

### Carter moves to second on rushing list

Terry Carter had a rugged start. He fumbled twice in the first half, one of which his team lost.


However, the 180-pound Fremont tailback came back with vengeance Friday, especially in the second half to move into second place on the all-time rushing list.

Carter finished the night with 197 yards on 28 carries, and a pair of touchdowns, in leading the Little Giants to their come-from-behind 21-17 win over Sandusky.

He now has 2,836 yards in less than three seasons. Fremont has 7 more regular season games left.

The leader is Jim Tiller who rushed for 3,755 yards in four years (1953-56).

Carter passed up John (Big Thunder) Lewis who gained 2,787 yards in three seasons (1949-51). He already has unofficially 444 yards this year in three games, and a total of 65 carries.

## Cook: It just wasn't meant to be

Larry Cook has suffered his share of defeats, but nothing like the one the Sandusky football coach, his staff and his team had to digest Friday.

"It just wasn't meant to be. I'm sick to death. I really believe we outplayed them as far as the 48 minutes of football is concerned.

"However, we did not make the big play when we had to and Fremont did. Give them credit for that 84-yard drive that beat us," Cook said.

"We made some big defensive plays in that drive, but not the ones we needed to. They twice converted fourth-down plays. We forced them to go that long in 14 plays and we had to rise to the task somewhere along the long and just couldn't stop them," Cook explained.

"We played well and still should have won," Cook explained.

The Streaks dominated the first quarter and took a 14-0 lead.

Fremont fumbled on its first play from scrimmage and the Streaks had possession at the 16. Lorenzo Donald piled over the top on fourth and one for the first touchdown of the night at the 5:37 mark. He also kicked the extra point.

The Streaks scored again on their next possession and went 64 yards in three plays. Junior fullback Shon Grant exploded for a scintillating 69-yard touchdown run in which he broke several tackles and

high-stepped his way to play-dirt. That came after a 15-yard penalty against the Streaks. Donald again booted the PAT for a 14-0 lead with 2:09 left in the period.

However, Grant apparently pulled a hamstring on that run and was unable to return to the lineup.

"That hurt. He had 95 yards on 4 carries, and Shon also plays linebacker for us," Cook said.

In the first period, Sandusky had 124 yards on 13 rushes and Fremont 37 yards on just 7 carries.

The Streaks moved out to a 17-0 lead with 13 seconds left in

the half as Donald kicked a 21-yard field goal to cap a 72-yard march. The key play was a 40-yard pass from quarterback Brian Deming to wingback Scott Lazzara.

The celebration was short-lived.

Fremont struck for its first touchdown on the unbelievable pass play which came with no time on the clock.

"It was a fluke, but it was the biggest play of the game. We had a 17-0 lead and on a major high and they were on a major low until that point in time. I knew it really affected the young men and we tried everything we could at halftime

to get them up again. I think they were crushed at what happened and Fremont was now on the emotional high," Cook noted.

"We made some mistakes, but we also gave it all we had and that's all we can do. We will now have to get ready for the start of Erie Shore Conference play next week and I really believe our young men will bounce back," Cook said. Sandusky is at Lorain Friday.

Both teams are 2-1 overall. Fremont has beaten Sandusky in 10 of the last 11 meetings at Strobel Field since 1975.

## Oak Harbor rolls over Norwalk

NORWALK — Oak Harbor used a pair of quick scores at the end of the first half to pull away from Norwalk, 34-7, in non-conference play Friday.

The Rockets are now 3-0 on the season while the Trickers fall to 1-2.

"This was a good game to end the pre-season with," said Oak Harbor coach Gary Quisno. "We got everybody in so everyone had a chance to contribute."

Jon Thorbahn led the Rockets by hitting 8 of 15 passes for 170 yards and three touchdowns, while Bill Hubans chipped in with 41 yards rushing and 66 yards in receptions.

Thorbahn hooked up with Aaron McHale to get Oak Harbor on the board with 1:04 left in the first quarter, but Chris Garcia answered by taking the kickoff 89 yards for a score.

The Rockets pulled away late in the second period as Thorbahn hit McHale on a 56 yard scoring strike with 2:10 left to play, and then added a 49-yard touchdown pass to Hubans with :27 seconds remaining.

Oak Harbor made it 27-7 midway through the third quarter

when Jeff Zunk returned a Norwalk fumble 15 yards for a score, with Bill Scherf rambling in from the six with 4:54 left in the game to put the finishing touches on the game.

The Rockets had 279 yards total offense in the game, while limiting Norwalk to just 92.

"Our defense played well again," Quisno said. "We held them under 100 yards total offense, and that's pleasing to us, and our offense game up with some big plays."

The Trickers open Northern Ohio League play Friday by hosting Tiffin Columbian and Oak Harbor travels to Strobel Field to take on St. Mary's Central Catholic to start Sandusky Bay Conference play on Saturday.

### Clyde 7 Upper 2

CLYDE — A blocked punt in the third quarter set up the only touchdown of the night as Clyde handed Upper Sandusky a 7-2 loss Friday.

The Fliers' Scott Swartz swarmed all over Upper's punter and gave the host Fliers a first down at the Rams' 20.

Robert Brown bolted in from five yards out and Wade Noftz kicked the PAT to give Clyde a 7-0 lead.

Upper Sandusky scored with 15 seconds to play as Clyde deliberately took a safety by staying in the end zone on a punt attempt.

"We played well and held them actually to five first downs. They stopped our running attack and we couldn't do somethings passing but had trouble holding on to the passes. It's still nice to be 2-1," coach Bob Bishop said.

"We're not proficient at it yet," Bishop added.

"Now the fun begins," he added in reference to the opening of the SBC season next week. The Fliers face winless Edison.

### Firelands 34 Edison 0

MILAN — Firelands limited Edison's new run-and-shoot offense to just 96 yards total offense in a 34-0 rout Friday night.

The Falcons put a score on the board in every quarter, with Sean Landes collecting three.

Jason Buchs got Firelands rolling with a 15-yard return of an interception in the first quarter with Tim Youngless adding the extra point.

In the second, Jason Barhiemer went over from the three and Landes scampered in from the nine to move the Falcons out to a 21-0 advantage at the half.

Landes went in from the seven in the third quarter and bulldozed over from the one in the fourth to end the scoring.

Firelands rolled up 228 yards on the ground, while holding the Chargers to just 18 yards rushing.

Edison, now 0-3, opens Sandusky Bay Conference play on Friday hosting Clyde.
