### Dean Gives Only 2 Hits In 4-0 Win

A fine two-hit pitching effort by veteran Kerry Dean propelled Mansfield Senior High School past Mansfield Malabar in the opening game of the sectional Class AA baseball tournament yesterday afternoon at Arlin Field.

Dean struck out 13 and walked only one as he recorded his third straight victory for the undefeated Tygers (6-0). He also contributed a second-inning home run. One of the Malabar hits was an infield scratch.

Senior High jumped four of its seven hits off Malabar's Gordon Kraus to put the game away in the second inning. Kraus, who struck out eight and walked one, gave up only seven hits but his mates had six errors.

Two errors and Coe's sacrifice fly gave Mansfield its other run in the third.

Madison St. Peter's were scheduled to meet this afternoon in another first-round sectional clash. The Tygers return to action Saturday in a 1 p. m. Buckeye Conference game at Fremont Ross.

Malabar was scheduled to play at Wooster today and to host New Philadelphia in a double-header Saturday at Muehlebach Field.

LEON Wagner has always been a dangerous fellow with a war club. . . And a couple of extra plus factors figure to make him even more menacing this summer. . . For he is now wearing contact lenses which make the ball spring into focus better and he has the "help" of Rocky Colavito. . . Wagner has gotten off to a rather auspicious start with a .368 batting average, six runs batted in and a double and three home runs among his seven base blows. . . "I can see the ball better," he said after the home opener in Cleveland. "I don't know whether they're (the lenses) going to help me hit more homers though." . . . Wagner propelled 31 balls into orbit last summer in his first season with the Indians. . . He says Colavito's presence in the lineup will boost his home run output "by eight, maybe ten." . . . Daddy Wags reasons pitchers will have to throw to him since they won't walk him as much with Colavito coming up right behind. . . Although hitting only .233, Colavito has produced two home runs and six RBI's in five games. . . After the "opener," Wagner said, "I almost would feel bad about hitting those home runs if Rocky didn't get one, too."

### Senior High, Malabar In Road Tests

Mansfield track squads will be competing this weekend on two different fronts. The Senior High runners, with the exception of pole vaulter Jeff Davis, will travel to Sandusky Saturday morning to compete in the annual Sandusky International meet.

Davis will represent the Tygers at the Bellaire Relays which is expected to draw entries from 50 different high schools.

Also traveling to the Bellaire affair will be nine members of the Malabar track team. Included in the Falcon contingent will be pole vaulter Adrian Davison, who had been absent from school earlier this week due to illness.

Davis and Davison are expected to give the two Mansfield schools their best opportunity to pick up points in the usually rugged Bellaire field.

## Ashlanders Smite Wooster, 8 To 4

WOOSTER-The Ashland College Eagles banged out 15 hits to drop the College of Wooster, 8-4, yesterday.

Senior John Rhoads scattered seven hits as the Eagles upped their record to 5-2. Rhoads also collected three singles to help pace the Ashland attack.

Bob Hery and Terry Hunt added three hits each for Ashland.

Mansfield St. Peter's Tim Jordan led the Scots' offense, as he powered a triple and a homer in three trips to the plate.

Today, Ashland was scheduled to travel to Bluffton in a Mid-Ohio Conference opener for both teams. The Eagles are also scheduled to take on Bluffton again tomorrow.

GALION - Lexington won a close track meet over Northmor here yesterday, 61-57.

Northmor came up with eight first places but Lexington was strong in the second and third place spots to compile the needed points.

Ron Cramer of Northmor had firsts in the 220 and 440-yard dashes and the long jump, while Mike Brandt had firsts in the 100-yard dash and the 180-yard hurdles for Lexington. He also was second in the 220.

The deciding factor was the meet-closing mile relay won by Lexington.

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Other championship finals today are in the hammer throw, defended by Harvard's Olney Crossdale; the broad jump, defended by Norman Tate, outstanding athlete of the meet last year; discus and 440-yard hurdles, both undefended.

Villanova's plan for five titles may be made of dream stuff, since the competition in the big relay races this year appears the toughest in many years. Last year, Villanova became the third team in the 71-year history of this oldest track and field carnival to win four relay titles in a weekend, joining the 1939 Pitt, and 1945 Michigan squads.

Madison's Bob Oberholtzer won the 120-yard high hurdles and the long jump.

## Plymouth's Victor In 3-Way Test

BELLVILLE - Plymouth was victorious in a close three-way track meet here yesterday. The Big Red scored 53 points, while Crestview was second with 48 and Clear Fork had 46.

Mike Ruckman led the Big Red with firsts in the 100 and 220-yard dashes and a second in the long jump. Bob Conley also had two firsts for Plymouth in the pole vault and 120-yard high hurdles.

Plymouth took six first places while Crestview had five firsts and Clear Fork three.

THE ONLY blight on the Arrow's fortunes was in track field, as Wooster lowered the Ashland record to 1.4. Big Bill Sprately raced to wins in the 100 and 220-yard dash events, and Gary Rings took firsts in the two hurdle events and the broad jump as the Generals were in complete command.

Miller Bruce Zehner and Vaulter Dave Meininger picked up the only wins for the Arrows.

Tomorrow, Ashland is scheduled to compete in the Dover Relays.

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## Ashland Arrows Victors On Road

ASHLAND-The Ashland Arrows swept to wins on the road in golf and baseball, but were stopped at home in a dual track meet.

Wooster played the role of spoiler, whipping the Arrows, 91-27, on the Ashland track. The Arrow golfers had little trouble, however, downing Lexington, 11-2, at Possum Run Golf Club, while the baseball team administered a 5-1 loss to Dover.

The Arrow tennis team was idle yesterday but was scheduled to host Shelby today and compete in the combined Cardinal Conference - meet tomorrow. Northern Ohio League meet in Mansfield Saturday.

Ashland hurler Dave Metcalf had a bit of trouble finding the plate, but when he did he was effective, limiting the Tornadoes to six scattered hits. Metcalf's big problem was walks, however, as he yielded nine free passes.

FIRST Baseman Dave Myers was the day's hitting star, as his first-inning home run got the Arrows off on the right foot.

Ashland is now 6-1-1 and is scheduled to take on visiting Coshocton tomorrow in a double-header at 1 p. m.

On the links, the Arrows were equally effective in moving to their seventh straight win. Bruce Gerhart of Lexington edged John Bogniard, 39-40 to pick up two points, but after that it was all Ashland. Terry Castor and Jim Miller each fired 37's and Rich Cline carded a 38 to pace the Arrows.
