NBA roundup

Detroit drops Bucks, 118-113

The 36th NBA season opened at 10 sites Friday night and a powerful rookie crop debuted with all the authority of a Darryl Dawkins slam dunk.

In Pontiac, Mich., point guard Isaiah Thomas, the second player chosen in the draft, scored 31 points and had 11 assists in his pro debut to lead the Detroit Pistons to a 118-113 victory over the Milwaukee Bucks.

Thomas, who led Indiana to the NCAA Championship as a sophomore last year, scored 10 of his points in the third quarter to keep Detroit close and had four key assists in the last nine minutes of the game to pull it out for a team that won only 21 times last season.

Phil Hubbard scored 20 points, John Long had 16 and rookie forward Kelly Tripucka, the 12th player selected overall, added 15 as the Bucks missed the services of All-Star forward Marques Johnson, who is embroiled in a contract dispute and was placed on the suspended list Thursday.

Sidney Moncrief led Milwaukee with 22 points.

"He's got the darn nerves of a darn burglar," said Detroit Coach Scotty Robertson of Thomas, a 20-year-old former Olympian with the poise of a 10-year veteran. "Don't you just love the way he plays? He's not going to play 82 games like that, but he's used to the pressure because of his background."

Bucks' guard Brian Winters isn't sure he's looking at the same team that finished 39 games behind Milwaukee in the Central Division last season.

"They surprised me," Winters said. "I knew they'd be better, but I didn't know they'd be that much better. Tripucka surprised me with how good he was, really."

Another rookie who quickly overcame first-night jitters was Indiana center Herb Williams, the 14th player selected in the

draft.

Williams tipped in a pass from out of bounds with three seconds remaining as the Pacers stunned Chicago 96-94. Williams and Chicago guard Ricky Sobers both tipped the ball and it popped up, then dropped through the hoop, giving the Pacers only their second lead of the game.

"Herb Williams is a fine player and a good addition to the Pacers," was the first impression of Chicago Coach Jerry Sloan. "As a first-round draft pick he is a vital part of the team and proved just that tonight."

Billy Knight paced five Pacers in double figures with 20 points. Chicago center Artis Gilmore scored a game-high 25.

Elsewhere, the world champion Boston Celtics routed Washington 124-100, Philadelphia trounced Cleveland 128-104, New York beat New Jersey 103-99, San Antonio whipped Kansas City 113-102, Denver defeated Golden State 124-121, Utah downed Dallas 105-89, Portland topped Phoenix 103-95, and Houston nipped Los Angeles 113-112 in double overtime.

Celtics-124, Bulls 100

Boston placed five players in double figures to outclass Washington, which has only three players in uniform back from last year's team. Robert Parish hit on 9-of-10 shots from the floor in scoring a game-high 22 points for the Celtics — who received the NBA championship trophy from Commissioner Lawrence F. O'Brien before the game.

76ers 128, Cavaliers 104

Julius Erving poured in 27 points as Philadelphia rolled in the Spectrum, where the 76ers posted a league-best 37-4 record last season. Philadelphia shot an astounding 76 percent from the field through three quarters. The Cavaliers dropped their 13th straight decision in Philadelphia.

Buckeye Central survives scare; drop Carey, 6-2

CAREY — The jinx was broken but the Buckeye Central Bucks had to rely on a late drive for the Bucks to claim a 6-2 win over Carey.

The win gave the Bucks the outright North Central Conference championship with one game left in the season. The Bucks finish the season when they host Colonel Crawford on Saturday.

The win raised the Bucks record to 9-0 overall and 8-0 in the NCC while Carey fell to 4-4-1 and 3-4-1 in the league.

Carey got on the scoreboard first in the second period when they tackled BC's Mark Houston in the endzone with 7:28 left in the first half.

Buckeye Central took the lead on a three yard run by Chet Johnson which was set up by a 17 yard run by sophomore tailback Randy Payne.

The extra point kick was blocked when the Bucks only had 10

men on the field.

For the night Johnson was limited to 47 yards on 13 carries.

"Last night I think some of our problems were going down to Carey and we had never won there along with all of the attention we had gotten this week," said BC coach Bill Pierce in reference to his teams poor play for the game.

"We played a poor game both offensively and defensively but we had one good run at them offensively late in the game," said Pierce. "We played poorly against a good football team and it almost cost us."
