

Lexington, Ontario Win

The Ontario Warriors yesterday set the stage for the Johnny Appleseed Conference showdown with Fredericktown Friday after remaining unbeaten by downing winless Crestview.

The Warriors, (5-0 in league and 6-0-1 overall), only a half-game ahead of Fredericktown in the JAC race, whipped The Cougars (0-5 and 0-6-1), 20-0.

The Lexington Minutemen (2-2-1 and 3-3-1) defeated Plymouth (2-3 and 2-5), 24-0.

ASHLAND — Fullback Vernon Yancey gained 198 yards from scrimmage, scored three touchdowns for Ontario and shattered Crestview at Parents Day.

Crestview managed to hold the undefeated Warriors scoreless during the first 12-minute segment and moved to Ontario's 16-yard

line, their farthest penetration of the Johnny Appleseed Conference contest. The drive faltered.

Yancey, 185-pound senior, carried the ball 18 times for Ontario during the contest and scored his first touchdown with 9:15 left in the second period. Alternating the carrying chores with teammate Mike Riley, Yancey, and the Warriors, drove 85 yards in 14 plays. Yancey drove across the goal from five yards out to climax the march.

Ontario wasted little time after intermission. In two plays the Warriors covered 44 yards. Yancey broke through the Cougar line for a 34-yard trek with 9:13 left.

Ontario continued to gain on the ground against the winless Crestview team. Yancey finalized his afternoon running with a dash around the left end for a 45 yard touchdown run at 4:51.

The Warriors ran up 284 yards on the ground in 47 carries but lost three fumbles. Todd Gray was the Cougar standout. Gray gained 30 of Crestview's 46-yard total in 13 tries and was stopped only once for no gain.

LEXINGTON — Lexington High School's steady offense pushed the Plymouth Big Red around, in and at times believable patterns and at another times bizarre scene in its victory here yesterday afternoon.

The Minutemen picked up 157 yards on the ground and 122 in the air while Plymouth was never able to find the right key to scoring.

The first quarter proved uneventful as the two teams traded the ball four times before either could muster a drive capable of ending in

a score. It was Lexington, who then broke the ice when Yogi Durbin bounced over the goal line from one-yard out.

The Minutemen's second touchdown came with only seven seconds remaining in the first half, the product of a strange set of circumstances.

Quarterback Tony Delianides threw the scoring pass to Jeff Wentz in an indirect way. The ball went right at Plymouth defender Mike Hamman. Hamman batted the ball up in an attempt to kill the play, but Wentz swooped underneath it just as it crossed the goal line for the touchdown.

Plymouth's deepest penetration in the first half went to the Lexington 26-yard line where the Big Red lost the ball on downs. Another deep penetration was stopped with an interception.

In all Lexington picked off three Plymouth passes.

Greg Ammons added three more points to the Lexington score in the third quarter when he kicked a 30-yard field goal giving the Minutemen a 17-0 lead. The scoring was capped by a scoring pass from Delianides to Rick Compton in the fourth quarter.

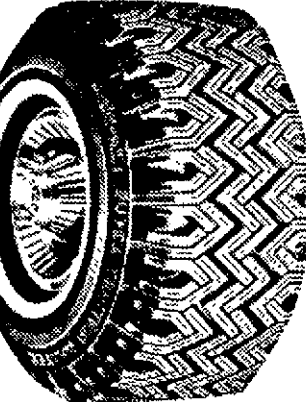

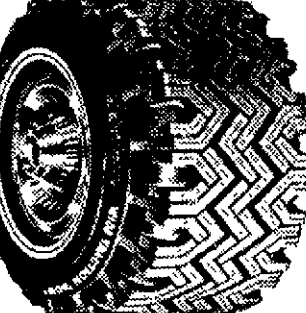

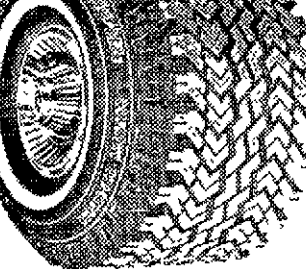
