

Ontario's Warriors Nip Bucyrus, 7-0

ONTARIO — The Ontario Warriors opened the 1972 high school football season here last night, displaying just enough offensive punch to score a touchdown in the second period. A throttling Ontario defense held Bucyrus to only 38 yards from scrimmage for a 7-0 victory.

The defense, led by 202-pound tackle Pat Carroll smothered the Redmen after Bucyrus played much of

the first half of the independent contest in Warrior territory. Carroll recovered a fumble on the Bucyrus 29-yard line with less than three minutes left in the

second period to set up the only score of the game.

Ontario's Mike Riley bulled for five yards to the Bucyrus 24-yard line and then, with 2:08 remaining, sped down the right side and over for the touchdown. Exchange student Eduardo Mata booted the extra point for the final score.

Ontario had other stalwarts with defensive laurels. Along with Carroll, Doug Schwall and John Sloey pounded the Redmen for losses as the Warriors allowed Bucyrus to advance only to Ontario's 23-yard line. Bucyrus was held to six yards from scrimmage during the second half. However, the Redmen collected seven first downs, all during the last two periods.

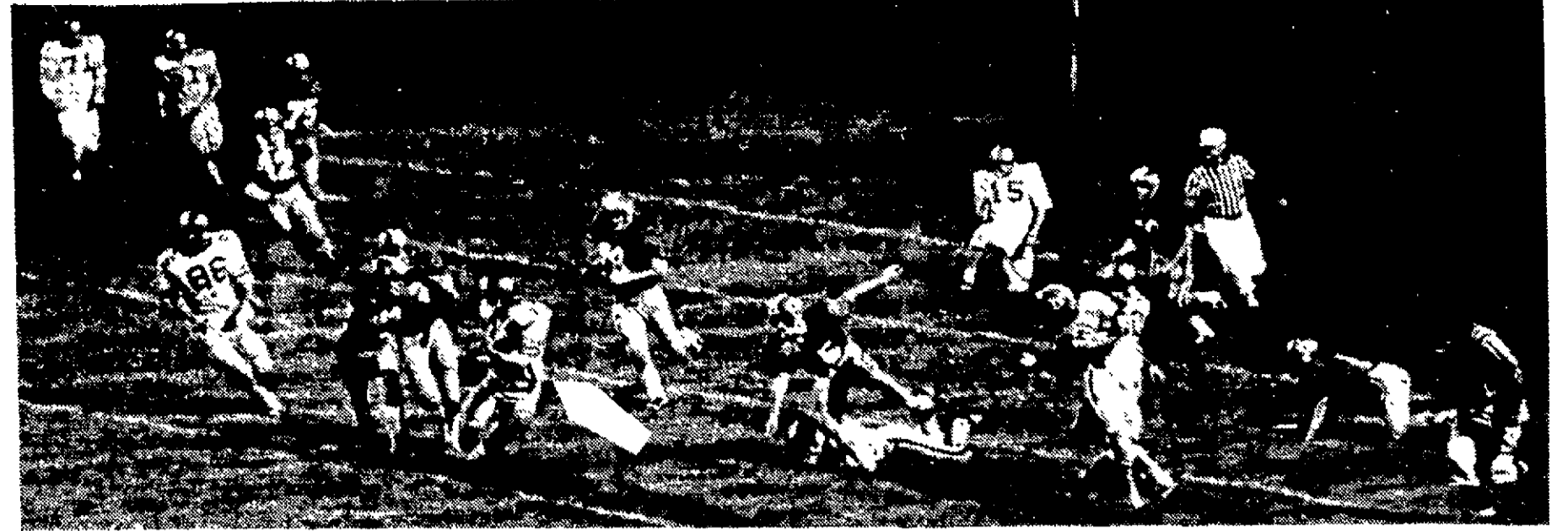

FOREST HILLS, N. Y. (UPI) — Billie Jean King, the defending U. S. Open champion, seeks her second straight and the third Forest Hills title today against Kerry Melville of Australia, and there are few who give the 26-year-old Kerry much of a chance.

But strange things have happened here in this event, which brought together for the first time this year all of the world's top players. The field of 80 women has two survivors, Billie Jean, top seeded, and ninth-seeded Miss Melville. Second-seed Evonne Goolagong left early, and third-seeded idol Chris Evert went out in a rout, 6-4, 6-2 to Kerry on Friday after Billie Jean had brought down the fifth seed, Margaret Court, 6-4, 6-4.

And of the four surviving men of a field of 148, the fourth, sixth, twelfth seeds and an unseeded man survive to do battle today in the men's semis.

Weaver's Leader By Three Strokes

COLUMBUS, Ga. (UPI) — Scrambling Dewitt Weaver doesn't plan to change his strategy as he heads into the third round of the Southern Open Golf tournament with a three-stroke advantage over red-hot Frank Beard.

Weaver, the 1971 U. S. Professional Match play champion from St. Simons Island, Ga., posted a 67 Friday to go with his first day 65. His two-day score of 132 is only one stroke above the lowest 36-hole total recorded on the PGA tour this year.

However, it was Beard who ripped the compact Green Island Country Club course apart Friday, firing a seven-under-par 63 that moved him into second place. That was only a stroke off the course record 62 shot by Bobby Mitchell in last year's Southern Open.

Beard, who has been in a slump this year after winning more than \$100,000 on the tour for the past five years, wasn't settling for birdies Friday. He notched an eagle on the 594-yard eighth hole Friday by hitting a wedge in the hole from 80 yards away.

While Weaver and Beard were stealing the spotlight Friday, defending champion Johnny Miller was lurking in the background following a second-round 67 that left him five shots off the pace.

"I'm getting better, and they'd better watch out," said Miller, who scored his first tour victory here last year.

Roy Pace also shot a 67 Friday and trails Weaver by only four strokes. With Miller at five back are Bob Barabara, Chuck Courtney and Atlanta George Johnson.

Most notable among those failing to make the cut Friday, was Tommy Aaron of Gainesville, Ga., winner of more than \$100,000 on the tour this year.

Tom Dunlap, defensive tackle for New London, picked off a Northwestern fumble on a third period kickoff and converted it to six points while covering 50 yards in the process.

The lone Northwestern score came in the final period on a six-yard pass from Quarterback Randy Yoder to Dan Smith.
