

Reppart passes, runs Freddie's over Plymouth, 23 to 8

The best schoolboy quarterback to appear in Mary Faye park in a dozen seasons threw and ran Fredericktown to a 23 to 8 Johnny Appleseed conference victory over Plymouth Friday night.

to Steve Doyle for two scores and ran for another -- although he didn't score it -- in a contest in which the losers came away with no shame.

Plymouth simply did not defend satisfactorily against the passing attack and for that reason was beaten.

The visitors scored the first time they obtained possession.

After a long ground drive from the Red 34 stopped at the Freddie's 29, forcing John Conley to punt, Fredericktown set out from its five to score in four plays.

Two shots off tackle produced seven yards. Then Reppart rolled out to his left, found running room and collected 17 yards to the Fredericktown 29.

The doctory signal caller threw to Steve Doyle on a 71-yard pass -- and run play that produced the go-ahead score.

THE FREDDIES NEVER were headed thereafter, although Plymouth closed the gap to two points late in the third period.

Mike Simpson delivered the PAT from placement. Plymouth was unable to get closer to the Freddie's goal than their 40 for the remainder of the half.

But aside from the long bomb play, Plymouth held an advantage after 24 minutes. The Big Red had five first downs with 37 plays, 92 yards rushing and 15 passing, with three completions in nine tries.

The visitors, meanwhile, had four first downs, 49 yards rushing, 79 yards passing with two completions in four efforts. The Freddie's improved their position on the

scoreboard with the first series of the second half. Taking the Red kickoff to the 30, Fredericktown gas 13 yards on Reppart's rollout left, seven yards on Reppart's rollout again, 11 from Armstrong in two carries and a first down on Reppart's sneak good for three to the 10.

Here the Red defense braced and Fredericktown could not penetrate further. On fourth down, with Reppart holding, Simp on kicked a field goal from the 16.

Plymouth could not advance with the kickoff and Conley punted 47 yards to the Freddie's seven. Harton fumbled the ball away on the first play.

THE BIG RED STORMED into the end zone in four plays, Conley carrying on each. The last one was a two-yard shot. Larry Taylor threw to Jim Cutright for the PATs and the gap was down to two.

But not for long. Fredericktown thrust home for a second TD with the next series.

Obtaining good field position after the kickoff, Fredericktown for a 44-yard pass completion when Reppart passed to Dan Brown, who faced Ray Hughes out of position, and attacked with first down from the Red 16.

Brown got five, Reppart collected 11 and then lost six before Reppart hit Doyle between the eyes with a throw that Jeff Fazio fell down on. The play carried 21 yards and the Freddie's led by 17 to 8 with 11:51 remaining.

Plymouth went to the shotgun formation in the next series and with Kim Carter at the trigger pro-

duced good yardage. Carter threw to Cutright for 40 yards and then to Cutright for 17. But the drive petered out at the Freddie's 23.

Plymouth obtained possession exactly twice thereafter but could not advance beyond the Plymouth 45.

Fredericktown's final TD came on a bizarre occurrence.

THE FREDDIES PROCEEDED from Conley's 37-yard punt to a ground attack that rolled up three first downs. From the Red 31, on second down, Reppart passed two yards to Blackford. On third down, he rolled to his left, found he was hemmed in, struck out toward the middle, then veered left again and fumbled when hit hard at the Red five.

The ball trickled into the end zone, where Bill Levering fell on it for the TD.

Simpson's kick was wide.

It was no crime to be defeated by this Freddie team, which won second place in the Johnny Appleseed conference.

Plymouth's passing game, even from the shotgun, did not produce so much yardage as anticipated. The game plan was to contain Reppart and Brown. The Big Red did half of that. Brown did not hurt Plymouth much. But Reppart killed the Big Red. He is a deserving young man and certainly the class of the field in this stadium this season.

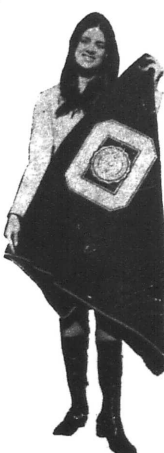
