards Jim Skaags and Howard Keys.

Cleveland, with Jimmy Brown on an early rampage, should breeze to their third straight win, against the Rams, but the Cards face a toughie in Pittsburgh.

Quarterback Charlie Johnson has done a remarkable job in producing touchdowns with Joe Childress the only genuine running threat. The Cards first two wins at Dallas and at Philadelphia have been unsets.

The Packers have proved a ground - begging team that controlled the ball superbly against the Giants Fullback John Henry Johnson can become the NFL's fifth 5,000-yard rusher if he gains 82 against the Cards. Pittsburgh has won one and tied one.

The Packers once again are physically sound and should have no trouble against the Colts, who have lost pass-catcher Ray Perry for more than a month because of a relocated shoulder. Lenny Moore's recovery may see limited action for Baltimore.

The four teams that have not yet won a game, Los Angeles, Philadelphia, Dallas and San Francisco, all are underdog underdogs.

The Cowboys if they can tighten their halfbacks porous defense, have a fair chance of upsetting the Redskins, although the Fortyniners are not likely to beat the Vikings.
