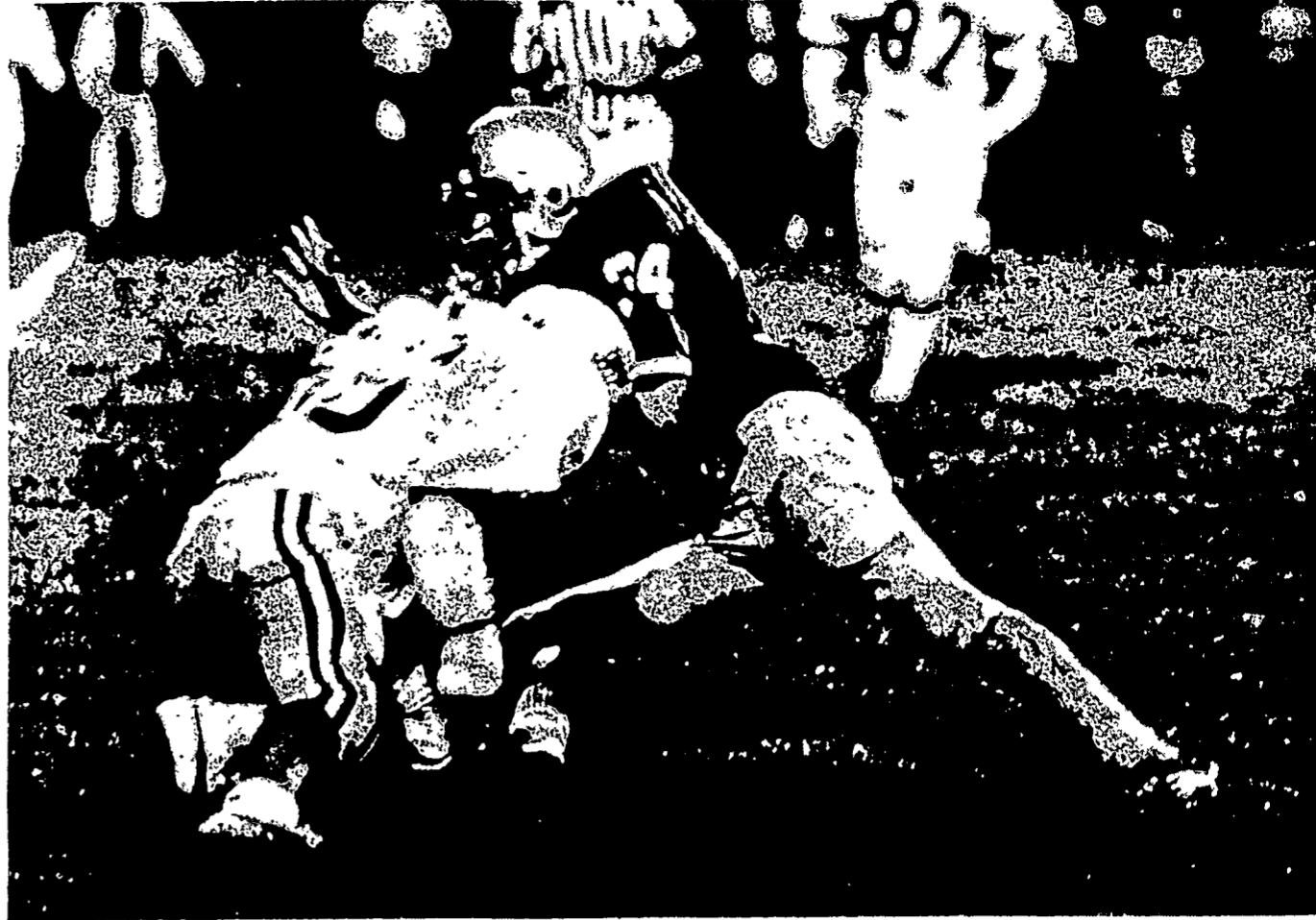

### Interception on last play preserves 14-7 win

# Whippets survive big scare from Lexington

The fans couldn't have asked for a more exciting football game with a greater slam-bang finish than the one Shelby and Lexington played Friday at Skiles Field.

For the Shelby Whippets coaching staff, however, the contest left a lot to be desired.

"I don't know what to say except Lexington was a good, fired up team and we made too many mistakes," said Shelby Head Coach Bill Varble, after the Whippets topped the Minutemen, 14-7, needing an intercepted pass in the end zone to halt Lexington's potential winning drive on the last play of the game.

"It was a case of mental attitude, I suppose," continued Varble, whose Whippets are now 2-0 for the season. "We had three major penalties and a lot of inconsistent blocking. Those things can't happen again, that's for sure."

Defensive halfback Tim Sherman saved the bacon for the Whippets on the game's final play, stepping in front of a pass from Lexington quarterback Bob Kennedy intended for wingback Vince Klebacha and picking it off as the final five seconds elapsed. Lexington had driven from its own 25 yard line in less than one minute to set up the spectacular conclusion.

"We let it slip away from us," said Roger Ebersole, Whippet assistant coach in charge of the offense. "We had one good, long drive, and we played well when we inserted the young backfield, but we didn't play well often enough."

"There was a lack of intensity," commented Ron Stepsis, who handles the defense. "We just seem to turn on and off like a light."

The Whippets got the scoring they needed when Brad Nothacker took off on a 59-yard jaunt down the near sideline

with 6:49 to play in the first half. The scoring run capped a 76-yard, six-play drive.

The Shelby lead was short-lived, as the Minutemen scored on their possession following the kickoff. Lexington drove 62 yards in 12 plays, with Kennedy punching his way across from the two-yard line to score. Doug Orr hit the extra point and the count was

7-7 at 1:39 until intermission.

The key play in Lexington's TD drive was a pass interference call against Shelby on a third down, eight yards-to-go situation, giving the Minutemen new life at the Whippets' 35 yard line. Kennedy also hooked up on passes with tailback Jim Alexander for 18 yards and Craig Donnan for nine.

Neither team could generate an attack in the third period. Shelby picked up two first downs to none for Lexington, but could not mount a sustained effort.

The Whippets did threaten once in the third frame, after Dave Ramey intercepted a Kennedy ariel and returned it to the Lexington 27 yard line. The Whippets got as far as the 11, but stalled there. Nothacker attempted a 28-yard field goal, but it went wide to the left.

The Whippets got the winning touchdown on the first possession of the fourth quarter as Curtis Reed, who gained 108 yards on 27 carries for the night, went over from less than a yard out. That score capped a 63-yard march in a dozen plays, including a fourth down and three conversion, handled by Reed.

For the rest of the game, it was the 'irresistible force' against the 'immovable object.'

The force was nearly with Lexington.

The Minutemen had three more possessions. The first one died when a Kennedy to Greg Betscher pass failed to make the distance needed for a first down. The second one ended when linebacker Bob Boroff stripped the ball from an intended receiver, giving Shelby the pigskin at its 39 yard line.

The Whippets, however, couldn't advance the ball, and on Lexington's third chance, they almost made good.

With a fourth and 10 at their 40 yard line, Kennedy completed a pass to Klebacha to the Shelby 44. He then hit Corey Lukkarila with a pass to Shelby's nine-yard stripe to stop the clock with



five seconds to play. One last pass, however, fell into Sherman's hands to conclude the wild affair.

"We were worried," said Varble. "They pressured us constantly - both offensively and defensively. As the game got longer they got stronger."

Shelby outgained the Minutemen 222-59 on the ground. The Whippets' quarterback Dave Hiatt hit on two of five pass attempts, one to Reed for 16 yards and one to Steve Stine for nine. Nothacker collected 97 yards rushing on 13 carries.

Kennedy threw 25 times, completing 10 for 124 yards. Sherman had two interceptions, and Ramey and Boroff each had one.

Bob Mahon and Ray Lewis led the tackling with nine each. Boroff added seven stops.

Shelby had 16 first downs to Lexington's 14.

The Whippets will host Ashland in the final non-league game Friday.

## Navratilova dumps top-seeded Evert-Lloyd

NEW YORK (UPI) — Martina Navratilova will have trouble topping herself today.

She and Chris Evert Lloyd put on a world-beating show Friday in the semifinals of the U.S. Open, exchanging crisp ground-strokes and impossible lobs for two hours and 12 minutes before the former Czech citizen prevailed, 7-5, 4-6, 6-4

over Evert, the tournament's top seed.

It left 18,588 fans breathless, but there was unfinished business for the fourth-seeded Navratilova — the final today against No. 3 seed Tracy Austin.

Earlier, Austin disposed of 11th-seeded Barbara Potter, 6-1, 6-3, who certainly wasn't the same opposition as Evert, five-time winner of this tournament. Austin

won the title in 1979, the only time since 1975 Evert didn't do it.

It will be the first time for Navratilova, who owns a 15-10 lifetime edge over Austin.

Evert made the first break of the final set, in the third game, and it seemed she would be able to run-out the match. But Navratilova broke back at love in the eighth game.
