

Lopsided Margin Unexpected

"We just have to forget tonight and start a new season tomorrow," Acierto said as he looked to St. Mary's and the Pirates first Sandusky Bay Conference game next Saturday afternoon.

Shaffer would not signal out a single boy for his efforts in the game choosing instead to call the win "another team effort."

"WE STILL LIKE to establish a running game," Shaffer said. He is trying to play down the passing attack which he has been using more and more lately.

The veteran does think his team is capable of throwing more whether it will or not remains to be seen.

"We did not think we would be able to move the ball that well on them, our scouts reported that they looked pretty good on defense in spots against Shelby," Shaffer said.

Dick Acierto warned that his Perkins Pirates would be stepping out of the frying pan and into the fire when they went into Bellevue.

The words came back to haunt the Pirate mentor as his charges suffered a 48-6 pasting at the hands of the Redmen for their second loss in as many outings against Northern Ohio League clubs. Bellevue, on the other hand, served notice that it will be a tough team for anyone to contend with.

THE REDMEN SHOWED outstanding balance as seven players figured in the scoring.

Chuck Baptista, senior fullback, scored two of the Bellevue touchdowns on runs of one and two yards. Senior halfback Jeff Lilli also cracked into paydirt twice on a one yard run and a tremendous 70 yard effort.

The other scores for Bellevue came on a 27-yard pass from Kip Loudenslagel to Mike DeLuca and a seven-yard run by Larry Emery.

BRIAN HEATH SAVED the Pirates from a shutout when he took an 18-yard pass from substitute quarterback Curt Freytag late in the fourth period for the Pirates score.

Despite the score, the Pirates showed signs of coming to life early in the contest. Bellevue was forced to punt the first time it had the ball and the Pirates had the ball on their own 18. They moved the ball to the Bellevue 40 on a one yard run and a 41 yard pass by Tom Turrie to Heath.

The Bellevue defense rose to the occasion and held the Pirates on downs and forced a punt which Shawn Beamer gathered in at the Bellevue 21 and returned to the Pirates 16 yard line.

Five plays later, Baptista had his first score of the night and the Redmen were off and running.

ONCE AGAIN, the Bellevue defense stopped the Pirate offense before it could get untracked and after the exchange on the punt. Bellevue took over on the Pirate 46.

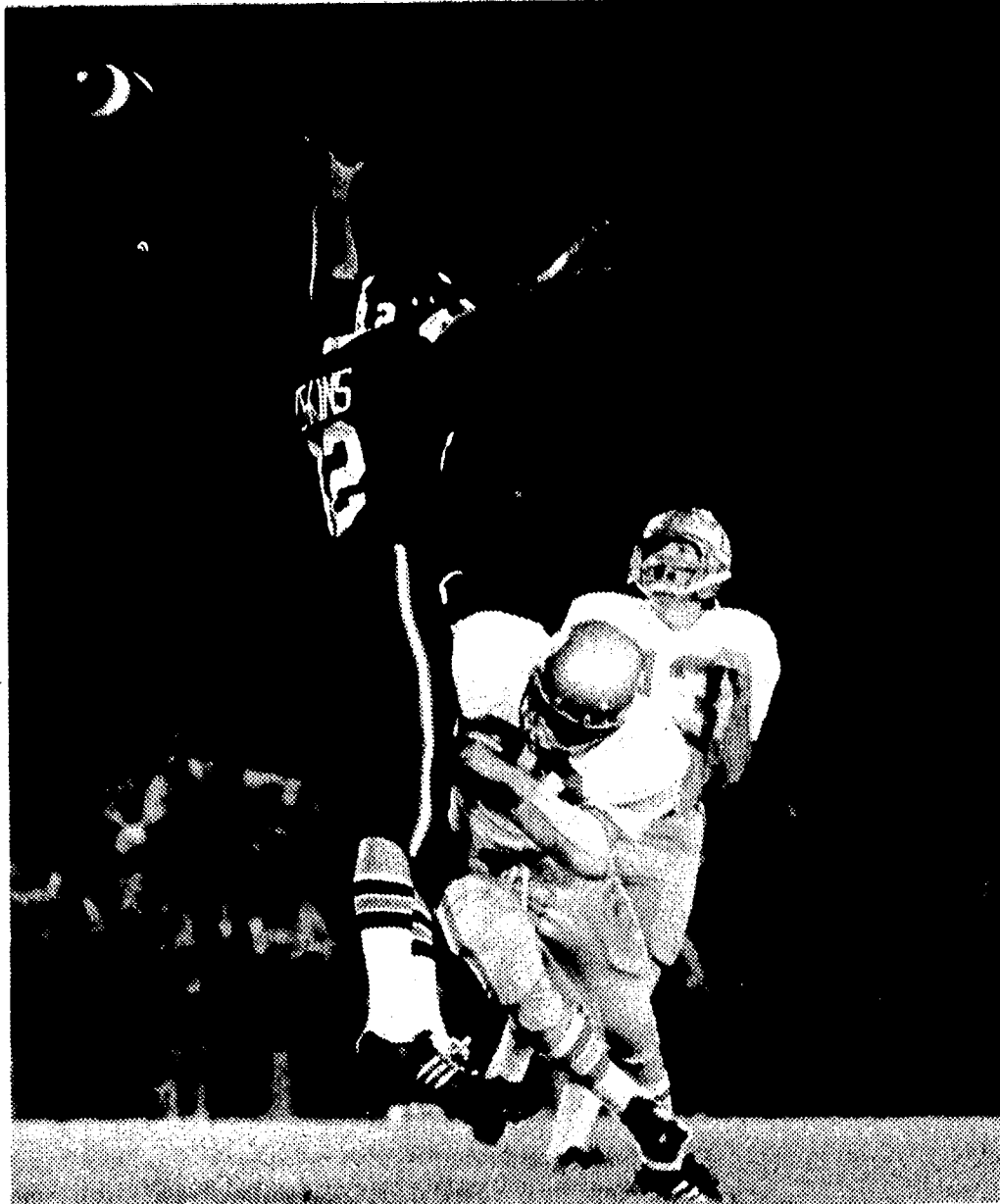
This time, it took the Redmen only 10 plays to light the scoreboard with Lilli getting his first touchdown on the second play of the second period.

Eagles' Blend Perfect

Opportunity knocked, and Monroeville capitalized.

The Eagles turned a pass interception and two fumble recoveries into an 18-0 halftime lead and went on to hand Plymouth a 26-12 reversal Friday night.

It marked the sixth consecutive conquest for Coach Ralph Fuhrman's Firelands Conference squad over a two-year period.

FUHRMAN WAS EXTREMELY pleased with the balanced attack his team came up with. Monroeville accounted for 309 yards in total yardage, 201 on the ground and 108 in the air.

"We could have had much more in the air. But two touchdowns were called back by penalties and a couple of other passes were dropped," Fuhrman related.

Substitute tailback Bob Grose and fullback Marc Jones gained 209 yards between them to lead the way. Grose filled in for injured Tim Christman and chewed up 101 yards in 19 carries. Jones, a hard-running veteran, clicked off 108 yards in 24 thrusts and scored the second and third Eagle touchdowns.

Fuhrman also praised the work of quarterback Don Long and end Ron Schaffer. "Don did an excellent job of throwing the ball and Ron came up with two sensational diving catches for touchdowns. He also made another beautiful catch," Fuhrman continued.

Long was eight for 17 for the night and connected with his split end (Schaffer) for a 20-yard strike with 6:38 remaining in the first period. The visitors drove 40 yards in three plays after sophomore Jim Christman's interception.

THE EAGLES STRUCK twice in less than three minutes in the second period. After a fumble recovery, Monroeville marched 49 yards in six plays with Jones

galloping the final 34 on a draw play at the 3:48 mark.

Moments later the Eagles once again pounced on a Plymouth fumble and went 22 yards in three plays with Long hurling

Port Clinton Scores Late For 15-0 Win

Senior John Williamsen literally carried Port Clinton to a 15-0 triumph over invading Sylvania in the first Great Lakes League encounter for the defending co-champions.

The 180-pound halfback personally accounted for 133 of the Redskins 221 total yards. He lumbered 23 times rushing for 128 yards and had the lone reception of the night for the hosts.

Coach Marc McClain's defense throttled the Wildcats throughout. However, it wasn't until the final stanza Port Clinton finally pushed the ball into the end zone.

WILLIAMSEN STREAKED eight yards for the initial tally, then added the two-point conversion for an 8-0 lead.

Later in the quarter it was Williamsen darting 40 yards to paydirt to cement the win for the hosts who last year entered the title chamber for the first time since entering the league. The Ottawa County club was 9-1-1 overall.

Port Clinton, which dropped a 21-6 non-league verdict to Bellevue in the season opener, was hampered by eight penalties for 80 yards. The visitors went to the air 12 times and made good on half of their attempts, but three others wound up in the arms of Port Clinton defenders.

an 11-yard touchdown pass to Jones with 1:01 left in the half as the count mounted to 18-0.

Plymouth turned a Monroeville fumble into a third-period score. The Big Red covered 60 yards in six plays with Ray Hughes directing a 15-yard toss to Kim Carter for the six points.

However, Monroeville retaliated in the fourth stanza on a 60-yard drive in which Long and Schaffer again teamed up for the final 20 as the senior receiver came up with his second diving stab in the end zone. Dennis Didion, who sparkled on defense with two interceptions, added the bonus points to complete the scoring.

PLYMOUTH'S FINAL tally came when Hughes rambed 40 yards on a quarterback sneak with 6:42 on the clock.

Both teams were penalized frequently. The Eagles had 110 yards stepped off, compared to 70 for the hosts who dropped their second decision of the young season.

Monroeville launched its campaign with a 12-6 nod over Danbury-Lakeside. The Eagles open Firelands play Friday against New London and it will also be the first home game of the year.
