Heart Fails At 51 Years

NEW YORK (AP)—Al Singer, one of the colorful figures of a boxing era that produced Jack Sharkey, Primo Carnera, Kid Chocolate, Young Stribbling, Jimmy McLarnin, Tony Canzoneri and Maxie Rosenbloom, is dead at 51.

Singer, listed in the boxing record books as being two years older, died of a heart attack Thursday. He had been a salesman.

Singer held the world lightweight championship for three months and 28 days in 1930—the shortest tenure ever for a lightweight champion. He won it by knocking out Sammy Mandell in the first round, July 17, 1930. He lost it to Canzoneri Nov. 14, also on a first round knockout. He was barely 21 when he lost the title.

Peter Thomson Grabs Early Houston Lead

HOUSTON, Tex. (UPI)—British Commonwealth golfers continued to better the pros on the United States tour today with Australia's Peter Thomson leading the field into the second round of the \$40,000 Houston Classic golf tournament.

While Thomson, of Melbourne, Australia, was coming in with a five-under-par 32-33—65, Masters champion Gary Player of Johannesburg, South Africa, who is seeking his third straight U. S. victory, had one of his worst rounds in months and came in with a two-over 72 before 20,000.

Player and Arnold Palmer were heavy favorites to take the 1961 Houston Classic, but Palmer with a 68 after the first round was in a much better position than the little
