Prexies Fall To Mansfield, 20-6

Mansfield spotted Marion Harding a 6-0 lead then came up with three big plays which resulted in touchdowns in pinning a 20-6 setback on the host Presidents Friday in a Buckeye Conference scrap.

Marion drove 60 yards in 15 plays following the opening kickoff to grab an early lead.

Sparked by the running of quarterback Jim Ferguson, the Prexies moved to Mansfield's 20 and Ferguson slammed over However the PAT attempt failed.

THE TYGERS tied the score at 6-6 in the final seconds of the first half. Tony Schruener intercepted a Marion pass and returned 26 yards to midfield. Dave Hutchins rambled 25 yards to the 25 on the first play. After three plays netted just five yards, Dave Clem connected on a fourth down touchdown pass to Terry Swann in the end zone with just 10 seconds left in the half.

Hutchings set up the second marker when he rambled 52 yards with a Marion punt to the host's 27 midway through the third stanza. Four plays later Junior Parr boiled over from 7 yards out and it was 12-6.

Errors Hurt Plymouth In JAC Reversal

Northmor turned a fumble recovery and pass interception into touchdowns in handing Plymouth its sixth setback in seven starts by a 22-6 margin Friday.

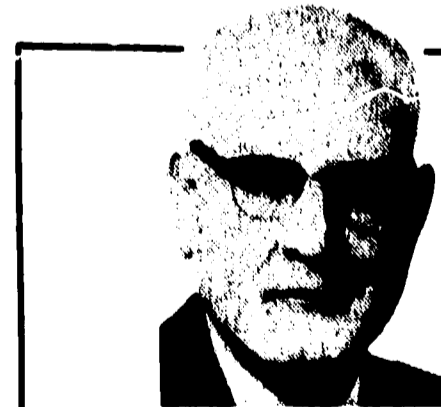
The visitors scored twice in the second period and both clubs collared touchdowns in the final quarter.

Olympic Games Vindication By U.S.

TOKYO (UPI) — The costliest Olympic games in history came to a close today before an emotional throng of 80,000 shortly after the final event of a 14-day athletic carnival in which the United States made its best showing since 1952.

Soviet Strength Slips; Mexico City Next

As the Olympic torch was extinguished and the Olympic flag lowered in the deepening twilight of an overcast day, the electric scoreboard flashed "sayanara" and then "meet again in Mexico in 1968."

Emperor Hirohito, patron of the games, looked on from the imperial box and frequently saluted during the earlier parade under the floodlights while many of original 5,541 competitors marched past under the flags of their nations.

Browns, Giants Match Troubles

CLEVELAND (UPI) — The Cleveland Browns, seeking to end a title famine that started in 1957, take on the New York Giants before another sellout crowd Sunday in a game that could go a long way towards deciding the Eastern Division champion.

The Browns, off to another fast start, go into the game with four victories, one tie and a single loss while the Giants, the defending division champions, have lost four of their six games and won one.

The game marks the halfway point in the National Football League season and is extremely important for each team. If the Browns win, they will be 5-1 going into the gruelling second half of the season when they must play St. Louis, Pittsburgh, Detroit and Green Bay. The Browns and St. Louis are currently tied for the division lead while the Giants are in sixth place.

Injuries hinder Browns The New Yorkers need a victory to retain a slim chance of holding onto their crown. Another loss would knock the Giants out of contention since they would be four games behind the Browns with only seven contests left.

Both teams have a variety of problems. The Browns have been unable to do much on offense in their last two games. They lost to the Pittsburgh Steelers in a one-sided game and narrowly defeated Dallas when Bernie Parrish intercepted a pass late in the game and ran 54 yards for the winning touchdown.

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI) — Leading distaff money winner Mickey Wright today teed off in the third round of the Ladies Professional Golfers Association \$11,000 Phoenix Open with the inside track to the winner's circle.

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France and Germany won gold medals in the final two events today in equestrian jumping. Pierre Jonquiere S. Doriola, a 44-year-old Frenchman, won the individual gold medal and Germany won the team prize.

Germany Gets Medal The team gold medal went to Germany with 68.50 points to 77.75 for France and 88.50 for Italy.

For the Americans, the 1968 games brought both vindication and unexpected success. For the Russians, there was bitter disappointment as certain of its aging athletes failed to withstand the rising pressure of other nations.

The U.S. led Russia in gold medals, 36-30, for the first time since 1952. Russia led in total gold, silver and bronze medals for the third straight time but its narrow margin of 96-90 was a surprise. Russia led the Americans at Rome, 103-71.

Along the way, the U.S. regained the two sprint championships it lost at Rome with big Bob Hayes of Florida A. and M. winning the 100 meters and Henry Carr of Detroit flying through to victory in the 200.

In addition, Bob Schul of Dayton, Ohio, and Billy Mills of Coffeyville, Kans., became the first American winners in history at 5,000 meters and 10,000 meters respectively.

Americans won 12 gold medals in men's track and two in women's track with sprinters Wyomia Tyus of Griffin, Ga. (100 meters) and Edith McGuire of Atlanta (200 meters) scoring.

Rhodes dashed 58 yards for the first marker and quarterback Bob Smith clicked on a 33-yard scoring strike to Mike Knapp for a 16-0 lead in the opening stanza. St. Joe also added 16 points in the third canto.

Beier cracked over from 3 and 1 yard out in the period and Rhodes completed the romp with a 25-yard dash following a 72-yard pass from Carl Zalar to Joe Clarke midway in the final canto for the host Senecas.

Calvert was held to just 29 net yards rushing in 31 tries, but gained 142 yards in the air on seven completions in 14 tosses.

Seventh-rated Elyria pulled the real stunner, walloping third-ranked Sandusky, 32-6. In the other game, eighth-place Upper Arlington edged past 10th-ranked Mount Vernon, 14-12, coming from behind with a touchdown in the final minutes to snap the latter's 19-game winning streak.
