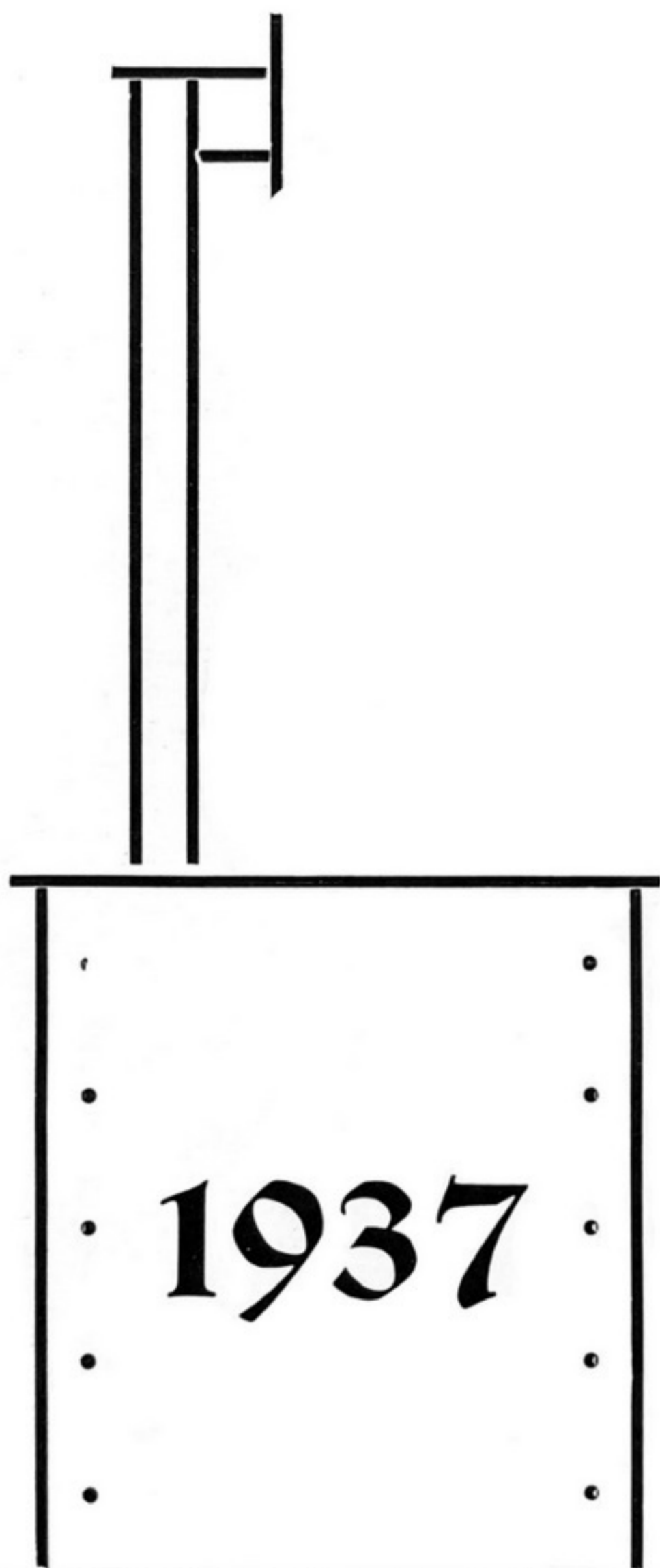

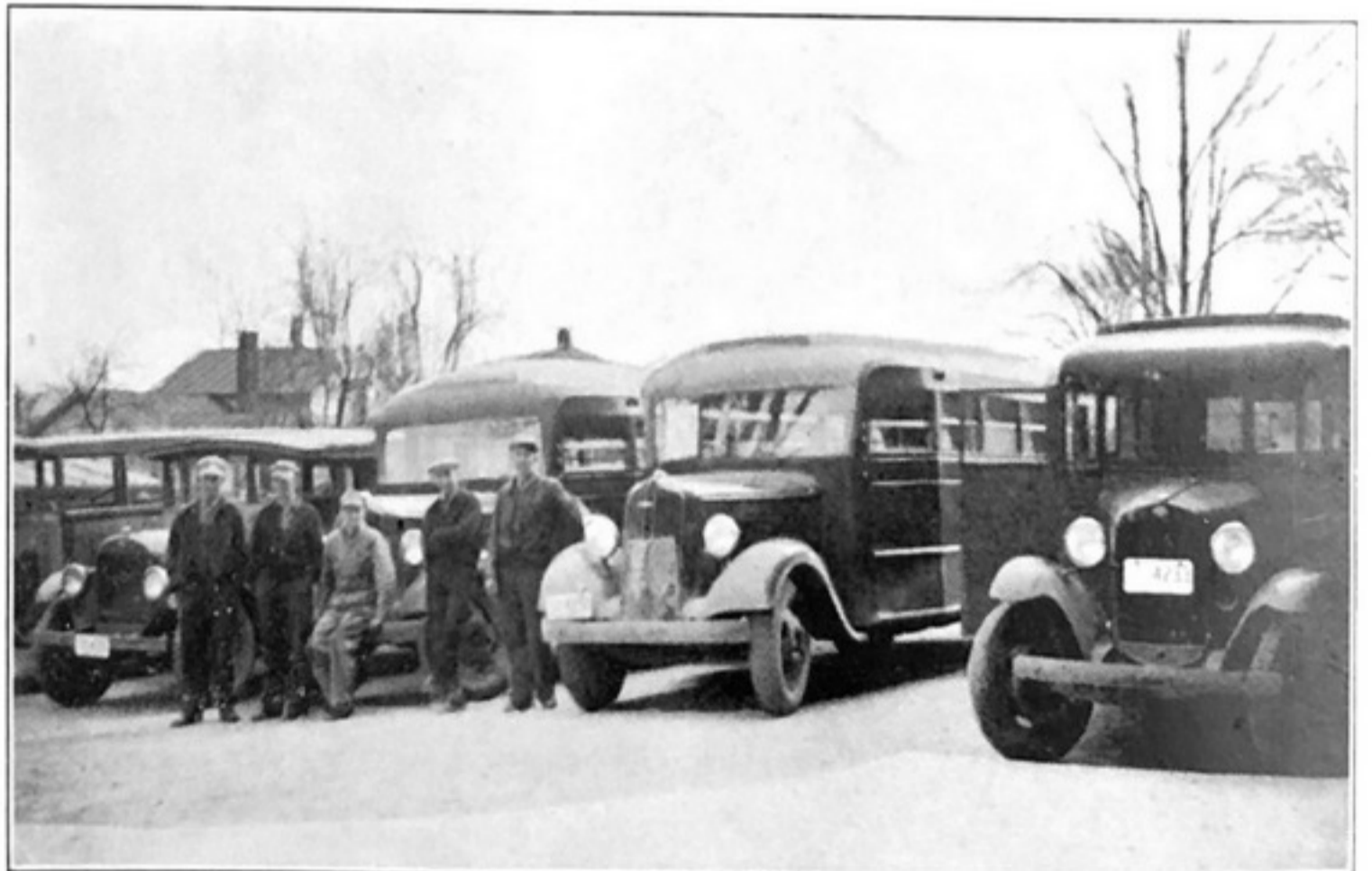

Of which you never knew.

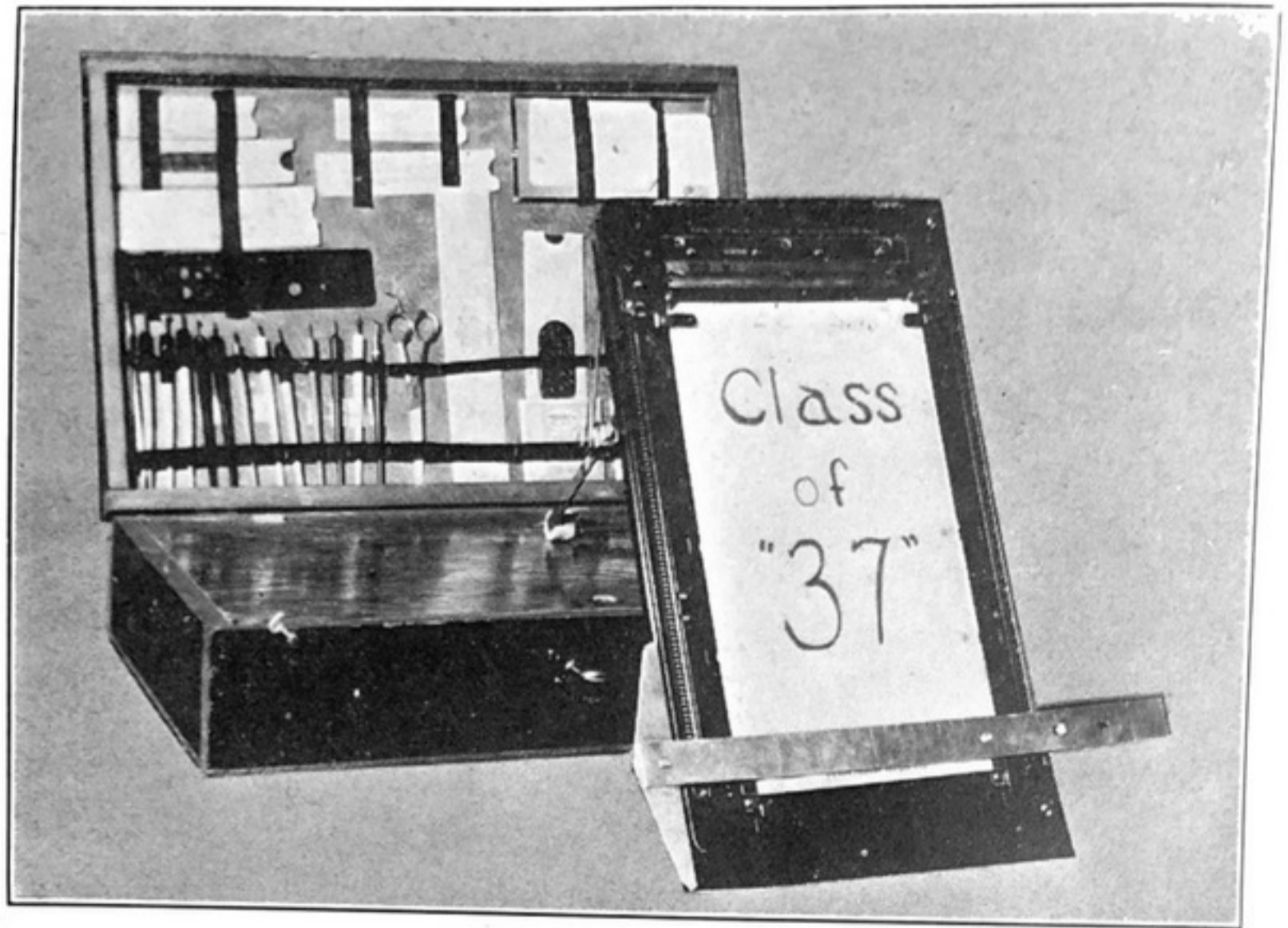

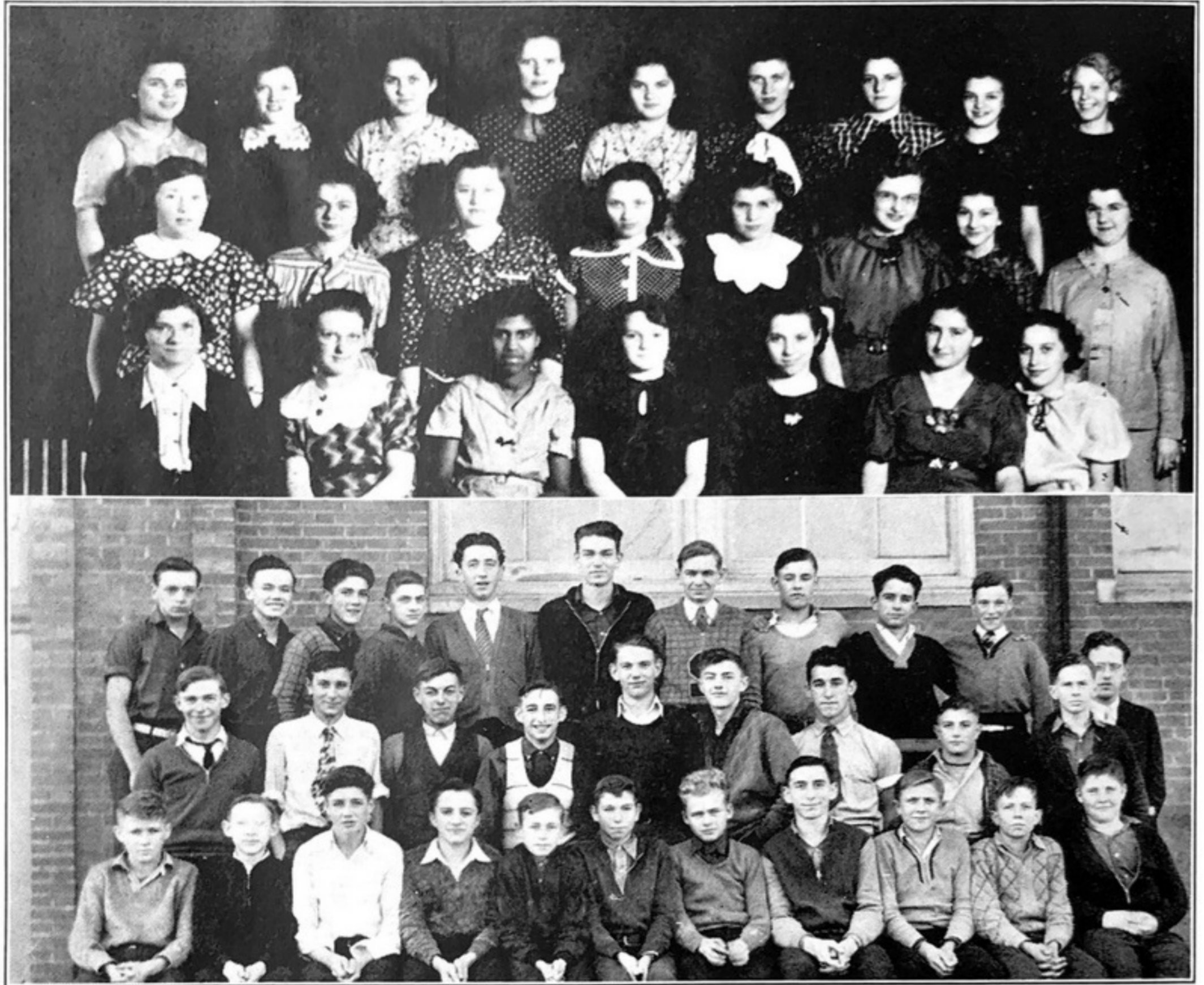

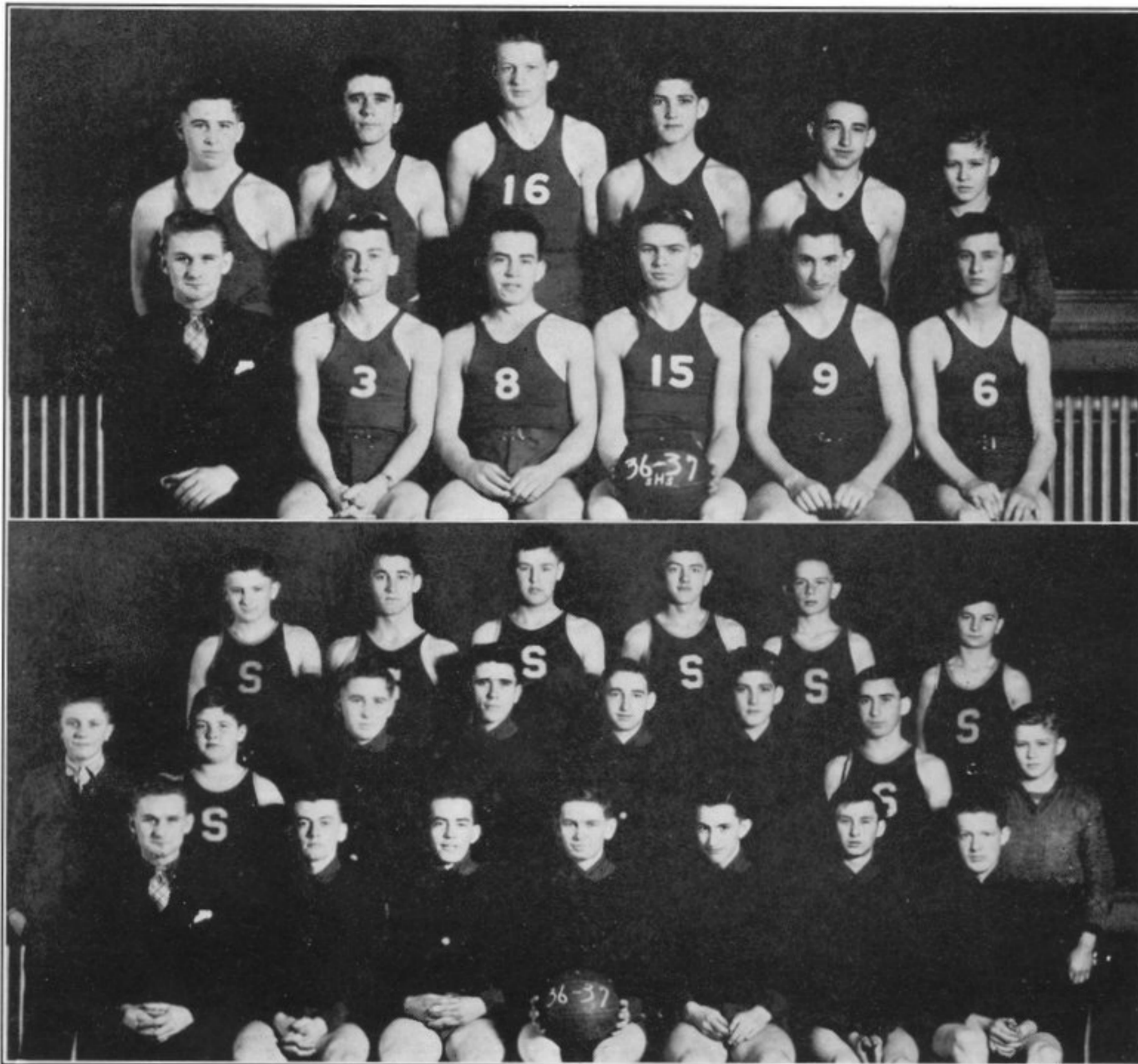

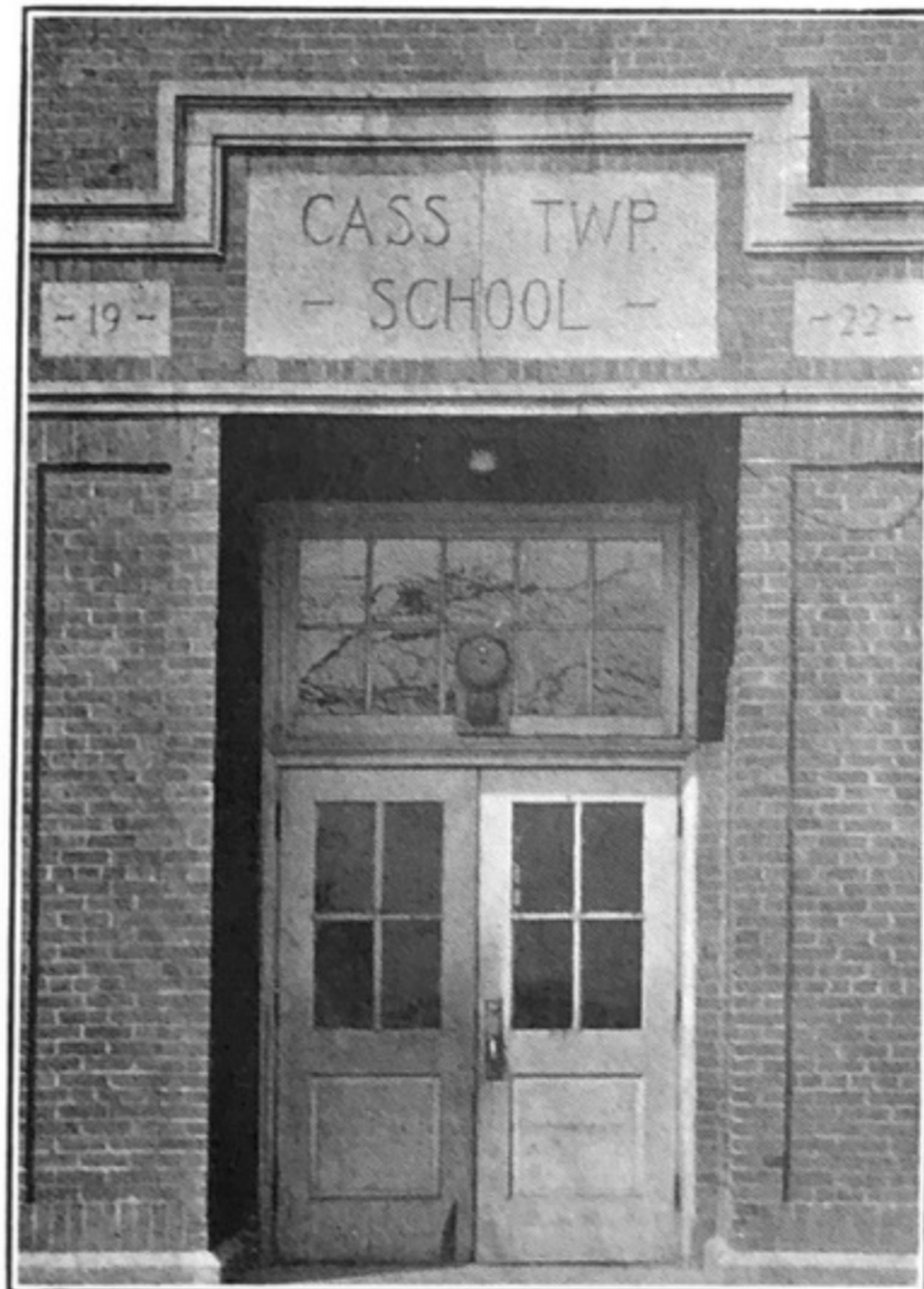
Shiloh Athletic Association

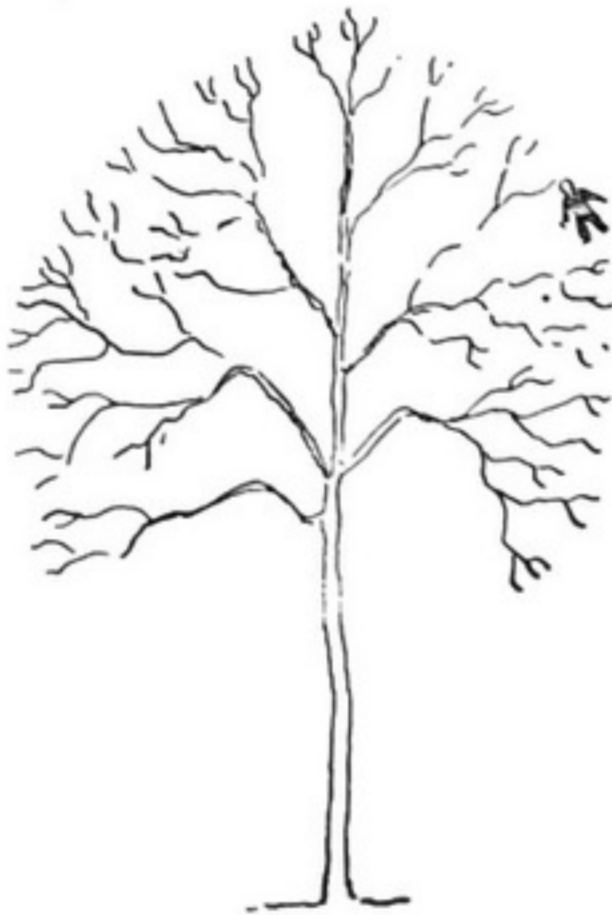
