## Olympians Battle To Pro Draw

The first battle of the Olympians, between Lucius Jackson and Jim "Bad News" Barnes, is history.

It's also a draw. Jackson, the Pan American U. S. star who signed with the Philadelphia 76ers, and Barnes, the Texas Western standout who went with the New York Knicks, played on the victorious U. S. team at the Tokyo Olympic Games.

Friday night they were on different sides, each scoring seven points on three baskets and a foul.

Barnes, however, was in the line-up as the Knicks pulled away in the closing minutes for a 94-90 victory that left them in third place in the Eastern Division of the National Basketball Association while the 76ers fell into last place.

ROYALS WIN  
In other games, Boston's undefeated Celtics ran their string to seven in a row by walloping Detroit 106-90 behind Sam Jones' 22nd point effort and Cincinnati edged St. Louis 119-118 as Oscar Robertson scored 39 points, including the decisive points.

Jackson had made his NBA debut Tuesday, scoring 10 points. But this was Barnes' first shot at the pros.

Wilson Signs With Royals  
CINCINNATI (AP) — The Cincinnati Royals No. 1 draft choice George Wilson, former University of Cincinnati star, signed his contract with the National Basketball Association team.

Wilson signed before the Royals with St. Louis in Cincinnati Gardens. Cincinnati won 119-118 but Wilson did not see action.

Wilson, 6-foot-8, returned this week from the Olympic games. He was a member of the United States basketball squad and won a Gold Medal.
