

Clevelanders Spoil Tyger Home Opener, 16-0

Fullback Ron Parr Suffers Broken Leg

Fullback Joe Pledger blasted into the end zone twice on short plunges last night as Cleveland East spoiled the Mansfield Senior High home football opener at Arlin Field, 16-0.

The 187-pound senior scored from five yards out in the second quarter and moved in from the two in the third period before a sparse turnout of 4,000. A light drizzle fell during the game as East won for only the fourth time in 20 games with the Tygers.

The Tygers exhibited little offensive push, gaining only 19 yards in the first half and 32 in the second. Mansfield (0-2) ran 27 plays from scrimmage for its 51 yards while East had the ball on 59 plays and totaled 247 yards against the massive Tyger defensive unit.

So puncheon were the Tyger drive which gave East its final touchdown, Pledger carried on downs and had the ball in Cleveland East territory only twice all evening. Once they recovered a fumble and gained nine yards in four plays to the 39. East played ball control for the final 11 minutes, marching 59 yards on 18 plays to run out the clock. It advanced the ball to the Tyger 23 as the gun sounded.

The Tygers suffered a tremendous blow in the third quarter when Ron Parr, the outstanding senior fullback, suffered a broken left leg. The 200-pound star had just churned five yards through the East forwards when the injury occurred.

ALL EVEN

An eight-play, 73-yard march at the outset of the second quarter gave East the only score it needed to even its 1964 record at one win and one defeat. (Cleveland had lost to Massillon Washington last week, 16-0).

Ray Holliday touched off that drive by passing 22 yards to Louis Simmons after a Dave Hutchins punt came to rest on the East 23. Pledger carried on five of the next seven plays as the East infantry rolled right down the field. Fleet Bob Haynes, who did not play in the second half because of an injury, carried the other two times and gained 23 of the yards.

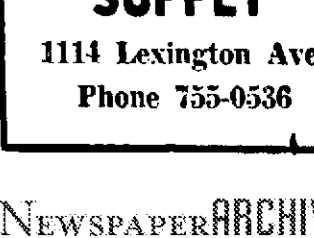
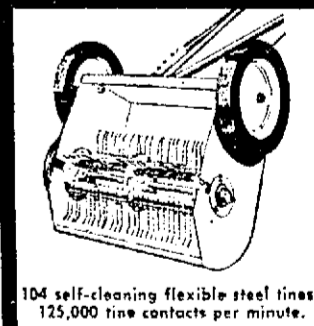
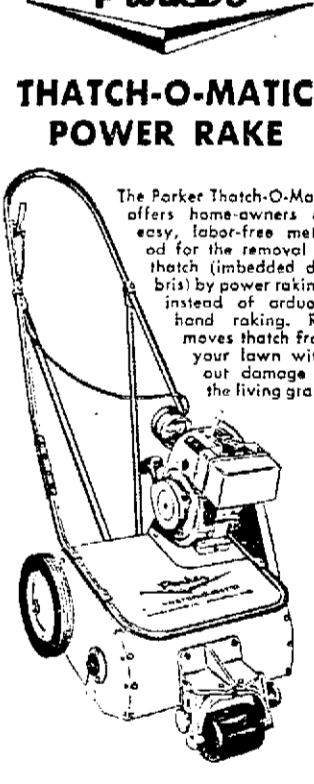
