

# Crestline Spoils Fredericktown Streak

## Tyger Lair ... Freds Lose First Time In Twenty

Tyger Coach Tom Pierson was a happier man last night as the Mansfield squad came closer to winning than they have all season.

Scoring more points in the game last night than they have scored in the previous six games combined, the Tygers lost to the McKinley Bulldogs by only 10 points (44-34).

"We could have won that one," Pierson said, "if only we'd have had the blocking in the first half that we had in the second."

It's a shame that the Tygers' best game of the season had to be played before the smallest crowd of the season.

McKinley Coach Jim Robinson startled fans when he appeared on the field sporting a white shirt and tie—no coat. A closer look via field glasses, however, showed that he at least had a sweater on under the shirt.

It was Dad's Night at Arlin Field. But only about 200 fans were in the stands when they were introduced.

The McKinley band had nine majorettes, but they weren't as good looking as ours. Not only did they keep their coats on during the halftime show, they did a chorus line routine without batons. It was good, but not as good as our gals do.

Now Ol' El Tygre digs those short skirts our majorettes wear, but he couldn't help feeling sorry for the gals, and the rest of the band members, as they stood coatless in the end zone while waiting their turn at halftime.

The Tyger Varsity Marching Band presented a show in honor of Veterans Day, Nov. 11. They will repeat the same show Sunday at Cleveland when the Browns play the Philadelphia Eagles.

A number of sophomores will be utilized by the Varsity band Sunday as replacements for those upper classmen who can't go. To prepare for the show, band members were scheduled to practice for an hour and a half this morning.

It started to snow during the fourth quarter. That was just too much for some "fair weather" fans — they left.

Tyger Center Fred Goettl was kept out of the game because of a mild case of blood poisoning. End John Nagle didn't play because of a bruised hip.

Sophomore Don Cole, normally a fullback, played halfback for the first time. He received a possible concussion in the game and was admitted to Peoples Hospital for observation.

The quartet of officials included a pair of men whose names shown on the sports pages of years gone by—Jim Langhurst and Norm Kies. Langhurst, former Willard High star, went on to fame as an Ohio State back while Kies at one time caught for the New York Yankees.

Fullback Bill Taylor, making his best all-round showing of 1959, established an Arlin Field record by quick kicking 72 yards in the final quarter. The left-footed boater blasted a low punt which went from his 10 to the McKinley 18 with a gratifying roll.

Taylor and End Tom Schadek were bears on defense which earned plaudits from the press box crew and a pat on the back from Pierson for "much improved play." Schadek also got off a 34-yard punt.

The Senior High Football Parents Club announced Woody Hayes, Ohio State coach, would speak at their annual fee for the Tyger grid team Dec. 7 at the school cafeteria.

Mansfield hadn't scored in 11 straight quarters until last night when it counted TD's in all but the second period. And in that canto the Tygers were stopped once on the 19 and had the ball on their 22 with second down when the half-time gun barked.

CRESTLINE — Fredericktown's reign as football king of the Mansfield area ground to a halt here last night. Living up to expectations, Crestline's Jerry Harbaugh and Chet Morton successfully led their mates to a 14-0 win over Fredericktown to annex the 1959 Mohican League crown and snap one of Ohio's longest eleven-man scholastic victory strings at 19. It was the first time the Freds had been blanked in 23 outings.

5,000 WATCH  
Well over 5,000 fans jammed the Crestline stadium for the game billed as one of the year's best in the Mansfield area, but the anxiously-awaited passing duel between Harbaugh and Fredericktown Quarterback Preston Leedy fell through. The 165-pound Freddy senior experienced one of his least effective nights in four years of varsity competition.

Harbaugh selected his team's plays carefully and correctly and hit on four of eight passes for 48 yards. Leedy connected on only three of 13 tosses for 24 yards, and Crestline's defenders were diagnosing his plays with amazing accuracy.

Except for Crestline's two touchdown drives, the game was strictly a defensive affair, with each team penetrating to the 25 once.

Morton went into the end zone standing up from the one to culminate an 80-yard, 15-play second period march for the Bulldog's first tally. "The Jet" gained 53 yards over land and grabbed a 12-yard toss from Harbaugh on the drive, which drew an extra 15 yards when Coach Ray Kennedy charged onto the turf to protest an official's ruling.

Crestline ground out 56 more yards in six plays following the second half kickoff, with Fullback Bill Burkhardt ramming through the middle from the three for the clincher. Morton gained 51 yards on that drive, with a 36-yard dash off-tackle setting up a fair, with each team penetrating to the 25 once.

HEAVY WALL  
Crestline's heavy defensive forward wall, manned by Jo Jo DiPietro, Dan Barker, Jim Moleno, and Dale Fetzer, and backed up by Rob Beck and Tom Hoffman nipped most of the Freddie effort at the bud. The smaller Freddie's held their own up the middle, where Larry Smith was the linebacker, but the Crestliners were able to move off-tackle and around end almost at will, gaining 229 yards to the Freddie's 96. Morton picked up 110 yards in 16 tries for Crestline, while Bob Kirkpatrick led the Freds with 56 in 17.

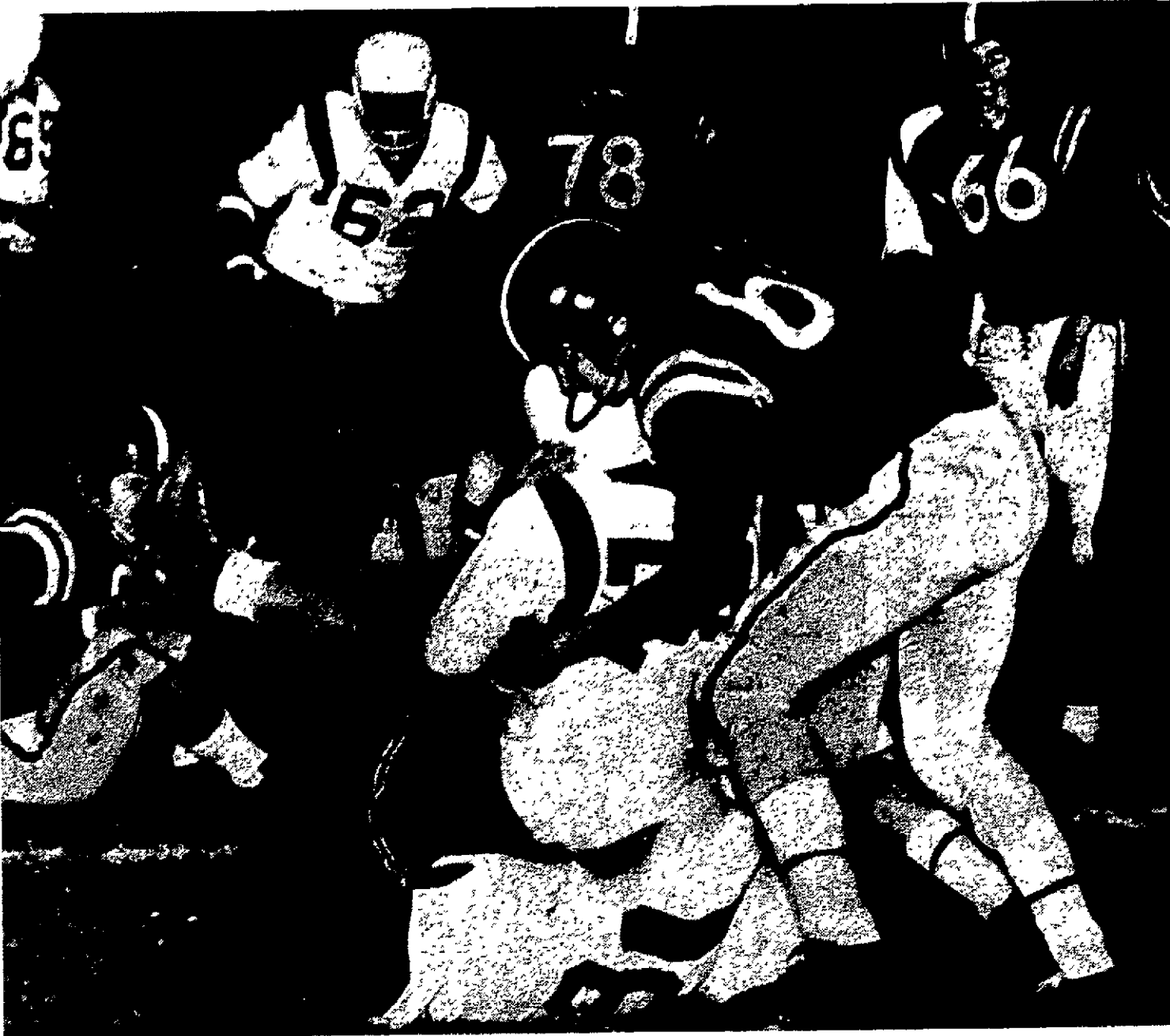

The win was the Pirates' 12th in a row and eighth this year while Mt. Gilead ended its football campaign with a 4-4 record.

Gary Crum, the Mansfield area's leading scorer, was held to one touchdown and a pair of conversion points but the hard-nosed halfback had a hand in every scoring drive mustered by the Pirates.

Mt. Gilead proved stubborn opposition and showed a trio of fine running backs in Mike Zeller, Steve Lee, and Jack Weller while Quarterback Jim Rutherford handled the club well.

After a scoreless first quarter, Cardington struck for two quick touchdowns before half-time to take a 14-0 lead. Fullback Doug Click smashed over from the seven and Freshman Larry Coomer zoomed 44 yards on a cutback.

Crum got the Pirates organized in the first drive firing a key 37-yard strike to End John Cooney after Center Ron Carsner recovered an Indian bobble on his own 31.

The second half touchdowns came when Crum went in from the two after connecting with a 19-yard strike to Coomer and the finale was tallied by Quarterback Bobby Sparks on a one-yard sneak.

Mt. Gilead exhibited an excellent defensive effort in trying to thwart Sparks' six-pointer when they held for three downs on the one.

Cardington, Mid-Ohio champions, racked up their seventh conference win while the Indians suffered their third MOC loss against four victories.
