THE LOG OF 1947

Looking back to September of 1943, you will remember a group of boys and girls boarding the ship called "Seniorville." We had a long voyage ahead of us so we chose Miss Mayne as Captain, Robert Poskany as First Mate, Ruth Winbigler as Second Mate and a bunch of sturdy sailors as follows:

We sailed along smoothly for our first year voyage. We only lost two of our sailors, Bill Zeigler and Eugene Alfrey. Then we dropped anchor in May at the port of "Sophomore" and had a shore leave of three months.

On September 4th of 1944, we again started our cruise. This time we chose Mrs. Carpenter as Captain, LaVaughn Oswalt as First Mate, and Sadie Reed as Second Mate, with Eighteen sailors aboard our good ship. This voyage, we lost three of our good sailors, they were Herbert Swind, Walter Means, and Robert Poskany. To make up for the ones lost we gained three more sailors who were: Betty Lee, Sadie Reed, and William Adams. Our cruise this year was very successful and we had several parties aboard the ship. Then again on May 21 we dropped anchor at "Juniorville" for a three months leave.

September 3rd of 1945 shore leave is over and this time we chose Mr. Pittenger as Captain, Joan Guthrie as First Mate, Helen Whitcomb as Second Mate, and Signalman Bonnie Pennell who helped the remaining twelve sailors struggle through a strenuous year. We had a new sailor; this was Naomi Lawrence. This year we put on a class play called "House of Strangeness" which impressed everyone very well. We had the "Hoosier Cornhuskers" from the WFIN radio station for one of our entertainments.

Now came the great event of the year and this was decorating the gym for the banquet, which took a lot of hard work, but in the end it was a beautiful sight. After all this we anchored at "Seniorville" with a three months leave.

Well, here it is again, September 3rd of 1946 and we chose Mr. Pittenger as Captain, LaVaughn Oswalt as First Mate, Joan Guthrie as Second Mate, and Bonnie Pennell as Signalman. This year we have eleven sailors since one sailor thought land would be best for her as she had become Mrs. Eugene Alfrey. This year sailing has really been a pleasure. Our class play was "Dictator Dad" which was a success. We now started slowly back to "Seniorville" where on the 23rd day of May we cruised into Harbor safely and much wiser.

I called on Virginia at her magnificent southern mansion and she told me that Naomi Lawrence had turned out quite well. 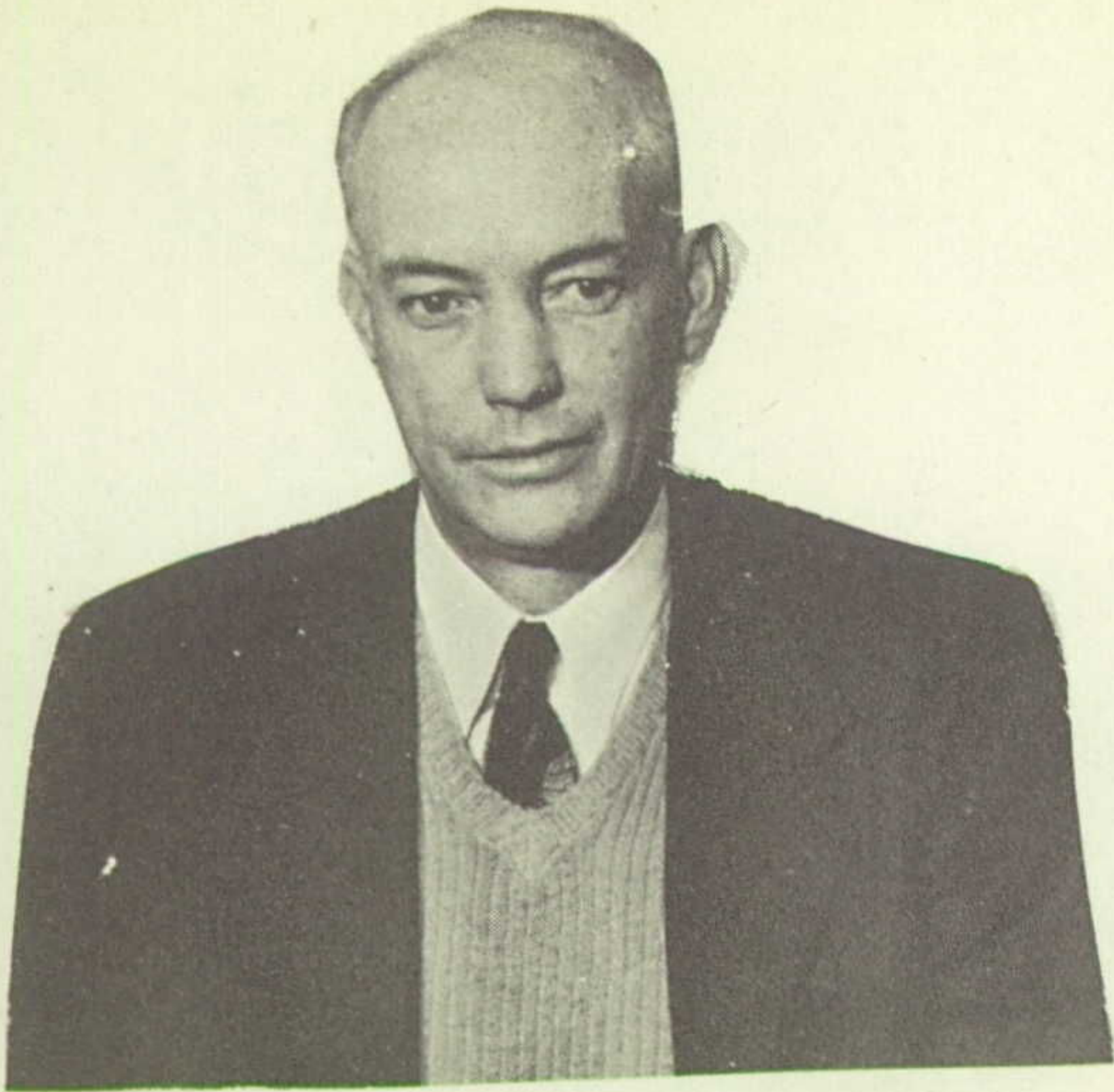

SHILOH SCHOOL FACULTY

At the beginning of the school year of 1946 and 1947, the faculty consisted of Mr. Randall Hartley, our new Superintendent, Mrs. Nada McCauslin, Miss Dorothy Moore, and Mr. Waldo Pittenger. We did not have a Music, Physical Education, and Commercial Teacher.

Mr. Hartley, the new Superintendent, came from Buffalo, Ohio, and was formerly the Superintendent of the Community Schools, Robins, Ohio. The first semester Mr. Hartley taught World History and Mathematics.

Mrs. McCauslin came from Mansfield, Ohio where she was substitute teacher. She teaches English and Home Ec.

Miss Moore came from Chicago, Ill. She taught in Omaha, Nebr. last year. She teaches Foreign Language, English, and Geography.

Mr. Pittenger who has been with the Shiloh Faculty for a number of years and should be called the old timer. He teaches Commercial Law, History, and Science.

A week after school had started we were greeted with two new teachers, they were Mrs. Leta Glasscock and Mr. Daryl Heiser.

Mrs. Glasscock came from Mansfield, Ohio. She was hired as the Commercial teacher.

Mrs. Heiser also came from Mansfield, Ohio. He was hired for teaching Physical Education and several subjects in the seventh and eighth grade.

These teachers stayed with us for the first semester. At the end of the first semester Mr. Heiser resigned and Mr. David Phenegar was hired to take his place. And we also started the second semester with a new music teacher who was Mrs. Andrews.

Mr. Phenegar came from Canton, Ohio where he was a teacher. He teaches both Girl's and Boy's Physical Education and World History.

Mrs. Andrews came from Lucas, Ohio where she was a teacher. She teaches music from grades one to twelve.

This constituted the High School Faculty of 1946 and 1947.

The following teachers were here last year: Mrs. Lois Hedeem, First Grade; Mrs. Ditha McBride, Third Grade; Mrs. Greta Stroup, Fifth Grade; Mrs. Mabel Londot, Sixth Grade.
