## SHILOH ENGLISH

"Reading maketh a full man; Conference a ready man; And writing an exact man."

Shiloh High School offers three courses in English this year. Freshman and sophomore English is under the instruction of Miss Alice Colton, while Mr. Shaw, the superintendent, has charge of the junior and senior English. This class is combined, having English Literature this year and American Literature next year.

The freshmen English class consists of twelve members. The book from which they study is Effective English by Claxton and McGinnis. During the first semester the text book is used. Compositions are written about once every week. They have also debates which are very inspiring. Eight books are required by the state to be read and reported on. Some of these reports are written and some are told in class. Second semester classics that are being studied are: The Lady of the Lake, by Scott; Treasure Island, by Stevenson; A Man Without a Country, by Hale; The Merchant of Venice and As You Like It, by Shakespere; and a few others.

The sophomore class has seventeen members. They use the same text book as the freshmen. Themes and stories are written quite often and Miss Colton receives many good ones. Perhaps in the future one or two of these students will become famous. Each member of the class reads and reports on eight books. Second semester classics are Julius Caesar, by Shakespere; Tale of Two Cities, by Dickens; Silas Marner, by Eliot; The Lady of the Lake, by Scott; Treasure Island, by Stevenson; A Man Without a Country, by Hale; The Merchant of Venice, by Shakespere. Probably a few others will be taken up.

The junior and senior English is combined. English Literature is being studied. This class consists of twenty juniors and seventeen seniors. A good bit of poetry is studied and memorized. All of the book reports have been written out so far, as the instructor wants to finish the text book at the end of the first semester. The second semester work will consist of classics and oral book reports. Classics being studied are: Hamlet, by Shakespere; Idylls of the King, by Tennyson; Gray's Elegy; The Deserted Village, by Goldsmith; Burn's Poems The Prisoner of Chillon, by Byron; The Rime of the Ancient Mariner, by Coleridge, and other classics.

Following the custom handed down to us from former years the seniors will present a play at commencement time. It is probable that a junior play will also be given.

Shiloh intends to send an orator to Mansfield to participate in the oratorical contest.

Our library has been remodeled. New book shelves have been made and put in by the Smith-Hughes department. Although there are only about six hundred volumes, we hope to increase the number as soon as possible.

Literary programs are being held almost every Friday afternoon in the auditorium. Each Friday a different room or grade gives a program. These are enjoyed by all. The sophomore class gave an especially good program including a play "The Wedding at Weyback" which was liked so well that it was given at the Farmer's Institute.



# SHILOH AGRICULTURE

Agriculture, as given in the Shiloh high school, receives Federal aid according to the provisions of the Smith-Hughes law.

High school classes in farm shop, animal industry, farm crops and engineering are a part of the full time school work.

A division of the Smith-Hughes idea provides for a program of short course and part time work intended for men engaged in the business of farming. This short course work consists of three weeks, tractor, soils and fertilizer, and poultry schools. Poultry culling demonstrations and orchard pruning are also a part of this work.

A Farmers' Independent Institute was held Jan. 19-20 with a poultry exhibit and vegetable show. A program of speakers on live questions of the day and entertainment by the village and township schools made this one of the most successful institutes that Shiloh ever has held.

The financial end of this institute has been taken care of by a home talent play entitled "Forest Acres" and by a musical entertainment given by the Diversity Girls' Sextette.

Extension work here has taken the form of a poultry club under the able leadership of Geo. Page and of a dairy school and a legume school held by Mr. Salisbury and Earl Jones, of the State Department.

We hope she will come out for the team next year.


Marjorie was bold and showed up fine,
