

Fast-Starting Elyria Routs Mansfield Tygers, 38 to 7

ELYRIA — The Mansfield Senior Tygers sputtered. The Elyria Pioneers Sparked, the scoreboard spun and then it was over, 38-7.

Not, however, before the Tygers (1-5 in league and 1-7-1 overall) suffered punishment from early mistakes and Ira Perkins pulled off a personal vendetta.

The Tygers kicked off to Elyria (5-1 and 8-1), which then marched 49

yards in five plays and scored on Perkins' six - yard touchdown run with only 9:20 remaining in the first quarter.

Elyria kicked off.

The Tygers lost two yards on the first play from scrimmage and then lost the ball to the Pioneers the following play on a fumble. Perkins went over on a one - yard run, after a 33 - yard drive, to make the score 12-0.

Two plays later Perkins picked off a pass on the 18 - yard line and Stevenson followed with a touchdown pass to Jack Sito to make the score 19-0.

Allen Vandenburg had his third pass intercepted on the first play — again by Perkins. Oliver scored two plays later on a 45 - yard run, making the

score at the end of the first quarter, 25-0.

Summation: In the first quarter, Mansfield ran only eight plays to Elyria's 19.

The Pioneers' scoring in the second period was simply a matter of building up enough points to allow the reserve squad to play in the second half with little chance of blowing the lead.

Sito bulled over from one - yard out

on Elyria's first series of the second quarter and the score was 32-0.


The Tygers held onto the ball for three plays and then gave it up on a punt. The final Elyria score followed seven plays later when Larry Beal slashed past the Mansfield defense for 26 yards and a score with 1:35 left in the first half.

The only thing that saved Mansfield from being shut out was a nifty half-

back passing demonstration by Henry Gibbs.

Gibbs accounted for 21 yards passing to keep Mansfield's only respectable drive alive in the fourth quarter. Terrence Fuqua followed with a three - yard touchdown run with 48 seconds left in the clash.

The game originally scheduled for Arlin Field, was transferred to Elyria because of racial unrest at Senior High this week.

Duffy Daugherty Quits Post As Michigan State Coach

EAST LANSING, Mich. (UPI) — The impromptu news conference was pure Duffy Daugherty — it started with a joke. But when he was finished, his Irish eyes weren't smiling.

Daugherty tearfully concluded the news conference Friday evening by telling writers he had submitted his resignation as Michigan State's football coach, effective at the end of this season.

HEAVILY CRITICIZED "It's an irrevocable decision," said the popular but heavily criticized Daugherty, whose 18½ seasons and record of 106-68-5 are high in the Spartans' proud football history.

"I wasn't forced out," he said. "I could have weathered it out and the administrators would have backed me. I want to make it completely clear I have been under no pressure from the administration."

But the public pressure and the pressure a coach puts on himself was there. The Spartans' 6-5 mark last season was their first winning year since the glory teams of 1965 - 66.

"I kept thinking I could turn the program around this year, but now I realize I can't," Daugherty said. "I feel Michigan State football deserves better and it isn't getting it."

Michigan State was 2-4-1 entering today's game with Purdue and 2-1-1 in the Big Ten. The Boilermakers brought a 4-0 conference record into the game.

Daugherty told his assistants of his decision to resign

Thursday afternoon and notified his players that evening after practice. He had originally intended to make his public announcement after the Purdue game but a news leak hastened it.

"I told the players football should be fun," Daugherty said, "and it hasn't been. Saturday should be fun, and if you can't have fun on Saturday it isn't worth it. I told the squad: 'I'm not asking you to go out and win the last four games for Duffy. I want you to go out and have some fun.'"

Daugherty asked for "re-assignment" in his resignation. He's a full professor at Michigan State and thus has tenure.

He offered to help the university and his successor "in any way possible" and the only opportunities which could lure him back to coaching would be at his Alma mater, Syracuse, or a professional coaching job.

"I'd only take that if Coach Ben Schwarzwalder resigned," he said of the Syracuse coaching job. Of a pro job he said, "I won't get asked."



BELLVILLE — The Colts of Clear Fork High made a mistake last night. They made a mistake on the very first play from scrimmage, they fumbled. And Ontario recovered it.

After the first play fumble things all went the Clear Fork way as the Colts completely dominated the balance the game and shut out the Warriors for the first time in fifteen games.

The Ontario defense began to tighten up the final frame, catching the Colts in a fourth - and - 11 situation with 7:04 remaining on the Warrior 21. Brokaw split the uprights with a field goal kicked from the 27 - yard line to give the final points to Clear Fork.

Vernon Yancey gained 42 yards in 12 carries for Ontario, while Jeff Brokaw picked up 48 yards.

planned punt try while Plymouth tallied on a mistake on its try in the same situation.

Both teams found difficulty going during the first half

But the action was furious in the third period. Plymouth, had managed but 29 yards from scrimmage in the first two segments and had moved to its won 36 - yard stripe. On the fourth down Halfback Kim Carter finally found the handle on a bad snap from center. Carter sped to his left, eluded several Freddie defenders, finally finding an open field at the Fredericktown 25 - yard marker, and completed the 64 - yard run with 3:54 remaining. The extra point attempt failed.

But hold on folks... Fredericktown also has a play that only films could reveal what really happened.

Trailing, 6-0, Fredericktown drove from its 31 to Plymouth's 29 - yard line. The Freddie lined up for a fourth down punt try. The ball is snapped to a halfback. He hands the ball off to a teammate, and he, in turn, hands to Halfback Brad Armstrong. Armstrong headed for the goal line, untouched, crosses the end zone with 1:01 left. Tim Ryan booted the extra point for the victory.

Celtics Gain 10th Straight Victory

The "new" Celtics and the even "new" Cavs are the talk of the National Basketball Association these days.

Bringing back memories of the days when Bob Cousy was performing his wizardry in the backcourt and Bill Russell was changing the game with his defensive play, Boston is the only unbeaten team in the league with a 10-0 mark.

The Celts, who started making a comeback last year when they won the Atlantic Division before losing to the Knicks in the play - offs, kept their record perfect with a 109-96 triumph over Baltimore.

Cleveland, who used to be an NBA joke, has suddenly become respectable since Lenny Wilkens finally joined the team. They made it four wins in six games since he joined the club, after first balking when Seattle traded him, by downing the Buffalo Braves, 124-97.

In the other games, Atlanta slid by Houston, 114-108; Chicago beat Phoenix, 115-100; KC - Omaha defeated Willess Philadelphia, 114-101; New York took Seattle, 105-80 and Los Angeles downed Detroit, 116-107.

Don Nelson's two free throws broke a 94-94 deadlock with less than four minutes left to start Boston on the way to its victory over Baltimore. John Havlicek and Jo Jo White each scored 22 points for the Celtics while Mike Davis led Baltimore with 26.

Austin Carr, teaming with Wilkens in the backcourt, scored 26 points and Wilkens hit on six of eight as the Cavs took a 60-43 halftime lead.

New York stayed right on Boston's heel with a 10-1 mark by downing Seattle. Bill Bradley and Earl Monroe each scored 18 to lead the balanced scoring attack for New York. Spencer Haywood had 18 for Seattle.

The 76ers stretched their "perfect" record to 0-11 under rookie coach Roy Rubin by losing to KC - Omaha. Nate Archibald scored 38 points to lead the winners and added 15 assists. Fred Carter scored 32 for Philadelphia.

Bob Love scored 34 points to pace Chicago. Pete Maravich and Lou Hudson scored 31 each to lead Atlanta to the victory over Houston.
