

Dover Tornadoes Defeat Malabar Again, 27 to 0

DOVER — That long, long, long fame for the Mansfield Malabar Falcons that the Dover Tornadoes have presented them in the past nine years continued last night when the Crimson and Gray from Tuscarawas County demolished the Mansfielders 27-0 in high school football action.

It was the tenth consecutive victory for the Doverites over the Falcons, who were also sent back home with their initial 1972 football loss after a pair of victories.

It also marked an unsuccessful debut in the 1972 Cardinal Conference session for the Falcons, who lost three fumbles in the first half to help Dover to a 21-0 lead going into the lockerroom. The crowd of 5,200, included 800 Mansfielders.

In a sense, it wasn't completely a rout, as the Malabar defense played heads-up football the entire game.

But,

The Falcon offense coughed up the football three times, of which two led to Dover touchdowns.

After the Falcon defense stiffened to wipe out an early Dover threat that reached the Malabar two-yard line, the Brown and Orange took over on downs.

The inability to sustain a drive forced the Falcons to punt, with kicker Don Stewart doing the job from his own goal line.

Stewart was unable to hold the ball on a bad snap from center, and Dover's Greg Gardner recovered in the end zone for the initial touchdown.

A Doug Distl fumble on an attempted pitchout was recovered by Dover's Gardner and the Tornadoes were on their way again.

Quarterback Dave Migliore, who completed 13 of 21 passes for 144 yards, directed the Tornado attack which was capped on a one-yard drive by Jeff Kornis. Migliore passed to Greg Gurney for the points — after — touchdown.

With 3:30 left in the first half, Bubba Beal fumbled a Distl pitchout and Dover recovered on its own 43.

Migliore riddled the Falcon defense for five completions, including three to Jon DeVore, to make it a 21-0 game at the 0:52 mark. The final completion of that drive went to DeVore from seven yards out.

Dover drove for another score late in the game, finalized on a nine-yard run by Migliore.

"Our defense wasn't bad at all tonight," said a saddened Malabar coach Tom Landsittel. "We got behind early and our offensive punch just wasn't there."

Indeed it wasn't, as the Falcons could muster only three first downs against a stingy Dover defense. Overall, Malabar gained only 72 net yards.

"Our fumbles gave them good field position and you can't do that against a team like Dover," Landsittel added.

While things were glum for the footballers at halftime, the Malabar marching band performed admirably before an outstanding following of Mansfielders at Crater Stadium.

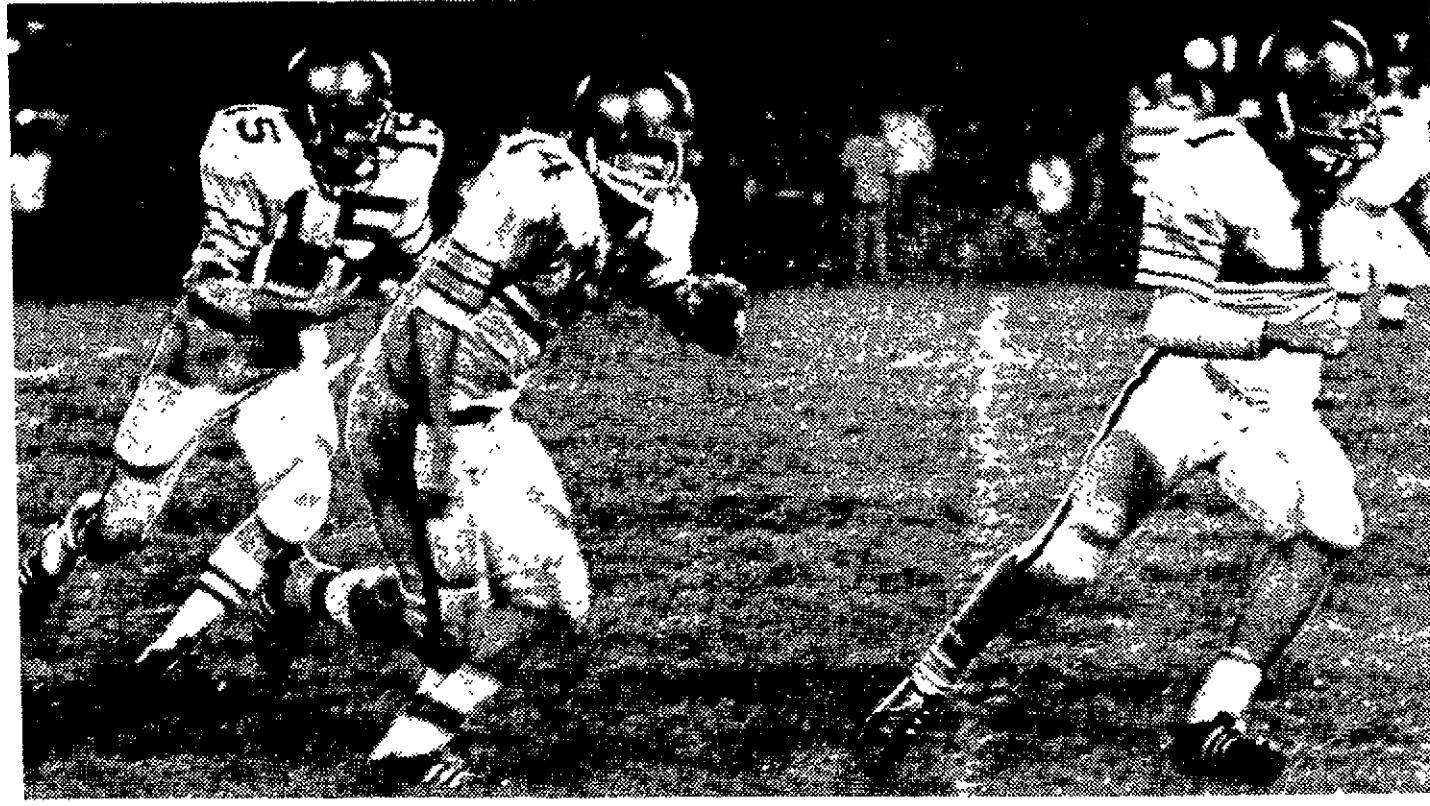

USSR Hockey Team Whips Canadians

MOSCOW (UPI) — Cheered on by the top Kremlin leaders, the Soviet National ice hockey team scored five goals in the last 16 minutes Friday night to upset Team Canada, 5-4, and take a 3-1 lead in their eight-game series.

The Canadians led, 3-0, going into the final period but the red-shirted Russians suddenly began swamping Canadian goalie Tony Esposito with sizzling long shots and stab after stab.

The screaming, sellout crowd of 14,000 at Luzhniki Park's Lenin Ice Rink included Leonid I. Brezhnev, the Communist Party general secretary, Premier Alexei N. Kosygin, President Nikolai V. Podgorny and nearly 3,000 Canadian fans.

'Perry Will Finish With 24 Victories'

CLEVELAND (UPI) — Gaylord Perry became the winningest pitcher for the Cleveland Indians in 18 years and thinks he has earned his keep.

Perry picked up his 22nd win Friday night with an eight-hitter against New York as the Tribe bested the Yanks 4-1.

He is the winningest pitcher for the Tribe since 1954 when Bob Lemon and Early Wynn each won 23. He is also one victory away from tying his career high of 23 wins, set in 1970 when he was in San Francisco.

"I think I've earned my keep this season," he said. "It was good to see runs on the scoreboard." One of those runs came home on Perry's single.

Cincinnati Reds Clinch West Title

HOUSTON (AP) — Cincinnati Manager Sparky Anderson says the Big Red Machine ran to the 1972 National League Western Division championship on people-power.

We don't just have players on this team — we have people, and that's one thing the other clubs don't have," Anderson said, wiping a trickle of champagne off his cheek Friday night after the Reds wrapped up the crown with a 4-5 victory over Houston.

"We've never had any problems," he said. "This team is together. The players don't want problems. You can't play baseball like that. You can have all the stars in the world and if they don't get along, it's worth nothing." The only problem the Reds had Friday night was washing the bubbly out of their double-knits. Players fizzed champagne on each other like a bunch of kids playing in lawn sprinklers on a hot summer day.

They had won their second division title in three years and in typical fashion, holding off a ninth-inning rally by the Astros in another season Anderson thinks the Reds will be in the World Series.

'BEST TEAMS'
Later Anderson said he wouldn't make any predictions about the play-off with Pittsburgh for the NL title but did say, "The two best teams in baseball will be playing for the National League title."

The Reds scored two runs in the first inning off Astros starter Larry Dierker and added two more on solo homers by Pete Rose and Johnny Bench. Houston scored one in the third on Jim Wynn's single and two more in the eighth on Bob Watson's two-run single to make it close.

But even when the Astros loaded the bases in the ninth, Sparky still had a certain feeling.

"When that phone call woke me up at 8:20 this morning, I had the best feeling I've ever had," Anderson said. "... even better than 1970. This club means more to me than the 1970 club because this club battled so hard. In 1970 it was just a cakewalk."

Ashlanders Rip Coshocton

COSHOCTON — The Ashland Eagles took advantage of two Coshocton fumbles and put together two long drives to record a 28-0 victory last night in a Cardinal Conference football opener for both teams.

Halfback Dan Bowersox led the defending Cardinal Conference champions with 16 points on a pair of one-yard touchdowns runs, two extra point kicks and running for two extra points. Jim Thomas got the remaining points for the Eagles, pulling in a 37-yard pass from Mark Starr and a six-yard pass from Chris Strine.

After a Redskins punt in the second period, Ashland again marched down the field and Strine's pass to Thomas culminated a 72-yard drive in 14 plays. Ashland's final touchdown by Bowersox followed a Coshocton fumble at its own 13.

Late in the first quarter, Ashland got the ball on a Coshocton punt and moved 70 yards in four plays, with Thomas taking the 37-yard payoff pass from Starr.

Early scoring

Ashland, now with two victories and one tie, did all its scoring in the first half. Middle guard Rocky Martin got the Eagles going when he recovered a Coshocton (-1-2) fumble on the Redskins' 41-yard line. Bowersox went right to work, running 40 yards to the one and then ramming over on the next play.

The victory also climaxed a glorious day for manager Ken Aspromonte who celebrated his 41st birthday Friday.
