Colwell takes bad with the good

"You have to take the bad with the good, but you can't fault the defense and it's hard to believe we lost 9-0 the way they played," said Sandusky coach Jim Colwell after his team's loss to Columbus Eastmoor.

"We didn't have spirited practice sessions this week and we had to pull teeth for them to do something."

"Eastmoor certainly has some outstanding defensive personnel. They are not only big, but quick," offered Colwell.

"You can't give a defensive team like they had field position time and again because they will move you back to the wall and suddenly they are on the 20. The defense played its heart out, but the offense couldn't do

anything.

"Last year we had that one lucky strike (a 21-yard touchdown pass) to beat them, 6-0, and we realized we were going to have to pass to beat them," Colwell noted.

"Troy (LaCourse) hit the first three passes he tried, but we didn't get a first down, then he overthrew the receivers twice and had both picked off," Colwell said.

"Bob Stuart (Eastmoor coach) used his best runners this year and that was a big difference from last year when the quarterback had the ball in key situations," Colwell added.

Eastmoor had a strong one-two punch in tailback Carl Clinton and fullback Greg Smith. Both ran for

more than 100 yards. Clinton wound up with 109 in 20 carries and Smith added 101 in 18 rushes.

However, Sandusky's defense also came up with nine tackles for minus yardage, but the Warriors had the big gainers every so often, while SHS runners ran into stone walls time after time.

"That Kee is a big-time player. He literally blew in on Troy in the last couple of minutes twice without anyone touching him and we were supposed to block down inside," Colwell explained.

"We had only 79 yards rushing last year and 102 yards overall and tonight we didn't even get near that figure. They had eight people back on defense from that team and they

were around no matter what we tried. It was frustrating," Colwell said.

"We are going to have to start over next week against Woodward, but must be more intent all week long," he concluded.

Bob Tucker, an assistant coach at Ohio State University, noted at halftime that Eastmoor had three players the Buckeyes were looking at carefully, including Kee and Bryon Lee, 6-3, 220-pound defensive end.

"I saw them play before and they are awesome on defense and we believe they are capable of playing football for us," the Sandusky High graduate stated.

Armbrecht sparks Margaretta blitz

BELLEVILLE — "Our defense really did the job," a jubilant coach Dana Woodring said following Margaretta's 34-6 non-conference win over host Clear Fork Friday.

"They loved to run the inside, but our three men in the middle, Jeff Bauer, Jeff Armbrecht and Mike Hula, did an outstanding job in shutting them off," Woodring said.

The Polar Bears dropped a 14-0 decision to Edison in their opener and fumbled on 10 occasions, lost six and also had two interceptions. The mistakes were reduced considerably, however, as they lost only two fumbles in the win over the Colts.

Margaretta's defense accounted for the first score of the evening as a blocked punt by Steve Armbrecht enabled senior Ted Keller to pick it up and race 35 yards for the touchdown. This came with 5:03 left in the first period.

The green and white then put together a six-play, 70-yard drive as Armbrecht burst over from the five yard stripe with 10:31 left in the half. He also added the bonus points on a run.

The Polar Bears were not yet finished in the first half as an Armbrecht interception eventually led to his seven-yard run. This drive covered 24 yards in seven plays and enabled the SBC member to take a 20-0 lead into the lockerroom at the intermission.

"I am also very pleased with the way our offensive unit executed this evening," the third-year mentor added, "we really bounced back after that loss of last week. Another good point was that we got everyone into the game."

In the second half the Bears put a 66 yard drive to good use with Armbrecht scoring his third six pointer of the night. It came from the seven with 4:05 showing on the clock. Senior Tim Dwight then added his first of two conversions from placement.

The Colts of Clear Fork came back to tally their only points of the evening as quarterback Mark Hauger hit Perry Walker on a 30-yard scoring pass with just 1:24 remaining in the period. The two-point pass attempt was knocked down.

Just 14 seconds later, Margaretta was back on the score board as 165-pound senior Charlie Dalton took the ensuing kickoff at the Bear 25, went up the middle and, at the 45-yard stripe, broke into the open and

went in untouched for a 75-yard kickoff return. The point by placement ended the scoring for both teams with the clock showing 1:10 left in the third period.

The Polar Bears managed to churn up 179 yards on the ground and added 69 by the airways for an evening total of 248 yards. Clear Fork netted just 26 yards rushing with 86 added by passing for a total of 112.

Sophomore Randy Fredrick ended up as the leading ball carrier as he toted the pigskin eight times for 47 yards. Armbrecht, 183-pound senior halfback, ended with 46 yards in 10 attempts. Mike Payne was the leading receiver with two receptions for 59 yards.

Margaretta now stands at 1-1 for the season and will play host to Oak Harbor on Friday evening.

The Pirates did fashion a fine nine-play drive that got them down to the Sailor 33 yard line on their first second half possession. The key play in that drive was a 28-yard gain on a double-reverse by flanker Roy Matthews.

That was as close as the Pirates would come the rest of the night, while Vermilion added one last score in the fourth quarter.

It came with 9:20 remaining as Doug Rice went six yards for a score to finish a 13-play, 67-yard drive. Brownell added his third extra point.

Budka keyed the Sailor running attack with 118 yards in 27 carries,

while Hurd finished with 134 yards in completing 11 of 17 passes.

Vermilion coach Paul Mentis had praise for both.

"He (Hurd) is learning every week. His receivers are beginning to learn their patterns, and we are beginning to develop a little bit of a passing game," Mentis said.

"We've had good receivers a couple of years, but didn't feel we had the right kind of quarterback (for a passing game). Last year, we had a good running attack, so we didn't try to exploit the passing game. This year we felt we had a tall, intelligent, talented quarterback who could throw for us."

"Budka is a good runner. We have several good running backs, and the offensive line is coming along," Mentis said. "We started with some new kids, but we have some very aggressive kids."

That was what Stauffer was worried about, and his fears were realized.

"They controlled the line of scrimmage, which is one of the things we were worried about... them being bigger than us," Stauffer said. "They really brought it to us."

Stauffer used Greg Butler, a junior, in the first half, and alternated him with senior Greg Butcher at the quarterback spot in the second half, and he admitted the job was still up in the air.

"We've got to find out who's there by the time we get into the conference," he said. "We can't be switching around then."
