Coach Lindsey, backed by a hard fighting team, kept his promise and now, we all look forward to another year of successful athletics at Plymouth Hi.

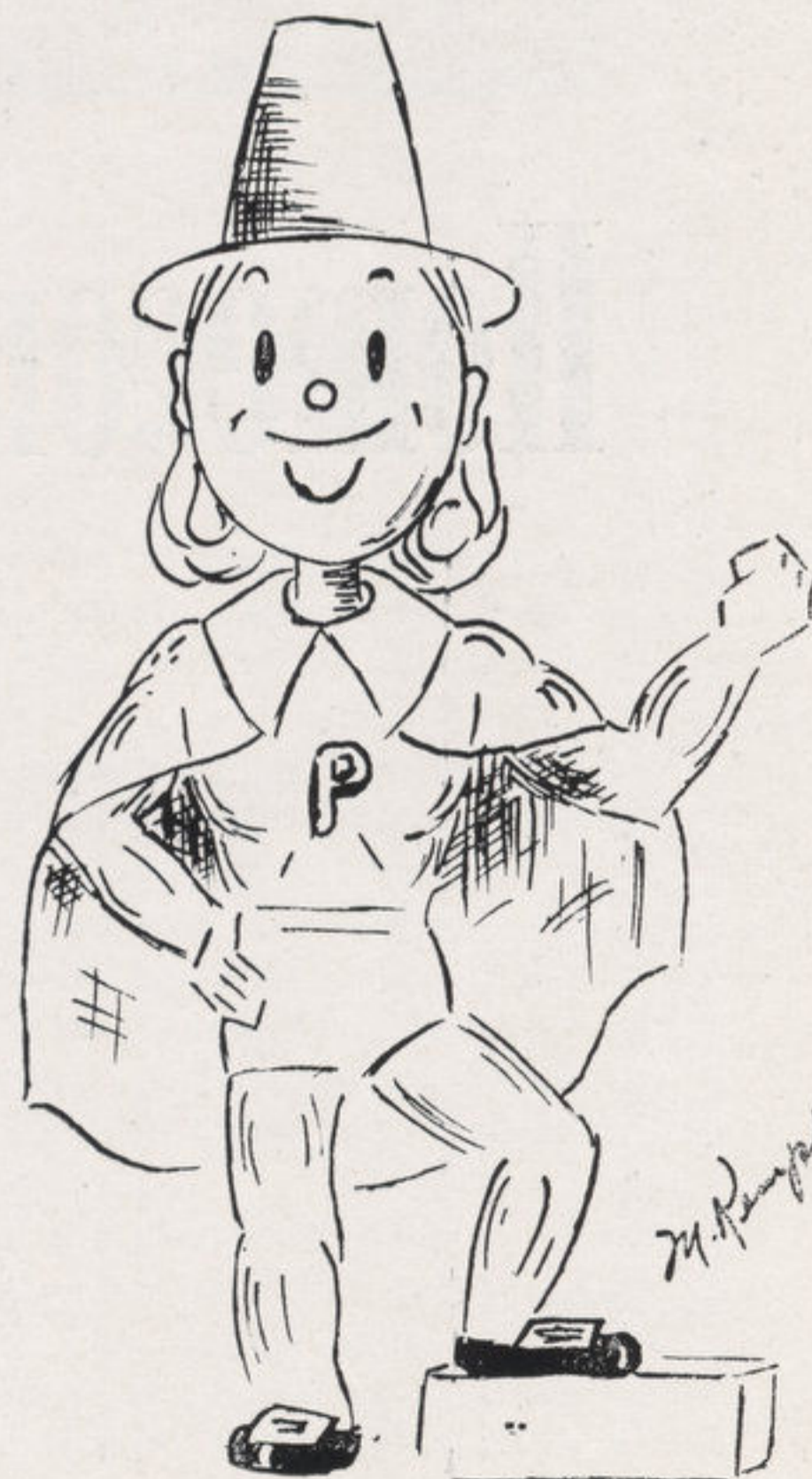
We express our thanks to the Booster Club which helped our team in so many ways.

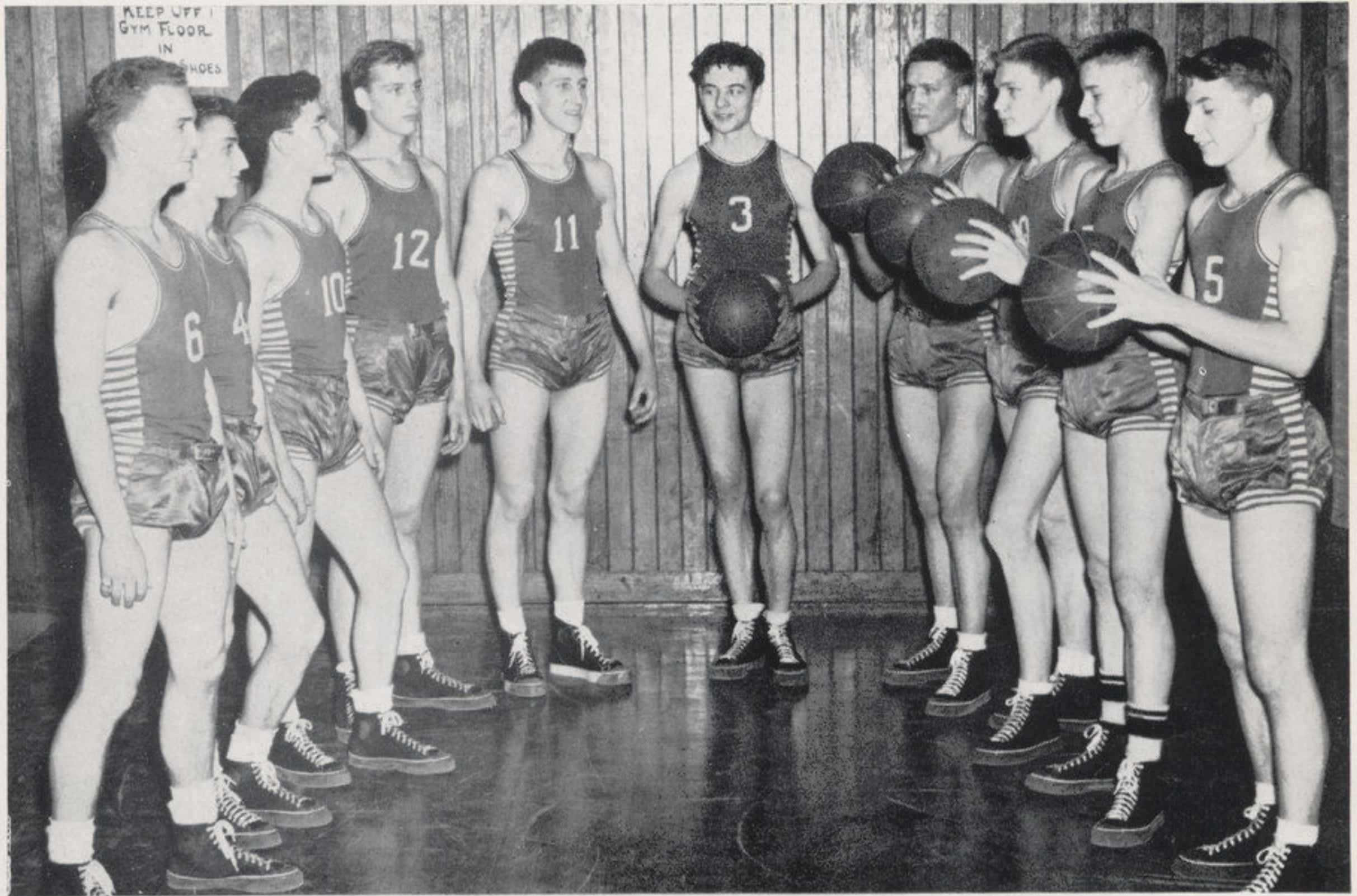
Tag Day was held and everyone who purchased a tag became an official member of the club.
