

# St. Paul Perfect Second Time

A pre-season brochure outlined the plans Coach Mike Gottfried had for his 1969 Norwalk St. Paul High School football squad...and it turned out to go

just the way he figured. The highly successful Crestline native's philosophy is simple. "OUR PHILOSOPHY toward the

season is that preparation overcomes confusion. We will do a minimum number of things in our game's plan and try to be consistent in these. We operate

on the belief that if we can keep our mistakes at a minimum we will win.

Our belief toward the game itself is that defense is the most important phase of football. We feel if the other team doesn't score we can't lose. Defensively we believe that we have the initiative and we will do the things we do best. We want our football program to be fun and to be a winning program. We want our boys to think positively at all times. Most teams hope to win this fall, we expect to win." The Flyers did just what Gottfried prescribed in racking up win No. 21 in succession with a 30-8 decision over host Plymouth Friday.

GOTTFRIED RAISED his three-year record to an astonishing 29-1 and guided St. Paul to its second straight perfect season with the victory in which his squad "Beat the Clock" in the first half to gain the momentum.

Gottfried said his 1969 team will do the things they do best, and the aerial wizardry of Chris Amato is their game. Gottfried added he expects to win...and another 10-0 season proved him to be right again.

The 24-year-old former quarterback at Morehead State University, Morehead, Ky., stated defense is the most important phase of football...again he proved that without a shadow of a doubt defense is a must in order to achieve success.

HOLDING A 15-8 halftime lead, St. Paul's defensive unit came back in the last 24 minutes to completely shut off Plymouth's offense. The Big Red were in Flyer territory for just two plays, but didn't remain there for long. Two plays later the hosts were pushed back to their own territory and the offense proceeded to add 15 points on the scoreboard despite the fact two apparent touchdowns were nullified by penalties.

In rolling up 30 points, the Flyers added still another record to their bulging total. The Firelands Conference champions averaged 35.2 points per game—352 in 10 games—breaking the old standard of 33.28 set in the 1962 campaign.

The Flyers have displayed the ability to strike quickly and frequently with a smooth passing game. They marched 99 yards in six plays and consumed less than two minutes to hit paydirt and break the game wide open at the conclusion of the first half.

Behind for only the second time this season, St. Paul used an interception to turn the tide. Plymouth was on the march, but the Flyers came up with two key thefts and regained control at their own 41.

AMATO IMMEDIATELY took to the air and the result was a successful 59-yard drive in six plays, with the score coming as the final second ticked off. The 175-pound three-year veteran connected on four of six passes, two each to glue-fingered end Mike Wasiniak and halfback Rich Frank. Amato and Wasiniak teamed up for eight yards, then it was Amato to Frank for nine more to the Plymouth 26. Amato and Wasiniak combined on a 21-yard play to the five, then Amato barely beat the clock with a five-yard scoring strike to Frank who was all alone in the end zone.

It was all St. Paul from that point on. Holding a 15-8 lead, St. Paul cashed in on a Plymouth mistake to boost the total. A nine-yard punt gave the visitors possession at their own 48 in the opening minutes of the second half.

Amato was chased out of the pocket on a first-down play, but eluded the onrushing linemen and tossed a perfect strike to Wasiniak covering 42 yards. Junior halfback Denny Meyer streaked 10 yards on the next play for the six points and St. Paul had a 21-8 bulge with 7:51 remaining in the third canto. John Potts booted a 27-yard field goal with 10:41 to play for a 24-8 spread. It marked the first time in 16 seasons a field goal had been kicked on the Plymouth field.

ANOTHER PLYMOUTH mistake, and another St. Paul score, came later in the fourth quarter. Plymouth fumbled on the St. Paul 43 and it took Amato and company eight plays to drive 57 yards to complete the scoring.

Amato uncorked another pinpoint toss to big end Mike Mushett for 15 yards and the tally with 5:54 showing on the clock. The Flyers had two touchdowns later snuffed out by penalties. Potts dashed in on a sweep with 3:56 to go, but a 15-yard penalty moved the ball back. Then Chris Mushett and Jim Borgia teamed up for a scoring pass, with 32 seconds left, but a five-yard penalty nullified the six-point play.

Plymouth rushed for 144 yards to only 82 for the Flyers, but was contained in its own territory in the second half by the aroused St. Paul defense.


TWO FUMBLES and two interceptions resulted in four mistakes, and Gottfried served warning in the brochure his club would pounce on errors by the opposition. The Flyers most certainly did that.

Gottfried's season isn't over. "When he accepted the job he set three goals for his Flyers, undefeated, ranked and to be state champions," the brochure states. He has obtained two of the goals, and just may reach the third this coming Tuesday or Wednesday when the Associated Press and United Press International wire services announce their final polls for 1969.

## New London Wins Finale With Ease

The New London Wildcats got a taste Friday of what to expect in the Firelands Conference next season and they liked what they found.

The Wildcats closed out the season with a resounding 32-0 victory over South Central, a long-time Firelands member.

THE WILDCATS, who participated in the Lakelands Conference this season, won their final three games of the year to finish with a 4-6 mark. And none of the other three wins were as easy as Friday's. The Wildcats scored twice on their

first four plays from scrimmage and were never in trouble. It took them just three plays to get the first touchdown on the board, Bruce Ewell running four yards and Mike Nugent passing to Frosty Keller for the extra points.

Just minutes later the Wildcats took over at their own 22 and on first down Nugent legged it 78 yards into paydirt. The extra point failed — as they were to do the remainder of the night — but New London has a secure 14-0 lead anyway.

A NUGENT to Greg Mullins pass for 33 yards made it 20-0 before intermission, a one yard run by Les Hess upped that to 26-0 in the third period and a 10 yard run by Ewell in the final stanza made it 32-0.

The winners amassed 270 yards rushing and 54 more through the air but were hampered by 115 yards in penalties. South Central gained 117 yards on the ground and 11 yards through the air.
