

# 70 Points St. Mary's Mark

Beware, members of the Sandusky Bay Conference! There is an upstart in your midst who plans to take the 1965 crown by pass or rush.

Oak Harbor became Sandusky St. Mary's third victim Saturday night as the Panthers obliterated the Rocket defense for 38 points in the fourth quarter and a game total of 70 points to a big, fat 0 for the opponents.

**IN THE PROCESS, ST. MARY'S** established a new school scoring record, notched its first SBC win of the season, and remained unbeaten. The fantastic total snapped the single game scoring record of 61 set in 1955 against Lakeside.

But the game was actually closer than the final score indicates.

## 16-0 At Halftime!

It was the pin-point passing of Panther quarterback Dan Brady and the talented hands of senior end Eddie Higgins that established the victory.

Brady passed to Higgins for two touchdowns Saturday and it was the second one that broke the Rockets back and the jinx that Oak Harbor has held over the locals.

This win broke a string of losses and ties at the hands of Oak Harbor that stretched over seven seasons.

**THE ROCKETS, WHO HAVEN'T YET** scored this season

in three losses, gave the Panthers all they wanted on the first drive of the contest.

Taking the opening kickoff, Oak Harbor, sparked by the rollout option plays of slippery quarterback Billy Simpkins, drove from its own 29 to the St. Mary's 17 in 13 plays, consuming over half of the first period.

But Horst Maczuga trapped Simpkins seven yards behind the line of scrimmage and a desperation pass on fourth down was no good and St. Mary's took over—and never let go.

With big Mike Lical and Gene Weyer working the ends and tackles, St. Mary's marched to the OH 26, where Brady went back to pass and hit senior end Horst Maczuga in the end zone for the TD with 2:01 remaining in the quarter. The same combination scored the points after.

**AFTER AN OAK HARBOR SERIES** and a punt, St. Mary's took over again and mounted a 66-yard drive that took 13 plays, with the key maneuver a 28-yard pass gain from Brady to Higgins.

With fourth and three at the three, Brady, who connected on the first four passes he threw, found Higgins all alone in the right corner of the end zone and hit him with a spiral for the score.

Again Brady and Higgins connected for the conversion. The half ended five minutes later at 16-0 with neither team coming close to a score.

**THREE PLAYS AFTER THE** second half opening kickoff, St. Mary's scored again with Brady breaking up the middle and streaking 44 yards for a touchdown. Butch Weyer belted in for the two-point conversion.

Another Oak Harbor series, and St. Mary's was at it again, scoring this time in four plays. Brady threw again to Higgins, and Eddie Higgins made the play of the game.

Actually the pass was closer to the Oak Harbor defender than Higgins, but the senior end went through the defender, batted the pass into the air and caught it as he fell on his back.

After that it was easy as water falling off a duck's back.


**IN THE FOURTH QUARTER,** St. Mary's took possession of the pigskin five times and scored each time.

Scoring came (in order) on a sparkling 21-yard jaunt by Weyer, a spectacular 21-yard sprint by sophomore George Maczuga, a 23-yard sprint by junior quarterback Dick Wiesler on a beautiful fake, an eight-yard run around end by Denny Fitz, and a five-yard pass from Brady to Jack Kerker in the waning moments of the ball game.

Fitz ran for conversions after three TD's, and Brady hit junior Dick Kerber with a pass for the last two-point score.

**ST. MARY'S WAS CLEARLY** superior in every department, picking up more than 500 yards total offense, including 385 on the ground.

Another outstanding effort came from junior Jeff Davie who scooped up three Oak Harbor fumbles in the second half.

## Exonerated Loafer Top Twins Hero

**Versalles Shows Great Value In 2-1 Sunday Flag-Clincher**

The Minnesota Twins, who bulldozed their way through the American League to their first pennant, were sparked all along the route by a guy who was fined \$300 in spring training for not hustling.

The exonerated loafer is Zoilo Versalles, the Twins' Havana-born shortstop who leads the league in two departments and is tied for the lead in two others.

Versalles scored one run and drove in the other Sunday to put the Twins into the World Series with a 2-1 victory over the Washington Senators.

The Chicago White Sox pounded the corpse of the New York Yankees again 5-3, the Baltimore Orioles rallied in the ninth to beat the California Angels 2-1, Kansas City edged Boston 2-1 and Cleveland pounded Detroit 7-1, after the Tigers took the first game 2-1 in other American League games.

**NL Action**  
In the National League the Los Angeles Dodgers moved into a first place tie with San Francisco with a 1-0 victory over St. Louis while the Giants bowed 3-2 to Milwaukee, the Phillies defeated the Mets 5-4, Pittsburgh dropped Chicago 5-3 and Cincinnati lost a chance to gain on the leaders by losing 4-2 to Houston.

Jim Kaat struck out 10 batters and walked none in posting his 17th victory against 11 defeats.

Versalles' 124 runs scored and 300 total bases top the league, his 44 doubles tie him with Boston's Carl Yastrzemski and his 12 triples deadlock him with Kansas City's Bert Campaneris. The Twins' sparkplug has 18 home runs and 73 runs batted in while batting leadoff. Not bad for a man who has no one on base the first time he comes to the plate every day.

**Respectable Average**  
He has played in 156 games. The Twins have played 157. His .271 batting average is respectable, coming on 178 hits.

Most Valuable Player this year? Probably.

The Twins now can sit back and wait for the close National League race to provide them with a World Series opponent.

"It really doesn't make any difference to us which team wins the National League pennant," said Twins manager Sam Mele, who fined Versalles last spring. "My prediction is the same as I made for the team...we're ready for anybody."

All this was said in a shout Sunday. Mele was in the midst of a traditional champagne vic-tory (Continued on Page 13)

## Dodgers Have Dandy Duo

**Ninth Straight Ties Giants For N.L. Lead**

Whether the Los Angeles Dodgers win or lose the National League pennant, Don Drysdale and Sandy Koufax rate a secure niche among the greatest pitching combinations in baseball history.

With 46 victories between them, the Dodger fireballers have won more games than any other two-man N.L. combination since Sal Maglie and Larry Jansen in 1951 and are virtually certain to be the biggest-winning combination since Bucky Walters and Paul Derringer won 52 games for the 1939 Cincinnati Reds.

What's even more important, however, is that they are delivering at their peaks in the drive that has carried the Dodgers back into a first-place tie with the San Francisco Giants. Since Sept. 16 when the Dodgers started their current nine-game winning streak, Drysdale has allowed a total of three runs in three victories and Koufax has pitched two shutouts and been involved in no-decision start.

Never Better

The Dodger stars were never better than during the past weekend when Koufax fired a 2-0 five-hitter at the St. Louis Cardinals Saturday night and Drysdale hurled a 1-0 five-hitter against the Redbirds on Sunday. Drysdale's victory vaulted the Dodgers into a first-place tie when the Milwaukee Braves tied the Giants 3-2. The Cincinnati Reds remained three

games out of first place when they lost to the Houston Astros 4-2.

The Giants have three games remaining with the Cardinals and four with the Reds while the Dodgers have three with the Reds and four with the Braves. The Reds are in a bad squeeze but at least are in the position of playing only the two teams they have to catch.

Just how tough the Dodgers figure to be the rest of the way is demonstrated by simple pitching statistics—with Drysdale and Koufax showing the way, of course, but with the rest of the staff performing brilliantly, too. In the Dodgers' nine victories since Sept. 15 for example, their pitchers have turned in five shutouts and allowed a total of 12 runs, including six in one game.

**Strong Comeback**  
Drysdale, coming back strong

after a so-so August, has now appeared in 43 games and 299 innings. He has pitched 19 complete games and six shutouts. His won-lost record is 22-12, he has 202 strikeouts and a 2.86 earned run average. Koufax has appeared in 41 games and 318 innings. He's pitched 25 complete games and has a 2.48 record embellished with seven shutouts, a 2.12 E.R.A. and a major league season mark of 356 strikeouts.

A crowd of 40,317 at Los Angeles Sunday saw Maury Wills' speed produce the only run of the game in the first inning. Wills led off with a bunt single, stole second and went to third on Bill White's error. He scored when Jim Gilliam followed with a single.

Drysdale didn't allow a Cardinal base runner to advance past second. He struck out four and didn't walk a batter.

The Giants suffered their fourth loss in five games before a crowd of 39,783 at San Francisco with Gene Oliver's sixth-inning homer the decisive blow. Oliver, who forced the Dodgers into an unsuccessful playoff by homering off Johnny Podres in 1962, thus tagged 22-game winner Juan Marichal with his 13th setback. Willie McCovey hit his 39th homer in the sixth inning and the Giants had two runners on with two out in the ninth before Dan Osinski retired Dick Schofield for the final out of the game.

**Hopes Dimmed**

Rookie Chuck Harrison's three-run homer in the bottom of the ninth dealt the Reds' pennant hopes a severe blow at Houston. Harrison's homer came off relief pitcher Billy McCool. Joe Morgan led off the inning with a single and Jim Wynn walked to set the stage for Harrison. Dick Farrell received credit for his 11th win while McCool dropped his ninth decision.

The Philadelphia Phillies shaded the New York Mets 5-4 and the Pittsburgh Pirates beat the Chicago Cubs 5-3 in other N.L. games. In the American League, Minnesota clinched the pennant with a 2-1 victory over Washington, Baltimore nipped California 2-1, Chicago downed New York 5-3, Kansas City topped Boston 2-1 and Cleveland whipped Detroit 7-1 after 2-0 setback.

Dick Stuart singled home the tying run and Tony Gonzalez (Continued on Page 13)

## Margaretta Pins Loss On St. Paul

The invading Margaretta Polar Bears penetrated the Norwalk St. Paul line for single touchdowns in each of the first two quarters and then picked up a pair of insurance six-pointers in the third period for a 30-12 grid victory at Whitney Field Saturday night.

Led by the running of halfback Herman Gant, the Bears came back from a one touchdown deficit late in the first quarter to take an 8-6 lead which they never lost.

**ST. PAUL PUSHED** across a touchdown early in the initial stanza when they recovered a Polar Bear fumble on the Margaretta 10. On the first play halfback Glenn Tinker scored on an end sweep. The PAT try failed.

Margaretta retaliated with 41 seconds remaining in the first quarter when halfback Rick Dayhuff scampered 42 yards one play after defensive back Tom Stauffer picked off a St. Paul aerial. Gant picked up the extra points.

The Bears hiked their lead to 18-6 early in the second period following a St. Paul punt. The drive started on the Flyers 45. The Bears made a 19-yard pass play click on fourth down and two plays later fullback Barry Brunner went over from the three. Gant again responded with the PAT.

**THE FLYERS** then came back with their second TD of the first half late in the second quarter when they drove 80 yards in eight plays.

Fullback John Fantauzzo gobbled up 32 yards on one play, quarterback Charlie Amato hit his brother John on an 18-yard aerial and a pass interference play moved the ball to the 15. Amato made connections with end Mike Meesig on a 11-yard scoring strike two plays later. The PAT try failed.

The Bears then came back with two quick touchdowns in the third quarter to put the game out of reach. Following a Flyer punt from inside their five yard line, the Bears went 31 yards in five plays with Brunner scoring from the four.
