

Pitchers Show Top Form

In spring training, it's really how you play the game and not whether you win or lose.

Even though the Philadelphia Phillies nipped the Boston Red Sox 4-3 Friday, some important pitchers on both sides played the game extremely well.

Rick Wise, the Boston starter, hurled three perfect innings and Luis Tiant followed with three more scoreless frames, yielding one hit. For the Phillies, newly acquired Jim Kaat worked six innings, allowing one run and four hits.

"Rick and Luis threw very well doing just what we wanted on the first time out," said Boston Manager Darrell Johnson.

However, the Phillies teed off on Jim Burton for two runs in the seventh and two more in the bottom of the ninth on Dick Allen's tremendous homer. The ball cleared a 40-foot wall at the 400-foot mark in dead center field.

Kaat said his performance "wasn't as easy as it looked. I was happy that I seemed to be throwing with pretty good rhythm and I seemed to have better than average command of my pitches. But I went deeper in my counts than I like."

And Tommy John of the Dodgers, who underwent surgery on his elbow in September 1974 and sat out all last season, was raked for four runs on six hits and three walks in four innings.

Some other big-name pitchers didn't have it so good. Jon Matlack was removed during a four-run inning as the Los Angeles Dodgers pounded the New York Mets, 10-6. Dr. James Parkes, the Mets' physician, reported Matlack has "a mild case of tendonitis in his elbow."

Pittsburgh's Al Oliver drove in five runs with two homers, a double and a single as the Pirates nipped the Chicago White Sox, 7-6, for a doubleheader split. The Chisox took the seven-inning opener, 13-3.

Crestview Star Shines

ASHLAND — The most impressive performance by an athlete at the ninth annual Crestview Indoor Invitational track and field meet at Ashland College Friday night was turned in by Crestview Senior Tony Nabors.

Everyone knew he was an outstanding hurdler. He had won the highs last year here and ran the hurdles at the state meet last spring.

However, he really blossomed last night in the hur-

dles, the 50-yard dash and the high jump.

Coach Forest Pruner was one of the few persons at the meet who wasn't surprised with Nabors' fine high jumping. He had used him as his third high jumper last year when he went six feet. Then, earlier this year, he cleared 6-4.

Nabors said he would like to go to state in four events, this May — the high jump, long jump and both hurdles.

Missed Shots Fail Buckeye

WOOSTER — "We missed too many 'bunnies,'" explained Buckeye Central Coach Cheryl Hamilton after the Bucks were ousted from the Girls Class A Regional Basketball Tournament at The College of Wooster last night.

"We both made the same number of shots from the field, but they went to the line more than we did, and we couldn't make the easy shots. They missed some too, though."

She said the Bucks expected a tough defense for the game, and they certainly weren't surprised. The Huskies were extremely effective on defense, limiting Buckeye Central to its first shot much of the time, as they put themselves in position for rebounds.

As a team, Northwestern collected 33 rebounds to 29 for the Bucks.

Karen Horst was Huskies' best asset on the boards, as she flailed away. She was forced to leave the game at 3:41 of the final quarter after getting the wind knocked out of her, and the Huskies changed their game to a semi-stall while she was on the bench.

Hamilton estimated "close to 1,000" Buckeye Central fans were on hand to cheer for their team. The Northwestern side had an even distribution of spectators, but probably not more than 450-500 were there. No official attendance figures were available.

The crowd was electrified late in the fourth quarter when Northwestern's Jean Stutz claimed that Buckeye Central's Betsy Eckstein had bitten her in a scramble for the ball. The officials, not wanting to get involved in the hassle, merely called for a jump ball, rather than the technical foul many spectators felt should have been assessed.

Officials called 38 fouls — 21 against Buckeye and 17

against Northwestern. The Bucks lost Cindy Fike at :03 and Patty Lutz at :17 via the foul route. Northwestern's Horst and Pam Immel both carried four into the final seconds, but that didn't limit their effectiveness. — Jeanne Yockey
