

Monroeville set for FC showdown

The stage is nearly complete for the showdown battle in the Firelands Conference.

Monroeville romped to a 41-0 win over Mapleton Friday, raising its record to 6-2 overall, 4-1 in the conference.

Tonight, Edison entertains Black River.

The Chargers are presently 4-0 in the FC, 7-0 overall.

A win by coach Jim Whittington's crew would set the stage for Monroeville's visit to Edison next Saturday night.

Defense, as usual, was the name of the game for Monroeville.

For the sixth time this season, the Eagles won by the shutout route.

In fact, all eight Monroeville contests have been decided by shutouts. In their only two losses, the Eagles were blanked.

That, however, was not the case Friday.

The 41 points is the most scored by Monroeville during the four-year tenure of coach Steve Ringholz.

The last time a Monroeville team scored that many points came on Oct. 29, 1976 when the Eagles blasted Western Reserve by a 42-6 margin.

Friday's win over Mapleton was truly an awesome showing by the Eagles.

The yielded just three first downs, 13 yards rushing, 22 yards passing and 35 yards total offense.

Meanwhile, the offense churned for 231 yards on the ground and added 96 through the air for 327 yards total offense.

Tony Ames broke the ice for Monroeville on a plunge to paydirt from one yard away and Tom Roth booted the conversion for a 7-0 lead with 5:45 left in the first quarter.

The Eagles added a pair of touchdowns in the second period, both on passing plays.

First, Fred Leber scored on a 27-yard pass interception return with 10 minutes left before the half and Roth kicked the conversion for a 14-0 lead.

Then, Dan Jordan rounded out the first half scoring. He hauled in a 26-yard pass from Dave Keszei with just nine seconds left before inter-

mission and Roth converted for a 21-0 lead.

In the third period, John Smith went in from the three to up the lead to 27-0.

Smith came back three minutes later, scoring from the one with 10:11 left in the game and Roth booted the conversion for a 34-0 advantage.

With just 1:39 left, Roger Smith went 17 yards to paydirt and Roth converted for the final 41-0 margin of victory.

Mapleton dips to 0-4-1 in the conference, 0-6-2 overall.

Western Reserve 16 Norwalk St. Paul 7

COLLINS — Western Reserve rallied from a 7-0 halftime deficit, scoring twice in the third quarter en route to a 16-7 triumph over Norwalk St. Paul.

Pat Pickett gave St. Paul, 4-4 overall and 2-3 in the FC, the early lead on a 12-yard scamper to the end zone in the opening period and Marc Weisenberger booted the conversion for a 7-0 lead.

On its first possession of the second half, Western Reserve drove 64 yards in 10 plays with Gary Perkins going the final 29 around the right side.

A pass from Perkins to Randy Chase for the two-point conversion was good and gave the Roughriders the lead for good.

The Roughriders, now 4-2-2 overall and 2-1-2 in the conference, added an insurance score later in the third quarter as Perkins plunged to the end zone from one yard away. A pass from Scott Emerick to Todd Woods was good for the two-point PAT and the final 16-7 count.

Perkins, who started the season at quarterback for coach Dick Taylor's team, rambled for 193 yards in 32 carries.

In all, Western amassed 305 yards total offense with 279 coming on the ground.

St. Paul totaled just 128 with 123 coming on the ground.

The Flyers, however, were without their top two receivers in Dan Leiber and Brian Missler. Both are out with injuries.

Ball control keys Laker win

LAKESIDE — Danbury High School has now found the key to winning football...play only conference games.

After a dismal 0-4 start against non-conference opponents, the Lakers have rolled up four victories in a row in the Lakeshore Conference, the latest victim being the Seneca East Tigers by a score of 13-10 Friday night.

Danbury totally controlled the line of scrimmage against the larger Tigers as they ground out 290 yards in a game that saw only three completed passes. Laker coach Jeff Warnicke praised the entire offensive line for the kind of holes that allowed fullback Steve Adams to rush for 150 yards on 16 carries and tailback Mark Sauvey to go for 124 yards in 25 carries.

It was the hard-nosed Adams who accounted for the first score of the game when he broke through a gap in the Tiger line, cut back, and sprinted 71 yards to paydirt with 3:21 to go in the first quarter. Senior Bill Bailey booted the PAT and the Lakers were up 7-0.

Following a Seneca East punt, Danbury went right back to their horses in a nine play drive that covered 54 yards. The bullish Sauvey put the Lakers up by 13

when he burst over from six yards out with 9:34 to play in the half. Bailey's kick sailed wide right and the score stayed at 13-0.

Just as the situation was starting to look hopeless, Seneca East got a break that turned the momentum and almost the game around. Facing a fourth and 14 on their own 23, Tiger punter Buddy Caudill dropped the snap from center and was chased by three Laker defenders before he got the punt off. But from near disaster came the Tiger's lone touchdown as Danbury's receiver fumbled and an alert Lew Smith scooped up the loose ball and legged it 51 yards for the score. Freshman Doug Bagent kicked a perfect PAT and suddenly it was only 13-7 with 1:13 remaining in half.

With momentum on their side, the Tigers looked like a new club to begin the second half as they forced a Danbury fumble on the first seise and proceeded to play a little ground control of their own. Eight rushes, mostly by Smith, netted 46 yards and left them with fourth down and goal to go on the two yard line. Feeling confident that his team would see more opportunities to score, Tiger coach Pat Holbert elected not to try one more against the stern Danbury defense and Bagent drilled home a 19-yard field goal with 6:54 to play in the third

period to make it 13-10. But confidence elapsed along with the clock as the Lakers controlled the line and the ball for the remainder of the third and most of the final period.

"This was our biggest game of the year so far and we were extremely pleased with our ball control and running game," Warnicke said. "Now we have to get ready for the league clincher against Ottawa Hills next week."

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Heafner, Holland team up for lead

LAKE BUENA VISTA, Fla. (UPI) — Vance Heafner and Mike Holland turned in a 10-under-par 62 Friday to hold onto a two-stroke lead after the second round of the National Team Golf Championship despite a course-record 58 by Barry Jaeckel and Gary McCord.

Jaeckel and McCord had 14 birdies — seven on each nine — and are now 20-under-par after two rounds.

"We did the all-time ham-and-egg job," said Jaeckel. "We shot 58 because each of us made birdies on different holes. We didn't do anything spectacular. We might have made a couple of 20 footers, but that's it."

McCord paced the team with eight birdies and dropped a 20-footer on the 18th hole to steal the record from Jeff Hewes and Sammy Rachels, who shot 59 earlier in the day and were among six teams four shots behind the leaders at 126, 18-under-par.

Heafner and Holland held onto the lead by playing a steady, if unspectacular round Friday. They teamed up for 10 birdies and after two days are on a tournament-record pace at 122, 22-under-par.

Heafner had seven of the team's 10 birdies, four of them on the back nine. He drew praise from his teammate.

"I've been riding so much I feel like Gene Autrey," Holland said. "Vance made seven birdies and I let some real good chances go by... like at eight and nine."

But Heafner said it was his teammate's play that has allowed him to open up and go for broke in the best-ball tournament that offers a \$65,000 first prize.


"The trade-off is that I've made a few birds — but Mike has it there for pars so I can run at it. It can go the other way, too."

Barry Harwell and Lyn Lott, who were tied for the lead Thursday, faltered to a 66 Friday and are among the group of six teams at 18-under-par, four shots behind the leaders.

They started their round with three straight birdies but slowed in the middle holes. They still think they have a shot at first place, however.

"Tomorrow will be a big day," said Harwell. "Vance and Mike can't keep the pace — unless they start real fast."

Last year's winners, Danny and David Edwards, are also four shots back. They are hoping to become

the first team to win the team tournament twice.

"You don't start looking (to win) until the last nine holes," Danny Edwards said. "It's still pretty open."

All alone three shots behind the leaders is the team of Jim Boors and Tim Norris. They shot a 10-under par 62 Friday.

Plymouth streak extended to 19

ONTARIO — Plymouth's winless streak was stretched to 19 last evening as Ontario handed them a 34-0 setback.

The host managed only one first half touchdown as Jeff Shook scored from four yards out with 9:03 showing on the clock. Shook also added the extra point from placement.

The drive which followed the opening kickoff covered 58 yards in seven plays.

The Warriors added three third period scores as Craig Papst tallied from the three, Shook busted in from the four and with 48 seconds left Steve Riley raced 30-yards for six points.

Shook scored his third touchdown of the night with 7:15 left in the game. This one came on a nine yard run and ended a 32 yard drive.

Ontario finished the game with 293 yards in total offense, of which 286 were on the ground. Plymouth ended with 81 yards on 26 rushing and 55 passing.

The Big Red close out their 1981 home season this Friday as they host Fostoria St Wendelin.
