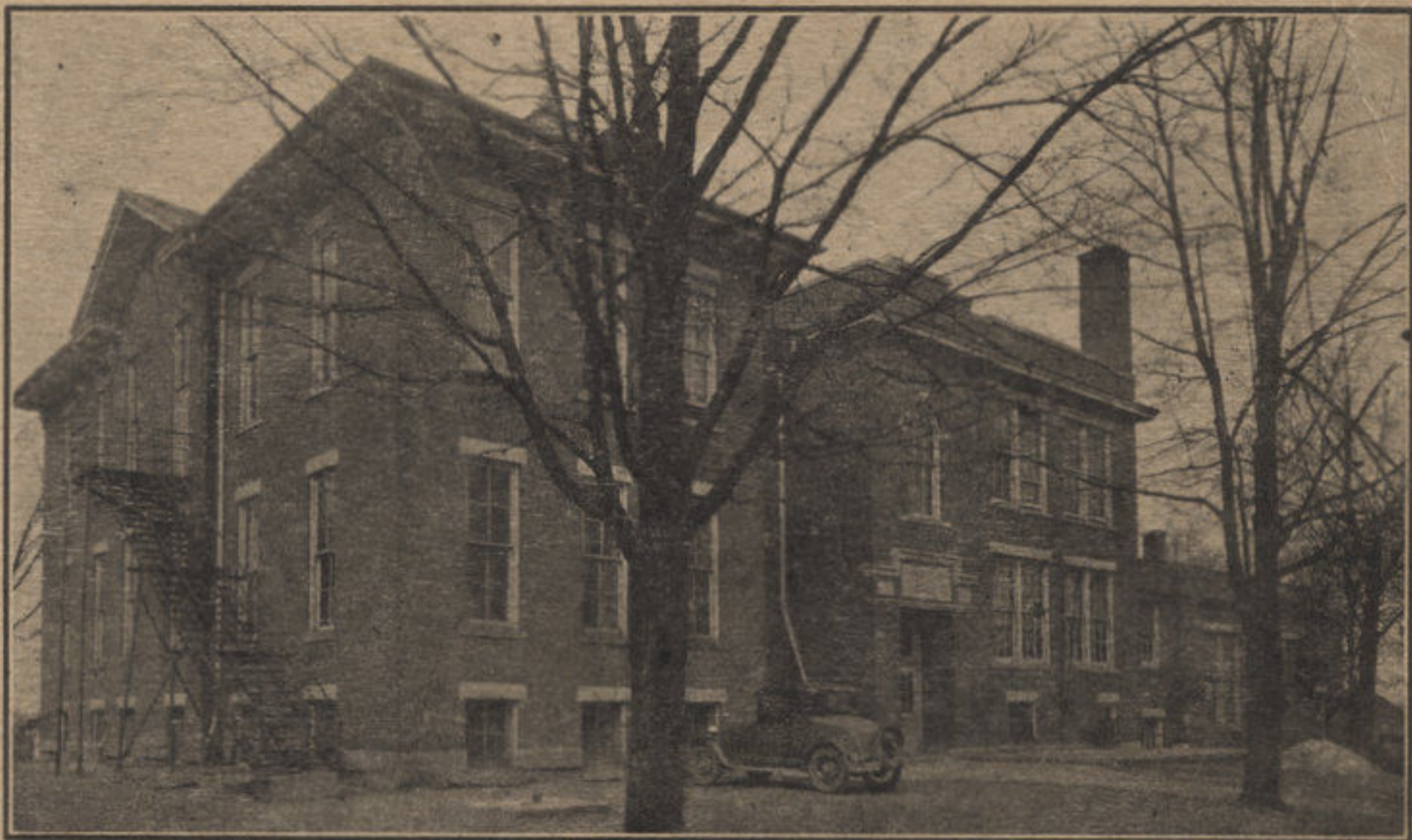

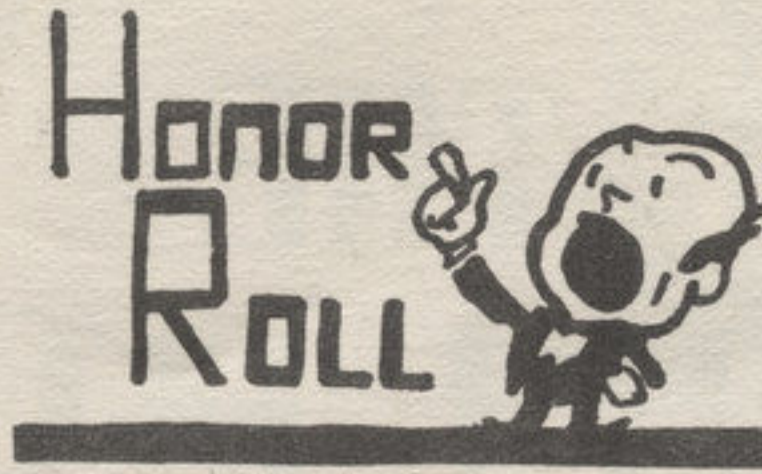
Grade Cards

One resolution I have made, and try always to, keep is this; to rise above little things.-

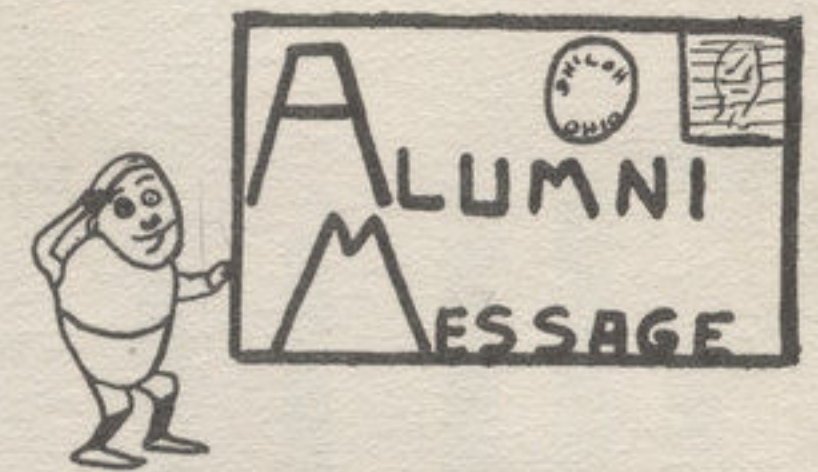

### BANK GETS BULLETPROOF FURNITURE

The Shiloh Savings Bank has been equipped with new Bullet Proof furniture. This equipment is known as the Banded Barrier Fixtures, and is manufactured by the O. B. McClintock Company, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

The windows are of bullet-proof glass, one and three - sixteenth inches thick.

The exchange counter is protected by a strong steel cylinder.

The back of the wood work is lined with heavy steel plates and the top of the partition is of compact steel mesh topped by six-inch steel spikes.

The doors are controlled in opening and closing by electrical buttons, concluded A. W. Firestone, President of the Bank in an interview today.

### "SHILOH GETS WATER WORKS"

The new water works, under the Federal Relief Work will be started by the middle of December. The town received a grant of \$16,000 from Federal Government. \$10,000 Mortgage Revenue Bonds; \$9,000 of General Obligation Bonds. The General Obligation Bonds will be payed from taxation. The total cost will be approximately \$36,000. There will be over \$10,000 of the above figure spent for labor from this community. Any one in Shiloh or Cass township that is unemployed can secure a position on this project.

Six acres on the Joe Gilger's farm has been purchased, on which two wells will be drilled. The stand pipe will be placed on the George Dickerson's lot.

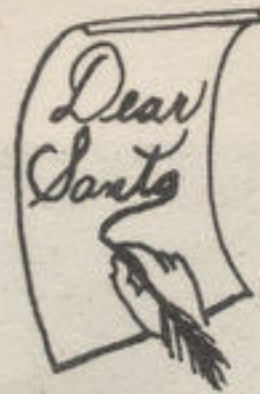

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# A Letter

December 3, 1935

To City, County, and Exempted Village Superintendents:

On Sunday of this week there appeared an article in the Columbus Dispatch which has proved most embarrassing to the State Dept. of Education. This article referred to the matter of teaching temperance in the schools of Ohio. The impression left -- in fact, a positive statement was made -- that in the future the schools of Ohio will teach, not temperance, but drinking in moderate amounts. It also stated that the State Liquor Board, in conjunction with the State Dept. of Education, is setting up a program for Temperance Day which will be held this year on January 17.

The whole idea is most preposterous in its very nature. In the first place the article was written entirely without the knowledge of anyone connected with the State Dept. of Education. If any school man who has had to battle with the problems of the use of alcohol among school youngsters could conceive the idea of teaching the use of liquor or having the State Dept. of Education join up with the State Liquor Board in setting up a program for temperance instruction in the schools, that individual is most certainly not a school man and is most certainly not interested in the welfare of the youth.

The following sections of the Ohio Code (7688-1, 7723, 7728) give specific instructions as to what shall be done by the State Dept. of Education and the public schools of Ohio in teaching the effects of alcoholic beverages. It is most certainly my intention and serious conviction that all schools of the state of Ohio adhere strictly to the letter of the law in carrying out these provisions.

The State Department of Education has set up a committee of people in the state who have had a great deal of experience in dealing with the problems of youth to make a careful and objective study of some of the problems with which the young people of high school age are faced. This committee at present is preparing a questionnaire which will be sent out to school people, to high school people, to high school pupils themselves, and to judges of the juvenile courts of the state to determine, not only the problems among the youth resulting from the repeal of the 18th amendment, but many other problems which are involved in our present social setup. The findings of this committee will be reported back to the State Dept. of Education and we in turn expect to make this information available to all school people in assisting them with their job in teaching temperance in the schools.

A committee consisting of members of the staff of the Dept. is at present preparing a program to be used in the Ohio Schools on Temperance Day. You can rest assured that this committee is not working in conjunction with the State Liquor Board.

The evening was enjoyed by all and it was the unanimous opinion that this was one of the most successful ones ever held.

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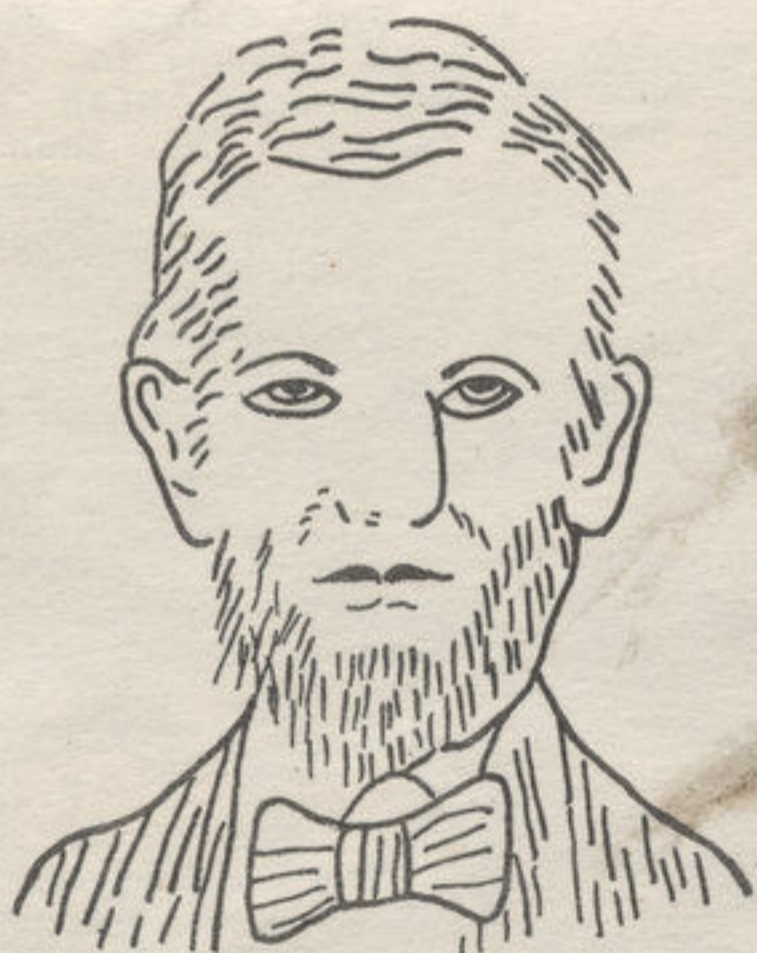
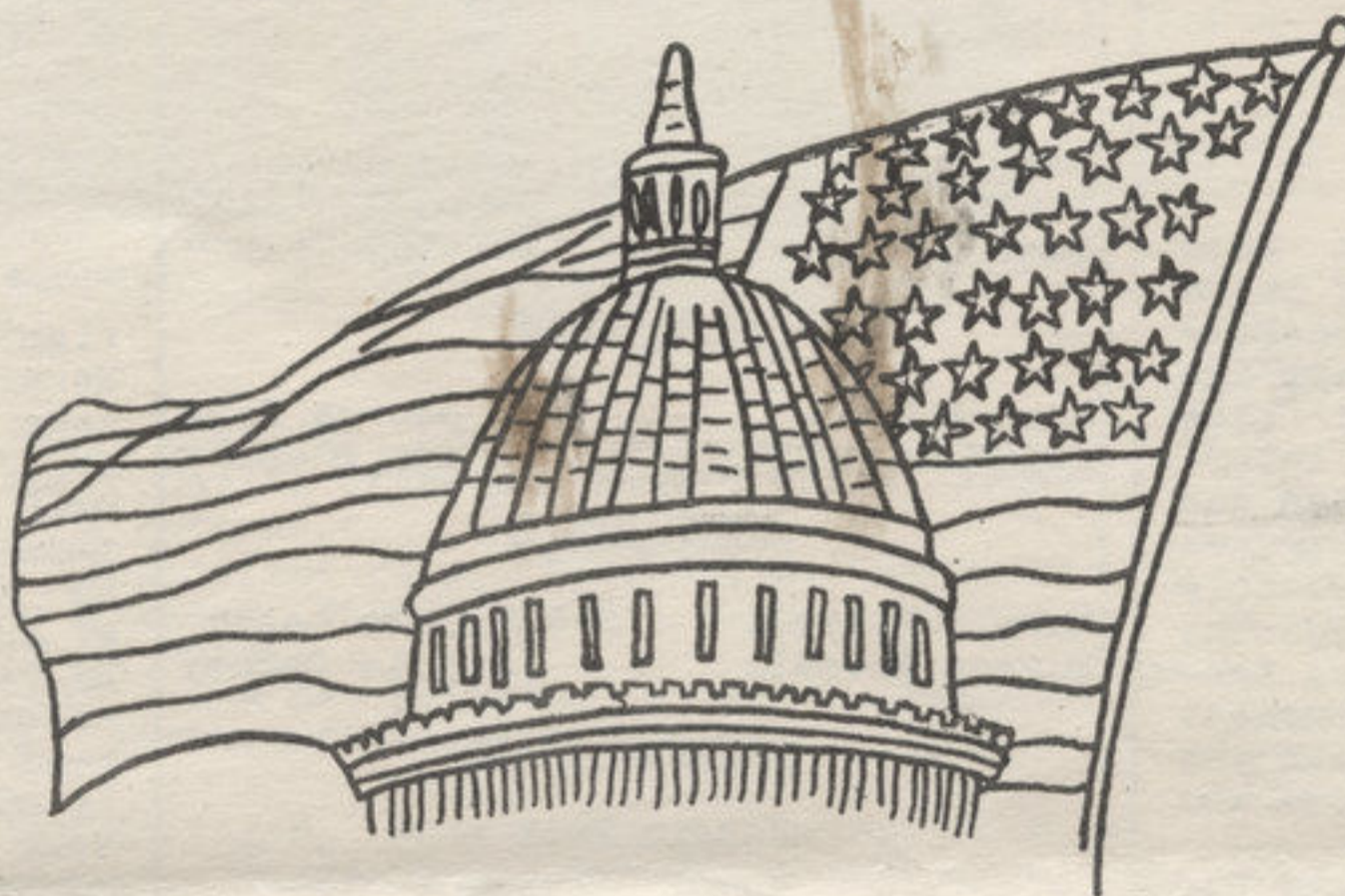

Our remaining schedule will be played at home.

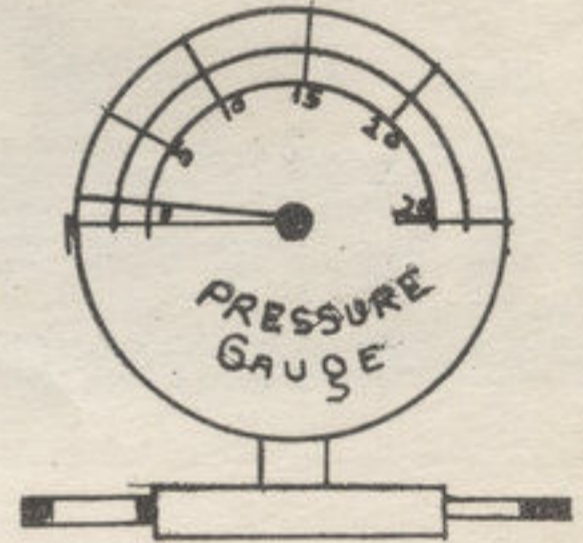

### CHANGING EDUCATION.

Members of the School Board, Members of the Faculty, and friends. The Class of 1936 has completed one of the journeys of life and now stands upon the threshold of a new and changing world. We are leaving a happy past and entering an unknown future. Many of us have yet to decide which one of the highways of life to take. We hope that some of us may further travel the road of education.

The travels of this Class have not been easy but through the efforts of our faithful and untiring teachers we have reached this happy commencement.

Progress in the field of Education has had much to do with the changing world. A brief survey of the history of Education will reveal much. We find the criticism that education has been always a step behind business. When it is remembered that at one time schools were conducted according to the dictates of the church; at another time school authorities adopted a curriculum preparing the student for college; another time school men asked business what business men desired in the High School graduate. With these changes of school aims due to outside influences, education had to be a step behind business.

Today the school men are working upon the theory that public education should fit the student to be a good citizen. Not to be economically independent alone but to perform the duties to society expected of every citizen. Renowned educators of the past saw the ideal in different places.

John Locke taught the principle contained in his favorite expression, "A sane mind in a sound body;" Rousseau believed the innate faculties be developed which may be said to mean that evident talents be developed; Pestalozzi taught that all subjects be taught in an effort to make the learner a finished and rounded out product; Herbart, whose ideas are now generally followed, believed that the student should be trained to become an active and valued member of society. The school of today have placed social subjects in the school in order that a member may take his part in society.

The Education of today is divided into five aspects of principles, the first of these being Political. The schools of today are supported by the state, and the state teaches education for citizenship and literacy. The word literacy may be defined as learned or educated. Citizens are educated for their political and civil duties as members of society and freedom. The schools today are teaching pupils so that they are able to improve and advance the welfare of the state. Schools of yesterday taught the student the three R's in order that he would be able to read and write. With the coming of the in-

dustrial revolution the school was called upon to broaden its work and develop new types of instruction so that the student would be able to keep up with the changing world. The second of these aspects, which is scientific, has made a great change in the world. This change did not take place until 1880 but since then it has made a great advance and today applied science stands as the nation's protector. The average student of today has more knowledge about the law of science, the human life and industry than did the distinguished scholars of centuries ago. Engineering, Agriculture, and modern medicine stand as three of the great applications to modern science since the time the school changed to the state from the hands of the church.

The third, vocational aspect has helped modern education very much. In the middle ages vocational education was to prepare for the church but today means training individuals for some employment. We find such vocational subjects as agriculture, Smith Hughes, Home Economics and Mechanical Drawing replacing the old system of three R's.

The sociological aspect has to deal with the child welfare and the social life of the student. The old days of the hickory stick rule in the little red school house is over and we find the teachers trying to reason with the student about their problems and helping them solve them. The student is no longer permitted to work in the factory but is being sent to school so that he may learn to work more efficiently. Health has played a great part in education, it has brought about the modern building and has worked against the disease and epidemic which confronted the schools before.

The last, the scientific organization of education, has brought the development of the normal school the teacher's college which gives advanced training in educational research and in the solution of the practical problems of school organization and administration.

Therefore we may sum up the educational progress and say the education of today which teaches the man to follow reason without fear of consequences to substitute scientific for empirical knowledge, to equip him for intelligent participation in civic life, to discover a rational basis for conduct, to unfold and expand every inborn faculty and energy, and to fill him with a restless striving after an ideal. We are now about to part and to pass out of this school of learning, but we hope that some may enter the higher field of learning, for we have only received the introduction.

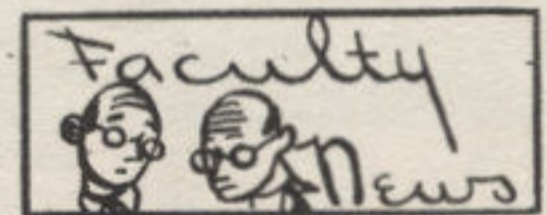
