Mansfield Beaten In 40-to-0 Contest

LORAIN — The visiting Mansfield Senior High Tygers held on throughout most of the first half, but eventually faltered and fell as 40-0 victims to Lorain Senior here last night in a Buckeye Conference football game.

Held scoreless for over a quarter and one-half, Lorain (4-1 in BC and 7-1 overall), finally broke the deadlock with 4:38 left in the half when Fullback Pete Restivo bucked over from one yard to initiate the high-scoring test. It was the first of two scored by the driving runner.

From that point, Mansfield (1-4 and 2-6) settled momentarily, allowing one more touchdown in the first half and another throughout the third period. The fourth quarter showed Lorain momentum at a high point as the Steelmen counted 19 points.

MANSFIELD mounted a pair of drives, one in the first quarter and another in the third, but each time was stopped by the tenacious Lorain defensive unit which yielded only 61 ground yards all night.

The first Tygers chance came when Quarterback Jim Collins connected with Halfback Bubba Petty for 35 yards to the Lorain 30. The drive advanced to the 26 and then was halted by the Steelmen.

In the final drive, a Petty aerial to End Jeff Weber covering 31 yards was the big play that put the ball at Lorain's 34 and a penalty advanced the Tygers to the 21. Mansfield's smell of paydirt came only three yards closer and the ball was turned over at the 18.

Halfback Ron Fields led the Lorain rushing attack which accounted for 288 net yards. He collected 65 in 10 tries while teammates Restivo and Bill Lepkowski each gained 52. Lepkowski's included a 43-yard touchdown run and he scored another touchdown on a 26-yard aerial from Quarterback Jeff Novotny.

LEADING the Tygers was Fullback Greg Wardorf with 40 yards in 10 carries. Petty threw only two of the 14 Mansfield passes, connecting on the one big gainer.

Collins, who played signal-caller all night, zeroed in on four of his 12 tosses and had one intercepted. Dan Blakely pulled in two receptions, good for 28 yards.

Elyria High Remains in Loop Lead

Elyria High School's lead in the eight-school Buckeye Conference is a little more secure today.

The undefeated Pioneers (5-0-0 and 8-0-0) knocked Marion Harding (3-2-0 and 6-2-0) out of a share of second place, 24-19. Sandusky (3-2-9 and 6-2-0) also vacated a share of the runner-up spot, falling before lowly Fremont Ross (2-3-0 and 2-5-1), 28-27. Lorain (4-1-0 and 7-1-0) is now all alone in second after a 40-0 pasting of Mansfield (1-4-0 and 2-6-0).

In the other game, Lorain Admiral King (1-4-0 and 4-4-0) defeated Findlay (1-4-0 and 2-6-0), 20-13.



Jerry Lucas Goes To San Francisco

CINCINNATI (AP) — Jerry Lucas, one of the top shooters and rebounders in the National Basketball Association, was traded to San Francisco Friday by Cincinnati.


The Warriors sent Forward Bill Turner and Guard Jimmy King to the Royals for Lucas, who was named to the NBA's All-Star squad in each of his six years in the league.

"We're trying to build a full squad of 12 NBA players," Cincinnati General Manager Joe Axelson said in making a comparison to the New York Knicks. "We're strengthening ourselves in two positions."

Lucas, an All-American at Ohio State University, averaged 19.9 points a game and 19.2 rebounds in his career before this season. In four games this year, he has averaged 10.3 points a game and 10.5 rebounds.

Despite the statistics, Lucas has been bothered by bad knees throughout his career. He has started a restaurant chain in the area and it had been reported he would not play this year because of business interests.

King 6-foot-2, played for Los Angeles and Chicago before joining the Warriors and averaged 8.6 points a game in six seasons. He played college ball at Tulsa.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — George Archer, leading the San Francisco open but troubled with a balky driver, says he has the solution to his errant shots.

"I'm going to get me 18 free passes and give them to my relatives," said the laconic Archer, from nearby Gilroy, Calif. "I'm going to put nine of them on each side of the fairway and give 'em baseball gloves."

Archer, the 6-foot-6 Masters champ who has been in a slump since June, shot a second round 67 — despite the bad driver — Friday for a 36-hole score of 130, his best of the season.

He held a two-stroke lead over Miller Barber, 64 for 132, with Bob Lunn and Steve Spray following at 133. Lunn had a second round 68 and Spray a course record-matching 63. Jerry Lee Heard, 69, Al Mengert, 66, and Lee Elder, 68, followed at 134.

Perfect playing conditions and a beautifully conditioned course helped lower the scores. In fact, it took a score of 142, par for two rounds on the 6,677-yard Harding Park Golf Course, to make the cut for the final two rounds.

Arnold Palmer rallied with a 67, including an eagle three on his last hole, for 137, while Billy Casper had a 68 for 138.

WOOSTER — It was the fourth quarter when Mansfield Madison end Dave Miller took a pass from Quarterback Jeff Schag and scampered 34 yards into the end zone for the second Ram score. Madison had marched 72 yards in eight plays following a kickoff, picked up two first downs, and closed Wooster's lead to one point at 13-12.

The Rams took a time out... a decision was being made: for the two points that might win the game, or settle for a tying one point kick? The fans, some 2,469 of them, waited.

Jeff Schag took the ball and rolled out to the right. He was hit, but broke away. He was hit again; he broke away again. He was hit; he was stopped. Wooster won, 13-12.

Tarulli came into the game in the first half when regular Quarterback Al Trustdorf exited the field with a broken wrist. On the touchdown drive, Tarulli connected for 30 yards to Steve Mastin to put the ball at Ashland's 35 with 2:37 left in the game.

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
