

# Clear Fork, Delta Draw, 0-0



**BELLVILLE** — Neither Clear Fork nor Delta were able to capitalize on scoring opportunities Friday night, as the teams battled to a scoreless tie in an independent high school football game.  
 Clear Fork's Chuck Golden averted Delta's biggest threat late in the second quarter. The junior wingback intercepted an errant pass from Panthers' quarterback Bob Cass at the Colts' two-yard line.

Golden apparently was the hero again in the third period when he picked off another Cass pass, halting a Delta (1-2-1) drive that had progressed 30 yards. Delta recovered a Clear Fork fumble on the next play, however.

 Clear Fork (1-1-2) was unable to mount an effective offense, coming no closer to paydirt than the Delta five-

yard line. That was in the second quarter and Danish exchange student Klaus Palmelund was called upon to attempt a field goal from the 18-yard line. The ball sailed wide. The boot climaxed a drive that covered 33-yards, 30 of them coming on two runs by quarterback Rob Fellure.  
 After the two teams exchanged possessions, Delta began moving again, only to be stopped by Golden's first interception.

In the second half, neither team was able to get anything going offensively. Delta controlled possession of the ball, but never really threatened to score.  
 In the fourth quarter, Delta attempted a field goal from the Clear Fork 15 but missed.  
 In the closing seconds of the game, Clear Fork tried desperately to set up another field goal attempt by Palmelund, but time ran out before the center could snap the ball.  
 Clear Fork's defense played a very important role in stopping Delta's scoring drives, sacking Cass four times. Clear Fork's Fellure was sacked only once.

The workhorse for Delta was Schrock, who carried 25 times and gained 91 yards, an average of three yards per carry. Leading gainer for the Colts was Fellure with 24 yards in six carries.  
 Penalties hurt Delta. In the third period, a clipping infraction stopped a potential drive, and late in the final stanza, a pass interference call gave Clear Fork a crucial first down.



## Rhodes Winner

Malabar's fine distanceman Mike Hallabrin shaved 15 seconds off his personal best time Friday at Therm-o-Disc, but still tasted his first defeat of the high school cross country season in the annual Five Way Meet.

Cleveland Rhodes' Ed Vilt, who Falcon coach Gordon Shipley called "a heck of a runner", churned out a 13:04 timing for first place. The time shattered Hallabrin's course record of 13:32 and propelled Rhodes to 47 points and the team title.

Madison placed second with 55, followed by Malabar (59), Lexington (87) and Mansfield Senior (103).

Hallabrin took second place in 13:17 time, Madison's Mike McDevitt was fourth in 13:37. Lexington's Craig Falde paced his team with 14:20 for 11th place, Wayne Curry running a 14:18 for 10th and Mansfield Senior's best time.

# Cincinnati Belts Braves, 7-1

**CINCINNATI (UPI)** — Ken Griffey doubled, tripled and homered to drive in three runs as the Cincinnati Reds defeated the Atlanta Braves, 7-1, Friday night to give Tom Seaver his 21st victory against six losses.

Seaver, winning his 14th game against three losses since coming to the Reds June 15, struck out only five batters, falling five short of his 10th straight 200-or-more strikeout season.

A fifth-inning homer by Jerry Royster accounted for the only run off Seaver, who may come back Sunday in the season's finale in a relief role, attempting to pick up four more strikeouts.

Griffey's hits were three of 11 for the Reds as they tagged the Braves' Phil Niekro for his 20th loss against 16 victories.

A Griffey double and a single by Danny Driessen gave the Reds a 1-0 lead in the first inning. Pete Rose's single, Griffey's triple and George Foster's RBI groundout gave Cincinnati two more runs in the third. The Reds added three in the fifth, two coming on Griffey's 12th homer, and Rose's second single and 202nd hit of the season led to Cincinnati's final run in the seventh.

Jim Lonborg served up a Montreal run in the first on a Dave Cash double and an Andre Dawson sacrifice fly but took advantage of a nine-hit Philadelphia attack to post his 11th victory against four defeats.

Luzinski opened the second inning with 39th home run and Hehner followed with his 18th. Maddox made it a club first when he connected for No. 14.

## Kansas City 8 Seattle 5

**KANSAS CITY (UPI)** — Hal McRae knocked in three runs with a homer and two doubles in Kansas City's 8-5 victory Friday night over the California Angels, giving the Royals their 101st victory of the season, a record for wins by an expansion team.

It was Kansas City's second straight victory which helped the Royals break the previous record of 100 wins by the 1969 New York Mets. The 101 victories are also the most by an American League team since 1971 when the Baltimore Orioles and Oakland A's both won that many.

McRae doubled in a run in Kansas City's four-run first inning, hit back-to-

back homers with Amos Otis in the second and ripped his league-leading 54th double to knock in the Royals' final run in the sixth.

Marty Pattin, the third Kansas City pitcher, benefitted from McRae's offensive spurge to up his record to 10-3.

## Pittsburgh 3 Chicago 1

**PITTSBURGH (UPI)** — John Candelaria went 2-for-2 and scattered seven hits Friday night to become the first player of Puerto Rican descent to win 20 games in one season while leading the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 3-1 victory over the Chicago Cubs.

The 23-year old left-hander from Brooklyn, N.Y., who pitches in almost constant pain due to a chronic back ailment, became the first Pirate 20-game winner since Vernon Law accomplished that feat in 1960 with a 20-9 record. Candelaria finished the season with a 20-5 mark.

## Texas 4 Oakland 1

**ARLINGTON, Tex. (UPI)** — Rookie Keith Smith singled in the game-winning run and veteran Bert Campaneris knocked in two more for insurance in a three-run seventh-inning that gave Texas a 4-1 win over the Oakland A's and assured the Rangers at least a tie for second-place in the American League's West Division.

## Detroit 5 New York 2

**NEW YORK (UPI)** — John Hiller, pressed into a starting role because of injuries to the pitching staff, turned in a gutsy seven-hitter in only his eighth start of the year and Rusty Staub drove in three runs Friday night, enabling the Detroit Tigers to defeat New York 5-2 and prevent the Yankees from clinching the American League East title.

Hiller, regarded as one of baseball's top relievers, struggled through the first five innings but stranded nine runners during that period then settled down and allowed just two hits over the last four innings to register his eighth victory against 14 losses.

It marked the second loss in a row for the Yankees, who now must win one of their final two games with Detroit or hope that the Boston Red Sox lose one of their remaining two games to Baltimore in order to clinch the title.

## Boston 11 Baltimore 10

**BOSTON (UPI)** — Jim Rice drove in five runs with four hits and Carlton Fisk drove in four runs with a pair of two-run doubles to pace the Boston Red Sox to an 11-10 victory over Baltimore, eliminating the Orioles from title contention in the American League East.

Baltimore went down fighting as it had all year by scoring three runs in the ninth inning. But it wasn't quite enough.

Boston moved to within two games of the New York Yankees, who were defeated, 5-2, by Detroit. The Red Sox can only tie the Yanks if they win their next two and New York loses its two.

## St. Louis 7 New York 2

**ST. LOUIS (UPI)** — Garry Templeton drove in three runs with three singles, raising his season hit total to 197, and Lou Brock stole two bases, giving him 900 career thefts and 35 for the season as the St. Louis Cardinals downed the New York Mets, 7-2, in the first game of a two-night doubleheader.

With one out in the fifth, losing starter Jackson Todd, 36, walked Brock, who promptly stole second base. Brock took third on Jerry Mumphrey's single and, after Mumphrey stole second, both runners scored when Templeton bounced a single over first base.

Winner John Denny, 8-8, got off to a 7-0 start this season, but lost eight straight decisions after returning from a leg injury. The right-hander struck out two and walked three.

Ken Reitz gave St. Louis a 1-0 lead in the second with his 17th homer and Brock's RBI single and second stolen base preceded Mumphrey's run-scoring single for two insurance runs in a three-run eighth. Pinchhitters Ed Kranepool and John Stearns had RBI singles for New York in the seventh.

## Milwaukee 7 Minnesota 5

**MILWAUKEE (UPI)** — Cecil Cooper's two-run homer in the fifth inning Friday night tied a Milwaukee record for most hits in a season — 189 — and gave the Brewers a 7-5 victory over the Minnesota Twins in a game shortened by rain to 4-1/2 innings.

## Philadelphia 9 Montreal 4

**PHILADELPHIA (UPI)** — The National League Eastern Division champion Philadelphia Phillies used consecutive second-inning home runs by Greg Luzinski, Richie Hebner and Garry Maddox to take command Friday night and coast to a 9-4 decision over the Mon-



