Streaks reach halfway point with blend for banner season

What's this, Sandusky throwing the football 23 times in one game!

"We're going to continue to throw the ball. We've had our receivers open time and again, but couldn't hit them tonight, but we are going to keep the defenses honest," Coach Jim Colwell warned following the Streaks' fifth win of the season Friday to reach the halfway mark of the season undefeated.

Ranked No. 6 in this week's UPI Class AAA poll, Sandusky's 19-6 Buckeye Conference win over Lorain wasn't a thing of beauty, but Colwell felt it coming.

"We were sky-high last week for Findlay and the kids were not mentally ready for tonight's game. You can't fool kids anymore, they watched the films and knew Lorain didn't have an offense," Colwell said.

"We warned them about the garbage plays and they came up with a couple that burned us, but overall our defense played well and they keep trying to get that shutout," Colwell continued.

The Streaks scored three touchdowns.

The first was an 84-yard drive following the opening kickoff which consumed more than six minutes and 15 plays before senior tailback Richard Twine scored at the 5:38 mark of the opening period. Alan Antel booted the PAT for a 7-0 lead.

That was all the scoring in the first half although Lorain threatened early in the second period, but a 30-yard field goal attempt by Baron Roule hit the upright.

Sandusky struck quickly in third period.

In fact, the defense scored first.

On the first play from scrim-

mage in the second half, Lorain's backup quarterback, Mike Repko, attempted to roll out and was suddenly popped.

Before anyone realized it, the Streaks had six points on the board.

Junior defensive tackle Darryl Wilson wound up picking up the fumble and racing 23 yards to paydirt. "He was on the opposite side of the field and he pursued the play and I didn't know what happened until I noticed Darryl going in for the score," Colwell said.

The final tally also came quickly.

It took Sandusky just 21 seconds to hit paydirt after the offensive unit moved on the field for the first time in the second half.


After an eight-yard Lorain punt gave the Streaks great field position at their own 46, two passes fell incomplete.

With third and 10, Twine scampered around the left side after a pitch from quarterback Bret Ninke. Twine was hemmed in, but alertly rambled back against the grain and literally outran the defenders for a 54-yard touchdown gallop.

The Streaks tried for thw two-point conversion, but Ninke's pass was a trifle to hard, and dropped by the intended receiver.

Lorain, which had five different players throw the ball in using the tight end pass and the halfback pass in the repertoire, scored with 3:50 remaining in the contest. Repko, who replaced starter Chuck Muzio in the second half, bulledin from the two on fourth down after twice coming up with key passes in the 33-yard drive.

"Lorain couldn't run on us and we applied some pressure on their passers. Alan Antel was all over the field and Ulysses



Kirskey came up with a couple of big plays. One time, Lorain had second and goal at the five and Kirskey comes up with one sack, then Alan comes back on the very next play to throw Repko for a six-yard loss. I felt we had a good chance for the shutout at that point," Colwell said.

The Streaks, 2-0 in the conference, finished with 192 yards rushing and 90 passing.

Ninke was 5-for-16 in the air, while backup quarterback Milt Pritt was 1-for-5 and even Twine attempted two halfback passes.

"Our offensive line blocking was pretty good, but Lorain bunched everyone inside and we managed to break a couple of long runs, but mistakes also hurt us. We had a 44-yard gain called back by a penalty when we didn't have enough players on the line of scrimmage. The wingback was supposed to step up and the tight end drop back, but he forgot to," Colwell explained.

"We had a long drive last week and to come out with one tonight was a good sign," Colwell said. Twine keyed the march with a 27-yard sprint on a third and 25 play from the Sandusky 11 after the second major penalty in the drive.

Another big play came on fourth and 8 from the Lorain 22 when Ninke found Randy Moore all alone over the middle and Moore churned his legs until he was finally wrestled down at the three. Twine got the call three

times and finally slid outside from the two for the touchdown.

Lorain, 3-2 overall and opening its Buckeye season, managed just 45 yards on the ground in 36 rushes.

However, the Steelmen clicked on seven of 24 passes for 164 yards, including 53 and 41-yard receptions by wingback Randy Jarvis who slipped behind the Streaks both times.

The Streaks came up with two more interceptions, including the fourth of the season by Clark who carried the ball just three times, but rambled 29 yards on his first carry of the night, another key play in the opening scoring drive.

Twine finished the night with 84 yards on 14 carries.

The Streaks go on the road next week against Marion, then return to Strobel Field to face Elyria and Barberton.

All three opponents have had their problems this season, and Colwell feels his staff will have to do some talking to get the Streaks ready the next three weeks.

"I can't stress enough how important it is for us to be mentally prepared every week. We still have a long way to go," Colwell concluded.

Orioles sweep to stay alive!

Angels assured of tie for flag

They were blasting the hit song "Staying Alive" in Baltimore's Memorial Stadium Friday night.

Eddie Murray and Cal Ripken each slammed a two-run home run, helping the Baltimore Orioles complete a dramatic double-header sweep of the Milwaukee Brewers with a 7-1 victory that kept them alive in the American League East.

The double-header marked the start of a four-game series between the Orioles and Brewers. Milwaukee still needs one victory to claim its first AL East title while if the Orioles sweep the series, they will capture the crown.

In the opener, Rich Dauer and Terry Crowley drove in two runs each and Ken Singleton belted his 14th home run to lead Baltimore to an 8-3 victory.

Lenn Sakata and rookie John Shelby added solo home runs in the nightcap off Mike Caldwell, 17-13, while rookie Storm Davis, 8-4, scattered six hits to notch his first complete game. Davis struck out five, walked four and escaped a second-inning jam where he walked the bases loaded with two outs before striking out Jim Gantner.

Murray's 32nd home run was a line shot over the left field fence in the first inning with Dauer aboard on a single. Benny Ayala singled and scored on Gary Roenicke's double to make the score 3-0.

Sakata's solo shot in the second was his sixth of the season and fifth of his career against Milwaukee. Shelby blasted his first major-league home run in the seventh and, after Dauer doubled, Ripken set an Oriole club record for a rookie with his 28th homer.

The Brewers ruined Davis' shutout bid in the seventh when Charlie Moore doubled and scored on Ganter's single.

In the first game, Dauer, who had three of the Orioles' 15 hits, had an RBI single in a three-run second and doubled across a fourth-inning run. Dennis Martinez, 16-12, got relief help from Tippy Martinez in beating Pete Vuckovich, 18-6.

Pinch hitter Crowley delivered a two-run single in the sixth after the Brewers had rallied to within 5-3.

In other games, Kansas City clubbed Oakland 12-7, Boston nipped New York 3-2 in 12 innings, Cleveland won the first game of a double-header 3-2 while Detroit took the nightcap 4-2, Minnesota edged Chicago 3-2 and Toronto blanked Seattle 2-0.

At Cleveland, Alan Trammell drove in two runs and Bill Fahey notched his first game-winning RBI of the season to pace the Tigers in the nightcap. In the opener, rookie Carmelo Castillo belted his second major-league

homer with one out in the bottom of the ninth to pace the Indians.

In a late game, California downed Texas 4-0.

At Anaheim, Calif., Geoff Zahn tossed a five-hitter and Fred Lynn belted his 20th home run, enabling the Angels to clinch at least a tie for the AL West championship. By completing his fourth shutout of the season, Zahn, who had never won more than 14 games in one year, improved his record to 18-8.

Danbury's Adams has 322 yards

TOLEDO — Danbury recorded its first win of the season, 34-14 over Northwood, thanks to a standout performance by senior Steve Adams.

The 185-pound running back toted the pigskin 27 times for a record-breaking 322 yards. He also scored three touchdowns, added two conversions from placement, and ran a two-point bonus giving him 22 points for the night.

Adams opened the scoring with a 60 yard run in the first period. His next two scores came in the second quarter on runs of 56 and 34 yards.

Andy Zuk and Glen Younce scored the Lakers other two touchdowns. Younce's came on a two yard run while Zuk was on the receiving end of a 11-yard pass play from Dave Mischler.

Northwood, which scored in the second and third periods, had Jim Russel race 55 yards into paydirt and Joe Vancena hit Ron McDaniel on a 70 yard pass play.

The Lakers recorded 412 yards of offense (360 on the ground and 52 in the air). Northwood had a balance attack of 294 yards with 147 on the ground and 147 in the air.

Edison runs Firelands win streak to 27 games

PLYMOUTH — Does history repeat itself?

In the case of Edison, it does.

Friday, the Chargers relied again on a strong fourth quarter showing to extend their Firelands Conference win streak to 27 straight with a 14-0 triumph over Plymouth in the first-ever meeting between the two schools.

Last week, Edison reached the end zone twice in the final period en route to a 14-7 victory over South Central.

Unbeaten in its last 29 conference outings, coach Jim Whittington's squad, struck paydirt twice in the final 10 minutes to ward off a strong Plymouth defensive effort.
