Senior running back Brad Lewis had 93 yards rushing on 13 carries and sat out most of the final period.
The Bears scored in two plays when Lewis scored from 13 yards out at 9:37 of the first period for a 6-0 lead that was just a start. Then kicker Rodd Lane hit his first PAT and the energy surge started.

Three times he kicked the ball into the end zone on kickoffs despite a missed first quarter field goal set up by Todd Fisher's fumble recovery.

Lakota went four and out before the hosts took over at midfield and five plays later quarterback B.J. Thomas rained a 31 yard scoring strike to Andy Kennedy and Lane kicked the PAT for a 14-0 bulge.

The Raiders got a token four plays before Aaron Justice burst 23 yards for another score. Lane's kick missed but Margaretta was up 20-0.

In the next series, Thomas — who finished with 5 for 14 and 114 yards and a pair of scores — passed again, hitting Kennedy for a 46-yard TD as the first quarter clock ran out. A point-after pass failed but the 26-0 lead stood up.

In the second period, the teams used up the middle of the field to no avail before the Bears at midfield ground it down to the one in seven plays where Lewis, whose 24-yard run helped get them there, plunged in for a 32-0 lead with just 44 seconds remaining in the half.

The second half home team momentum continued as Tim Christian's 40-yard kickoff Margaretta kept them in good field position.

The hosts kicked their first punt midway through the period but using a Mike Brunner interception to get the ball, scored immediately as Tony Pooch ran it in from 11 yards out. Lane kicked his finale PAT and a 40-0 pasting was over.

Both teams used subs in the final stanza but Margaretta had an interception by David Keegan with 5:01 to play and a fumble recovery by Fisher late in the game to control the Raiders.

Four fumbles crippled the now 1-2 Raiders' chances.

"We have to get better," said Wilson after the dominating win, adding "this team can get better."

Port Clinton 14

PORT CLINTON — Port Clinton scored first, but Woodward scored often.

The Bulldogs scored 24 straight points to pull away for a 24-14 win over the Redskins at True-Lay Stadium Friday.

Brett Dunson opened the scoring with a 9-yard touchdown run with 6:08 left in the first period.

Marcus Kelly knotted the score by going over from the one four minutes later with Vashawn Smith pushing Woodward into the lead with a 47-yard return of a Port Clinton interception.

Scott McCallum finished the first half scoring with a 15-yard jaunt with Smith hauling in a 6-yard scoring strike from Bill Lloyd to open up a 24-6 Bulldog lead.

Cort Kaufman broke loose on a 47 yard run to get the Redskins back on the board and end the scoring.

Bill Moritz, who added the two-point conversion after the final score, led Port Clinton with 45 yards on nine carries. The Redskins finished with 166 yards total offense but also tossed three interceptions.

Woodward piled up 304 yards of offense with McCallum rushing for 146 yards on 24 carries and Kelly adding 96 yards on 27 tries.

St. Paul lone unbeaten FC team as Trojans fall

■ **Morrow brothers rush for 7 touchdowns; Plymouth shocks 1995 state Division VI runners-up**

Norwalk St. Paul will be the only undefeated team when Firelands Conference play begins this coming weekend.

The Flyers crushed Danbury, 55-0, while keeping its record perfect at 3-0.

South Central, however, suffered its first loss with a 34-14 setback at Danville.

Monroeville moved to 2-1 with a 21-0 blanking of Seneca East while Plymouth hit the win column for the first time with a come-from-behind 33-21 win over Buckeye Central and Firelands edged Western Reserve, 17-14.

Buckeye Central was the state Division VI runner-up a year ago.

Mike Morrow scored five touchdowns and Jay Morrow added two more for the Flyers who amassed 528 yards total offense with 484 coming on the ground.

It was Mike Morrow scoring both first quarter touchdowns for the Flyers who had a 14-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. They added two more scores in each of the three remaining periods to make it a runaway.

Two scores by Dan Pugh on a five-yard run and Morrow on a 40-yard run helped the Flyers to a 27-0 lead at intermission.

Morrow came back with runs of 11 and 20 yards in the third period and Jay Morrow scored on runs of 15 and 55 in the final period.

At Monroeville, the host Eagles broke the close game open with a pair of scores in the fourth period.

Monroeville took a 7-0 lead in the opening quarter on a 56-yard pass from Chad Ackerman to Brandon Smith and Clint Poths added the first of three conversions.

There was no further scoring until the final quarter when Poths scored on a 24-yard run at the 9:21 mark and Jon Roeder scored on a 57-yard run just three minutes later.

The Eagles had twice the total yardage (355-186) as Seneca East which dropped to 1-2 on the year.

At Collins, Firelands got a late 36-yard field goal from Joel Corley to break a 14-14 deadlock.

Brian Foster hauled in a 64-yard touchdown pass from Chris Hale earlier in the fourth quarter to get the Roughriders (0-3) even at 14-all but Corley's kick decided the outcome.

"The kids played their hearts out. We made two special teams mistakes but I really thought our kids outthit and outplayed them. Our kids left everything on the field," said Western second-year head coach Gary Lill.

"We really did a nice job mixing it up offensively and the kids are really catching on offensively. Sonny Bivins threw a nice ball and Alex Zoldesy caught three or four passes.

"We're getting closer and closer to that first win and I think the kids are really believing," added Lill.

Mason Cooley gave Firelands the early lead with an 83-yard kickoff return to begin the game but the Roughriders moved ahead, 8-7, on a one-yard run by Charles Wheeler who also ran for the two-point conversion.

Just before halftime the Falcons scored on a blocked punt return and took a 14-8 lead at halftime.

At Plymouth, the Big Red scored three times in the fourth quarter to rally from a 21-12 deficit.

Casey Harrington scored three touchdowns on runs of 24, 17 and eight yards and finished with 161 yards on 28 carries for Plymouth which improved to 1-2.

Harrington scored on a 17-yard run and Matt Dove hauled in a conversion pass from Kevin Rodman to get the Big Red within a point (21-20). Then, Harrington put Plymouth ahead to stay with an eight-yard run and Jason Claybaugh added the conversion.
